CADIZ, April 13.
THE Squadron which the King ordered
to be equipped in our Port, set sail
last Tuesday with a fair Wind: It
consists of six Ships of the Line, and
a Flute laden with Gun-powder.
This Squadron has some Land Forces on board,
and is bound to the Havannah; but one of the
Ships is to part from it in a certain Latitude, and
proceed to Vera Cruz, whither she carries a great
Quantity of Quick Silver, which begins to be
wanted in that Colony.

For two or three Weeks past a Gang of Villains
has infested this Place; they are masked and well
armed; they enter People's Houses in the Night,
and murder those who make any Resistance, and
carry off every thing that is not too heavy for them.
These Miscreants very lately broke open the House
of a rich Merchant, who was at Supper with some
of his Friends, and his Wife and Children: They
murdered Part of the Company and locked up the
Rest in a Cellar; after which they sat down with-
out the least Concern by the dead Bodies, and
drank up several Bottles of Wine; then pillaged
the House, and made off. The Punishment for
such Wretches is too mild in Spain; Imprisonment,
which is oftentimes the only one they undergo, not
being a sufficient Check to the Commission of such
Crimes. We shall soon have all our public Roads
infested by other Vagabonds, Bohemians, known
here by the Name of Gitanos, who were banished
the Kingdom by the late King, but are said to be
returning from the Island of Fermentaro where
they had taken Refuge.

LONDON, May 5.
The Lord Anson Transport, lying off the Red-
House, Deptford, which was formerly the old
Centaur Man of War, the last of six large Trans-
ports to carry 1800 Soldiers, with six Months Pro-
visions, is ordered to sail forthwith for Portsmouth,
to receive the Troops on board, and join the Con-
voy; but upon what Service not known.

Three Martinico Ships, and three French Tur-
key Ships, are taken.
The French Ambassador at Stockholm has pre-
sented to the Diet a Memorial, wherein he makes
a great Parade of the fine Dispositions of all the
Belligerent Powers for putting an End to the War,
but at the same Time sets forth, "How necessary
it is, in Circumstances so important, to reinforce
the Swedish Army, and to put it in a State to pursue
its Operations efficaciously, as the only Means of
advancing the Negotiations at the intended Con-
gress."

There has been a desperate Engagement in the
Canal of Malta, between six Maltese Vessels, and
five of Tripoli, wherein two of the latter were
sunk, and one, of 20 Guns, taken.

May 9. They write from Hamburgh, that on
the 21st ult. a Prussian Detachment came to demand
a Contribution of 80,000 Crowns from the Town
of Jever, situated in the County of Oldenbourg,
belonging to the Prince of Anhalt Zerbst; Notice
of which was immediately sent to the King of
Denmark, to whom Oldenbourg belongs.

They write from Vienna of the 18th ult. that
they had a certain Account, that Gen. Laudohn
had an Army of 35,000 Men under his Command
in Silesia; and that 30,000 Russians were tra-
versing Poland to join him, after which Junction
they would be able to face the King of Prussia.

An Order is sent from the Lords of the Treasury
to the Officers of the Mint, to coin 100,000 l. in
7s. Pieces of Gold, on a Dye of his present Ma-
jesty.

M. de Bussey, first Clerk of the Department for
foreign Affairs, is expected here from France, to
execute a Commission previous to the Meeting of
the Congress.

All the general Officers, and others, who were
at Paris, were ordered to set out the first Week in
this Month for their Corps in Germany.

We hear that eight Men more will, in a few
Days, be draughted out of each Company in the
Three Regiments of Foot-Guards, in order to be
sent to Germany.

May 12. They write from Brussels of the 4th,
that the reiterated Enterprize of the English upon
Belleisle, just at the Time that a Congress was
agreed on, and they were treating about a provi-
sional Suspension of Arms, seemed to have alienated
the pacific Disposition of the Court of France; and
that a Courier, whom the Duke de Choiseul dis-
patched on the 24th ult. to the Prince de Gallitzin
the Russian Ambassador at London, was charged
with a Letter to that Lord, praying him to inform
the British Ministry, that their Manner of Proceed-
ing, in the present Circumstances, was not very
proper to establish the Confidence which must be
the Basis of all Negotiations; and the said Courier's
Dispatches, they further say, tended to determine
definitively, whether, during the holding of the
future Congress, the Operations should be continu-
ed, or a Suspension of Arms take place before the
15th of May.

A very grand Equipage is preparing for Lord
Egremont, who goes as one of his Majesty's Ple-
nipotentiaries to the Congress of Augsborg. A
fine State-Coach is making, and near finished, and
there are purchased three Sets of the finest Horses
that England can produce.

