

Over France would evacuate Germany, and leave the Emperor Queen and the King of Prussia to determine the Disposition there.

Letters from Frankfurt, of the 5th Inst. say, that M. Brogh was determined to push his Operations with the utmost Vigour; and that the whole French Army was to be put in Motion on Wednesday of Monday.

From Briss they write, that the French Troops in the Neighbourhood of Denzick have received Orders to hold themselves ready to March; and that an Embargo was laid on all the French Ships.

On the 10th Inst. that the French lost in the Sally they made on Pondicherry, before mentioned, in Killed and Wounded, 1500 Men; and that it is impossible for the Place to hold out.

Other Letters advise, that the French Army, encamped near the Walls of Pondicherry, attacked ours (that was blockading the Place) at all their Posts at once, killed 10 or 12 Europeans, and between 20 and 30 Blacks, and made themselves Masters of two Pieces of Cannon; but were at length repulsed. Some Days after they made a second Attack upon our Troops, but were again repulsed. That our Army having received a Reinforcement of about 600 Men, attacked the French in their Turn, killed and wounded a considerable Number of them, took 25 Pieces of Cannon, and drove them into Pondicherry. On Major Munton's being wounded, Colonel Coote had taken the Command; but the Siege could not be made in Form, on Account of the approaching Monsoons, till about January (last) when they made no doubt but we should be Masters of that Place.

Our Ships were to remain before the Place, to prevent their receiving any Succour.

The last Letters from the Hague are not in the usual Style: The Dutch Politicians own themselves deceived by fine Words and fair Appearances, and seem to think the Return of Peace is by no Means so near at Hand as they imagined a fortnight ago.

His Majesty has ordered, that the Parliament be prorogued to the second of July.

The King has been pleased to fill up the vacant Stall at Westminster, of the most Honourable Order of the Bath, by conferring the Honour of Knighthood of that Order on Charles Osborne, Esq; Vice Admiral of the blue Squadron of his Majesty's Fleet.

The Morning was carried from his House, in Upper Grosvenor Street, in great Funeral Pomp, the Remains of the Right Honourable Lord Edgumbe, in order to be interred with his Ancestors at Mount-Edgumbe, in Devonshire.

The last Letters from Hambourg mention, that it was reported there that the King of Denmark had lent the 10,000 Men to the King of Prussia; that others said that those 10,000 Men were destined to join the Hanoverian Army, and act in Concert with Prince Ferdinand.

According to some Advices from Paris, the Chevalier de St. Croix, Commandant of Fort Palais, in the Island of Belleisle, reckoned he might hold out till the End of the present Month, and this in Hopes that the Duke d'Aquillon might find means to send him Succours.

The Troops of the King of Prussia, according to divers Letters, are as numerous, as fresh, and as well mounted, as if this Campaign was the first of the War.

Besides the Reinforcements sent to our Forces in Belleisle, there are already 12000 Regular Troops, without including Marines.

It is now said that the meeting of the Congress will be retarded by some Proposition made by the French Court, to which ours does not agree:—One Article is reported to be a Suspension of Arms for six Months by Sea as well as Land.

The Emperor's Queen makes but little Opposition to France's concluding a separate Peace with England, for certain political Reasons, which a short Time will shew.

Whether the Turks pour into Hungary, or fall upon Italy, the Scene of Blood and Devastation must be closed greatly to the Prejudice of the House of Austria.

We are well informed, that Hans Stanley, Esq; one of the Lords of the Admiralty, is to be at Dover on the 23d of this Month, on his Way to the Court of France and M. de Bully to be at Calais on the same Day, and as near the same Hour as possible, in order to embark for England.

They write from the Hague, of the 14th Instant, that by some Letters from Berlin they had Advice, that a Body of 6000 Russians had taken Possession of the City of Warsaw, which had caused a very great Consternation among the Inhabitants there.

We hear that a certain great Personage, Won, at the last Newmarket Meeting, of a Noble ****, to the Amount of 13,000 l. per Annum, and that the said Noble **** has since turned off Thirty of his Servants. [The Losing 13,000 Pounds a Year would make any thinking Man retrench in his Expences.]

BOSTON, July 9.

We don't find in the London Prints of the 14th of May any further Intelligence from Belleisle, than is already published; but we hear that one of the Mast-ships, which came out under Convoy of the Closterfield, and which is arrived at Piscataqua, on her Passage spoke with a Cutter, bound from Belleisle to England, which Advice that the British Troops had taken Fort-Palais Sword in Hand.—Which Report, with the following Extract of a Letter that came in Captain Allen, makes it probable that the whole Island is subjected to his Britannic Majesty.

