BREAST, April 14

WE are no longer in Fennico. A certain Power the King has promised Liberty of Commerce of that Island, has introduced 3000 Men, with Provision for its Defence.

LONDON, May 2 It is said the French are so willing to put to the War, that if the Empress Queen concur in some advantageous Proposal, the Court of France proposes soon to make they will agree to a separate Peace, allow Liberty to assist the King of Prussia in a Manner we shall think proper.

May 6. Yesterday an Express arrived, and we hear has brought Advice, that our Troops had been five Days in want of Provisions, occasioned by hard Gale, which prevented their being supplied; but when the Express set sail, they were in a good Way, and our Batteries began to play on the Citadel of Paris, the French, to the Number of 3500, and have Plenty of Provisions and Ammunition, and it was thought would make a very good Defence.

Our Court, it is said, are so fully satisfied of the great Utility of our being Masters of Belleisle, the second Expedition now fitting out, either with a Reinforcement of five or six Regiments, and some Battalions.

The Truth of the Affair at Belleisle, relates to Capt. Osborne, is, that that Company of Erskine's Grenadiers, got upon the French, and defended themselves against 400 of them, they were reduced to 19 and their Capt. they had laid down their Arms, a French came up and killed our brave English Grenadier observing, told him Scoundrel, and then laying him dead on the ground, jumped down the Rock, and got safe on shore.

By a private Letter from Belleisle we are informed, that our Troops had marched seven Miles to the Place of Landing, without Opposition. Gen. Hodgson's Dispatches were sent a Number of the French Troops on the Island, judged to be about 5000, all of whom the Inhabitants, had retired with their Effects only fortified Town; and that as soon as Cannon should come up, our Forces would immediately besiege the Place in Form.

The Dutch Papers by Monday's Mail, a Cessation of Arms betwixt the Allied Armies was to commence the first of Month.

It is assured, that it has been unagreed, that a Suspension of Arms should be made, to prevent any Chicanery in the Courts concerned in the present War.

Upwards of 20,000 Ounces of Plate are to be got ready for the Plenipotentiaries to go to the Congress.

The Surrender of Guadaloupe, or any Acquisitions on the Continent of America, is absolutely denied.

It is also said, that one Article will be in the present Treaty take Place) that Orangeburgh shall be ceded to the Crown of Prussia. A Letter from Augsbourg, dated the 23d, says, "The Ambassadors of the Seven Crowns are to form the approaching Congress, which will be between the 1st and 7th of July."

It is said the French Court have proposed to render up the Island of Minorca, in Lieu of Gal and Goree; but this, it is said, occasions Objections.
