BOSTON, June 1. Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman in Bermuda, dated April 28, 1761.

"It is now, and has been for a Month past, very sickly in this Island, there being scarce People enough well to take Care of the Sick.—It is a violent inflammatory Disorder, never known in this Country before, and seizes upon all Ages, Constitutions and Complexions, and proves very mortal, especially to old People; and as many have died in one Fortnight, as at another Time in a whole Year.—There are four small Privateers from the France cruising in these Parts, and probably may pick up any Vessels from your Parts, bound to the West Indies: One of the Privateers is a Brig (as she appears to us) and has been in Sight of this Island for a Fortnight past; and last Week the Captain Bailey, in a Schooner, from Cape-Bay, with London, as near the Shore as she could do, without running on the Rocks: Captain Bailey escaped being taken, by running his Vessel among the Rocks, in a very hazardous Manner.

Thursday Morning last several Vessels arrived here in 22 Days from Quebec, by whom we learn, That the Garrison at the Place were in good Health, and had been so all Winter; having Plenty of Provisions and other Necessaries.

NEW-LONDON, May 29. Extract of a Letter from Mr. Andrew Thompson, late of this Town, to his Father here, dated London, March 9.

"Four Weeks after our Departure from New-York, in the Brigantine *Audrey*, Capt. Lawrence, we were taken by a French Privateer of 14 Guns. Our Captain and Party were immediately carried on board the Privateer, leaving in our Brig a young Lad, who was a Passenger, and myself: They then put 12 Frenchmen on board us, and two English Staves, Prisoners, to assist them to carry the Vessel to Bayonne, to which Place the Privateer belonged. After being in their Possession 14 Days (with the Assistance of these two, which made in all 4 of us) we fell upon them about 9 at Night, with an Ax, two Axes and a Pistol: We soon gained the Possession of the Cabin, leaving that of the Decks to them; they barred us down all Night, about 9 next Morning, we put a Brace of Balls through in of their principal Staves, on which they immediately called for Quarters, which was granted; at the same Time ordered them all up in the Foretop, and so bound them one after another as we allowed them to come down. After having them in Possession 14 Days, we, to our great Joy, arrived safe at Plymouth. In this Action we killed 3 of the Frenchmen, and wounded six. There were none of us hurt but myself, by being a little too forward in the Beginning of the Attack; however, I am in a Manner recovered, except a Cut over my left Eye with a Cutlass. We brought 9 Frenchmen into Plymouth, who are now all alive and well. When we were first taken, the Frenchmen stripped us of every Thing even to my Shoe-buckles, so I have lost Coat, Man's Clothes, &c. as they were all carried on board the Privateer: However, I expect our Loss will soon be made up, having already had the Offer of a Lieutenantcy, which I thought proper to refuse."

Besides the above, a Gentleman writes Mr. Thompson from New-York, That the Four were introduced to the Lords of the Admiralty, from whom they received Thanks, and a Gold Medal, for their Gallant Behaviour. Likewise that the Under-writers had made them a Present of a Quarter Part of the Vessel and Cargo.

VIENNA, March

ALL the Applications made to consent to a Peace have hitherto always prove ineffectual. Courts of London and Berlin Empress Queen in Possession far are we from the Thoughts every Thing hath been got ready with the view of a vigorous Campaign, from which we have no doubt shall not derive from it all the Advantages we have hitherto had in view, as it would totally disconcert our Operations; It is rumoured that the Court hath from Hungary, which advise that the Hospodars hath revolted, without assigning the Reason, but hath implemented the Protection of the Ottoman Empire of which the Turks design to assemble 10 or 15,000 Men in the Neighbourhood of Buda-Pesth. Empress Queen only waits for Confirmation of the Emperor's and General Buccow with 15,000 Men, to break up Bohemia.

Prague, March 22. M. Breglio, after staying at Gießen, has removed his Head Quarters to the city of Gießen, who are intrenching beyond the Ohm; but as they expect to be attacked, they have by way of Precaution, sent away Baggage to Fritzlart.

The Amsterdam Gazette says, that on the 22d of March the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick, in the Neighbourhood of Grunberg, was attacked by the French made 2600 Prisoners, 3 Colours, one Standard, and 12 Pieces of Cannon. According to other Accounts the French took officers, and 2 Officers, belonging to the Prince's Regiment.

Petersburgh, March 10. Tho' we have had some Peace here for some Time, we do not yet see any prospect of a Peace here for some Time; on the contrary, Things seem to announce a Campaign as before the preceding.

Prague, March 26. If the King of Prussia sends Forces in Saxony, General Laudohn will join with the greatest Part of his own; and John Count Daun, but nothing transpires as to the conduct of the Campaign. It is a fact that General Buccow is in Transylvania, in order to appease some small Troubles arisen in that Principality. We are also informed some little Disputes with the King of Saxony absolutely the Dutchy of Placentia, in the Treaty of Aix la Chapelle.—The Equity of the Marquisate of Finale, on Repayment of Twelve thousand Crowns to the Republic of Genoa. It is also to a certain Country that belonged formerly to the Emperor. The Infinitude of Count Czernicheff's Ministers also some Disquiet.

Erfurt, March 28. His Prussian Majesty is at Erfurt, to which Place he came, accompanied by Count Daun, and another Officer, without either Princes or Princes. It is believed he will leave the County to Prince Henry of Prussia, and that he will speedily put himself at the Head of his Forces.

Vienna, March 28. Gen. Buccow is gone to the Danube, to put a Stop to some Troubles there.

A Corps of 600 Banalists passed the Danube in the neighbourhood on Thursday Morning, going to join the King's Army in Saxony.

Our future Operations are so well combined with the Operations of the French, that we have Reason to expect the Success of our Arms. All our Armies are complete: The number of our Men more than they did in the last Campaign.

Leipsic, March 29. We are told that since March 29. we have retaken the Command of the Austrian Army at over the Elbe at Riefa, a Corps of about 6000 Men have taken post at Thalm, and pushed forward within a League of Meissen.

The Prussians are preparing to open the Campaign with a Coup d'Eclat.

Wynar, March 28. The Detachment of Prussian Troops which has been here for some Time, left us Yesterday for the purpose of raising between Two and Three Thousand Prussian Troops in its Neighbourhood, and taxed the Country with 10,000 Crowns by Way of Contribution.

The Magazine which the Prussians had established at Erfurt, is just transported to Lomatsch, two Miles from Erfurt.

Frankfurt, April 4. All Marshal Breglio's Operations are accomplished. There has not been any Thing done comparable, for military Science, to what he has done in the last two Months.—Perhaps there has never been so great since the famous Campaign of the immortal Turenne.

The Allies have repassed the Dymel, it's thought the French Troops will remain some Time in their Quarter, in Hesse. Their Chief will be very glad to have a little Reposé; tho' they have been contented

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