Extract of a Letter from Liverpool, May 22, 1761. "There were private Letters To-day, which mention Fort-Palais, in Belleisle, was taken by Storm.—That we lost a Number of Men, and paid dearly for it. A Confirmation of this Piece of News is impatiently waited for."

Yesterday arrived here Capt. Cochran, in a Schooner from Newfoundland, who informs, that a French Frigate had been cruising there, and taken several Vessels belonging to Newfoundland, which were razed. In Captain Cochran came a Person who belonged to a Letter of Marque Ship, owned in Bristol, and failed from Ireland in the Spring, bound for Newfoundland; which Ship was attacked five Days after she left Ireland, by a French Privateer, and by some Means one of the Enemy's Grenades got into her Magazine, which blew her up, whereby the whole Crew was blown up, except five. The Captain of her was killed, and the Souls on board were 212 in Number.

July 13. Yesterday arrived here Captain Morton, in a Brig from Halifax, by whom we learn, that two Ships and a Sloop,

with Part of Colonel Thwings's Regiment of Provincials, were arrived there in five Days from this Place.

Extract of a Letter from St. Eustatia, June 16, 1761. "The six Indian, Commodore Douglas's went with his Ships, and a Number of Troops under Lord Rollo, before Rojau, in Dominica, and demanded of the Inhabitants to lay down their Arms, and receive an English Garrison, which they refused to accept: Lord Rollo then landed with his Men, took Possession of the Place, and abandoned it to three Days Plunder by the Soldiers, by which Means you may imagine but little was left in the Town after. The French Commandant, with two others of the leading Men, are on board our Ships, and are to be sent to Europe. The Inhabitants are to tarry there, and become English Subjects. It is thought they will proceed to all the Neutral Islands, and do the same; also to the Grenades.

A Transport from New-York, with 200 Soldiers and 24 Women on board, was last Week taken just going into Guadalupe, and carried into Martinico, by two 10 Gun Sloops.—There is no Exchange of Prisoners on either Side; the English send all to Europe, and the French keep all in Goal."

Thursday last a Snow arrived at Salem, in 17 Days from St. Eustatia, in whom came Passenger Captain Hall, of this Town, who was taken on his Passage from hence for Surinam, and was put on board a Dutchman bound to St. Eustatia, from whence he came in the above Snow: He informs, that the giving up Dominica to the Plunder of the Soldiers, was occasioned by their making Resistance to our Troops landing, whereby 30 of them were killed.

Last Saturday Se'night was sent into New-London the Prize Sloop St. Barnabas, Michael Gould, Master, taken off Cape Rose, near the Bite of Leoganne, the 20th of May, by the Captains Tucker and Bishop, in two St. Kitts Privateers: She was bound from Jamaica to Port au Prince, laden with Wine, Cheese, &c.

By Captain Folger we have Intelligence, that just before he left London, there were Orders sent to the several Commanders of Men of War, at their several Stations in the West-Indies, to forbid the Interrupting any further the Trade to Monto Christi, or the Capturing any Vessel on that Trade: Which Orders Capt. Folger imagines are in the West-Indies before this Time.—He further informs, that the Trade to Monto-Christi was now free and open; and that he saw the Clearances of divers Vessels from London for that Port, with several Sorts of Provisions.—He adds, that it was the Opinion of the principal Gentlemen, that those Vessels which have been taken on that Trade and condemned during the War with France, would be cleared.

NEW-YORK, July 16.

Tuesday last the Ship Friendship, Capt. Brookbank, arrived here in 32 Days from Morant Bay, in Jamaica. Soon after Captain Brookbank left Jamaica, he was boarded by a Boat from his Majesty's Ship the Hampshire, of 50 Guns, the Lieutenant of which informed him, that the Hampshire had lately fallen in with and taken a French Man of War of 74 Guns, in the Bite of Leoganne, very richly laden with Sugar, Coffee, Indigo, &c. bound from Port au Prince to Old France, and sent her to Jamaica. 'Tis said there was an immense Quantity of Indigo, &c. put on board this Ship, as the Enemy had great Dependence upon her outfalling any of our Ships of War, she being esteemed one of the best going Ships in the French Navy. Admiral Holmes, it is imagined, was on board the Hampshire.

