THE Capital of this Country, the Hands of the Enemy, every Day an innumerable Cannon on the Battlefield. Hed the Roads

Allies to bring up their Artillery as ordered, Cassel would have surrendered. However, its Fate must soon be known. Garrison lost a good many Men in the Battle. Ziegenhayn is cannonaded very much. hath been several Times set on Fire. Garrison have insisted more than once on joining their Army; which hath been refused.

The Enemy seem to have taken Advantage of the Assembly between Hanau and Frankfurt, to separate Corps near Bergen. They employed in drawing an advantage of Reasons which may be easily guessed. They have left eleven Battalions in Friedland. Eimbeck, March 15. The Cannon Allies upon Cassel is heard here. They have been reinforced by four Regiments. Col. Colignon has joined beyond the Leine, with some Battalions Grenadiers.

Prince Ferdinand's Head Quarters at Cassel, March 15. The continual Rains of the Month have prevented the Siege of Cassel so vigorously as we could wish. The Enemy, consisting of the greatest Garrison, who made the Sally in the Town, were so soon repulsed. The little Mischief they repaired the next Day; and even though they had been too hastily nailed up, were serviceable again. We had 50 Men killed, and 130 Wounded. The Siege was at least as great.

The Operations of the Siege have been retarded by the extreme Badness of the Weather especially in a Country which is eaten up. However, we have Reason to believe that the Arrangements taken by the Allies, that Abundance will succeed, and that by Favour of the fine Weather has been set in for some Days, we have Reason to believe in the further Progress of the Siege.

The Inundation which surrounds Cassel, not having permitted our Troops to march, they have endeavoured to Fortifications by Bombs; but, with great Caution to spare the Houses, they could not vent some being burnt.

Frankfort, March 15. As the French cutting their last Retreat, have been obliged to destroy many of their principal Magazines, they have become a Prey to the Allies at present employed in establishing a new Purpose they have received within Days, by the Rhine, several Boatloads of Grain, Hay, &c.

Schweinsberg, March 15. After a long Siege of the Enemy, and their Insinuation that M. Broglio had with great Advantage Allies between two Fires, we shall be able to give a decisive Blow at the Entrance of the Garrison of Gottingen is again the second Parallel is actually finished and that Place will fall in a few Days. Troops have again taken Post in the Ziegenhayn; and a Bombardment will infallibly reduce it.

This Morning we had Advice, that Majesty has made a great Impression of the Empire, and will speedily engage in the Siege of Dresden.
