*Recd of a Letter from London, March 14, 1761.*  
Our Parliament will rise and be dissolved the 1st Instant, and the New be immediately formed: what Sort it will be, a very little Time will shew; and indeed the Disposition with regard to Peace or War will shew itself. At present Opinions about the one or the other are various as ever; Day we see Peace near, the next it's vanishing, all the while the most vigorous Measures are used in Planning a warm Campaign in Germany and Expeditions elsewhere, by our Navy, but their Destination a profound Secret. King of Prussia you will find is rising in greatness; he has since his late Victory, 15,000 Troops to assist Prince Ferdinand, by a Master-stroke of Generalship (beyond what Thing Turenne ever did) has dispersed the French Army under Broglie, tho' almost double Number and Cantoned to all Advantage, he is pursuing them as fast as he can, but they shew his Swiftmess in their Flight out of Hesse, 'tis said that the Czarina seems inclin'd to draw her Assistance from the Austrians, and Spain and Sardinia have design'd to Attack Italy, these last are probably no more at present than the Coffee House Conjectures, and if the War continues may be brought about. Captain Scull, in a Letter of Marque Sloop, sailing to Philadelphia, took lately off Corcoran, a French Brig loaded with 104 Hogheads of white Sugar, 5000 lb. of Indigo, and several other valuable Effects: The Vessel was bound to Old-France, sprung her Foremast in the Latitude of Bermuda, and was putting back to rest. The following French Privateers have lately been taken by our English Cruizers, and are carried into England, viz.  
The Auguste of St. Maloes, of 10 Guns and 100 Men, by the Frigate Vengeance.  
The L'Annemame and Sardoine, two King's Ships, carrying 14 Guns each, armed by the French, and design'd for the Coast of Guinea.  
The Zephyr of 12 Guns, and 140 Men by the Frigate, Capt. Ogle. The Marshal Broglie Prisoner of Morlaix, by the Unicorn. A Privateer of 10 Guns, and 140 Men, by the Jersey, in the Latitude of Cherburgh, by the Alarm. The St. John of St. Antoine, of 12 Guns, and 85 Men, by the Jersey.  
*Letter from Barbados, dated April 10, 1761.*  
On Tuesday the 31st of March, about half an Hour after Four, P. M. being near Low Water the Sea suddenly retired from the Shore, and in Three Minutes it returned again, to the Height of Four Feet. This Flux and Reflux, about Eight, but about Ten it increased again, for a short Time; then decreased, 'till Six the next Day.  
The Flux and Reflux was not always regular; after the first Three Hours it was sometimes performed in Minutes, and at other Times in not less than Six Minutes.  
November 1st, 1755, the very Day the Earthquake happened at Lisbon, there was then here in this Manner, an Agitation of the Water; so that, we have Room to fear, there has now been another GOD knows where!

**PHILADELPHIA, May 21.**  
Yesterday arrived here the Ship Joseph & Nancy, Captain Taylor, from Belfast, which he left the 10th of March. By him we have Irish Papers to the 7th of March, which contain Advices from London to the 8th of March, the Purport of which is as follows: That on the 27th of that Month, the embarkation on board the Grand Expedition Fleet, and it was thought would sail the next Day, but the Wind had been given for Sailing the 10th of March: That the Allies still carried on the Siege of Ziegenhayn and Cassel, which, it was thought, would soon capitulate: That a War in Germany was expected; and that his Sardinian Majesty would open the Campaign with 50,000 Men: That the Swedish Court had resolv'd to raise no more Men for the War: And that the King of Prussia would quickly begin his Operations with the Army of Dresden.  
On the 31st of March, there was 'at Madeira a great Earthquake, on the North-East Part of the Island, which did some Damage.  
The Papers there is an Account, that on the 10th of March died that Great, Learned and Pious Man, the Rev. Mr. GEORGE WHITEFIELD.

**ANNAPOLIS, May 28.**  
Sunday last arrived here, from London, the Ship Neptune, Captain Benjamin Dawson, who left on the 30th of March.  
Capt. Dawson informs us, that the Day before he left Spithead, the Grand Expedition Fleet consisted of 14 Sail of the Line, 20 Frigates, 10 Bombs, &c. and about 200 Sail of Transports, with 10,000 Land Forces. Commodore Keppel had the Command of the Fleet; and the Troops were under the Command of General Hodgson.  
Capt. John Johnson, in the Ship Sally, came in with Capt. Dawson, and is arrived in Patowmack. By Letters from London, we are informed, that Capt. Craymer, of the *Tetis*, from Patapsco, was tracked in her Passage home by a Privateer of 60 Guns, whom, after a sharp Engagement, he obliged to their off: But had hardly got out of Sight from her, before a Frigate came up, and obliged him to strike. The *Tetis* had only 4 Guns, and 15 Men.