Captain Brookbank further informs us, that on the 4th of July, in Lat. 31: 24, he saw a Wreck, which appeared to be a new Sloop, with her Stern and Quarters painted Green. She had a Windlass quite new, and steer'd in her Cabin. He endeavoured, but could not discover from whence she came. He imagines she had not then been long in that Condition.

July 20. Saturday Evening Captain Ptolemy arrived here in 16 Days from Antigua, and brings an Account, that his Majesty's Ship Repulse of 20 Guns, had lately carried in there a Ship of 20 Guns, from Martinico to Old France, loaded with 900 Hogsheds of Sugar; but that she was taken under Neapolitan Colours; that the Governor of Dominico was sent to England; that the Transports that lately failed from hence for Guadalupe, were laid up till the Hurricane Months were over, when it was not in the least doubted but that the Siege of Martinico would be undertaken, and that it was the general Opinion of the French themselves, the Island must fall, as they had not received any Supplies of Men from France as was currently reported; that the Martinico Privateers had very bad Success of late, our Men of War being very vigilant on their several Stations.

We hear that the five Vessels belonging to the Cork Fleet that were lately taken and carried into Port Louis, as lately mentioned in this Paper, were all Letters of Marque, and that they had left the Convoy in order to cruise in the Bite of Leoganne for Flags of Truce.

The Francis, Adams; the Phoenix, Miller; the Old Harbour, Dougherty; and the Rebecca, Dennis, transport Vessels in his Majesty's Service, arrived here on Friday last from Philadelphia. There are now between 25 and 30 Transports in the North River, and several more expected.

Letters by last Post from Albany, inform, that the Provincials continually passed forward through that City, to the several Posts where they are destined: That Captain Thody's Company equi-

barked on the 3d Instant from Oswego for Onongachie, where, 'tis said, he is to command: That General Gage's Light Infantry is to go to Detroit: That some few Indians at Niagara appeared lately a little Refractory, and gave out Threats, &c.

PHILADELPHIA, July 23.

By Captain Tilden, in a short Passage from Madeira, we have the following most agreeable Article, viz. "That on the 21st ult. in Lat. 28: 9, Long. 42 West from London, he was on board the Snow London, Captain George Baker, a Packet belonging to the East-India Company, going Express to England, with the News of Pondicherry's surrendering to the English on the 17th of January last; which Place Captain Baker left the 11th of February, and had some French Officers on board his Vessel."

The Sally, Captain Small, from this Port for Jamaica, is taken and carried to Hispaniola.

On Saturday last arrived here Capt. Penniston, from Bermuda. The Night before he failed, a Boat came in full of People, that had been lately taken off of that Place.

Since our last Captain Laveroch, from Lisbon, arrived here. On his Passage, near Bermuda, he was taken by a Frigate, Snow and Brig, and ransomed for Seventeen Hundred Pounds Sterling. The same Vessels had before taken Capt. Aiken, from Virginia for Antigua.

ANNAPOLIS, July 30.

On Tuesday last arrived here from London, but last from Falmouth, Captain Joseph Richardson, in the Snow Friendship. She came out with our Fleet, but springing a Leak, put back to rest.

Capt. Richardson left Falmouth on the 17th of May, in Company with the General Wall Packet for New-York, and the Prince George Packet for Lisbon.

On the 19th of May, in the Morning, about 20 Leagues to the Westward of Ufant, Captain Richardson fell in with, and came through, a Fleet of Ships consisting of 4 Sail of English Men of War, and 60 Transports, who were on their Return from Belleisle to Portsmouth, having subdued and taken the whole Island, with the Loss of about 1500 Men during the Expedition, and had then the French Garrison on board. The other Prisoners which they took, were sent from Belleisle to l'Orion; and the English Forces were left to Garrison the Place, with 5 Sail of the Line, and 3 Frigates, to Guard the Island.

On the Morning of the Day that Capt. Richardson came into our Capes, he descried a Ship and a Schooner in Company, at a good Distance from him, but the Schooner left the Ship, gave him Chace, and gain'd upon him fast; but he, crowding Sail, got into the Capes when the Schooner was about a Mile from him, and then she tack'd about and made Sail back again towards the Ship. She was a black Bottom'd Schooner, and had Four Ports on a Side.

As many People are at a Loss to know what Day the Provincial Court was adjourn'd to, this is to inform them that it is adjourn'd to Monday the 31st of August next.