Some fine Brass Cannon, of very light Weight,
are finished in the Tower, and preparing to be sent
into Germany. There are likewise two grand
Pieces, forty-two Pounders, now curiously engra-
ved, with the Arms and Titles of his present Ma-
jesty, with many curious Devices, and the Arms
of Lord Ligonier.

Eight beautiful Horses, all brought up in this
Kingdom, are now training up here for the Use of
General Yorke, in his Embassy to the Congress at
Augsborg.

It is said several Officers of the Customs in Lon-
don, who have accepted of superior Places in the
Custom-House at Quebec, together with many
private Families, a Reinforcement of Troops, and
a great Quantity of military Stores, will shortly
sail for that Place; as will several other Families
and Stores for Guadaloupe.

ST. JAGO DE LA VEGA (Jamaica) May 30.
On Tuesday arrived from a Cruise his Majesty's
Ship Trent, John Lindsay, Esq; Commander, and
brought in with her a French Polacca outward
bound, with a Cargo of Wine and Dry Goods.

The same Day arrived the Brigantine Prince of
Wales, from Virginia, which was taken in her
Passage by a French Privateer, of six 9 Pounders,
12 Swivels, and 60 Men. Nine Frenchmen were
put on board the Brig, to conduct her into the
Cape: But Mr. Archdeacon, of Kingston, who
with two other Englishmen were left Prisoners on
board, took a favourable Opportunity of attacking
the nine Frenchmen, and quickly obliged them to
take to the Boat, then gave them some Provisions,
and made Shift to navigate the Brig safe into Port,
after she had been five Days in Possession of the
Enemy.

June 6. On Sunday arrived the Othello, Cap-
tes, from Africa; and the Hawk private Ship of
War, Capt. Brown, from a Cruise, having taken
several Prizes.

June 20. Last Saturday arrived in a Flag of
Truce from Hispaniola, Captains Hamilton, of
the Lady Juliana, Creighton, of the Shirley, De-
verton, of the Thomas, belonging to London;
Captains Whitlow, of the Cunliffe, and Cook, of
the Brig George, belonging to Liverpool; being
Part of the last Fleet from Cork, taken by two
French Frigates, of 32 and 34 Guns, off Porto
Rico, the 20th of April last, and carried into
Port Louis.

Also came down in the said Flag of Truce, Capt.
Keiling, of the Snow Prince Ferdinand, belonging
to New-York, taken coming from Coracoa by a

French Privateer of 14 Guns. And Captain
M'Gulpin, Commander of a Carolina Vessel.

The abovementioned Vessels from Cork were
unloaded by the French at Port Louis with the ut-
most Dispatch, and their Impatience to make speed-
y Sale of the Cargoes, induced them to sell Mefs
Beef, Tongues, &c. at a Pistole a Barrel; being,
it is said, in great Fear of some of our Men of
War going in there.

On the 3d Instant sailed from Port Louis, two
French Ships of the Line, and the two Frigates
abovementioned, deeply laden with Indico for Old
France: They cruized off the Port all Day, and
in the Night bore away. Many Persons have con-
jectured, that these Vessels intend to intercept our
Fleet homeward bound, of whose precise Time
of sailing they long had Notice. The French
Commodore communicated in Confidence to a
Gentleman since arrived here, that he had Orders
to cruize in the North-American Passage six Weeks.
This, however, is looked upon as a Finesse, and
it is supposed that they went round the Cape to
join other Vessels ready to sail, and would make
the best of their Way home, without looking for
Prizes, as they were so deeply laden.

On Tuesday arrived at Port Royal his Majesty's
Ship the Centaur, Arthur Usher, Esq; Comman-
der, and brought in with her a French Ship named
the Sainte Anne, pierced for 60, but carrying 40
Guns, with 350 Men; taken by the Hampshire
and Centaur on Sunday last, bound from Petit-
Guave to Brest, laden with Sugar, Indico, &c.
estimated worth 80,000 l.

CHARLES-TOWN, (South-Carolina,) June 27.

No Advices have been received from the Army
commanded by Colonel Grant since the 13th In-
stant, which were dated the 5th: But there are
some Letters this Week from Fort Prince George,
and of the 12th, which mention the whole crossing
Keoowee River, and marching forward early in
the Morning on the 7th (Lieut. Col. Laurens with
them) leaving there only 120 Invalids, in Lieu of
the old Garrison, with Capt. John Campbell, of
Col. Burton's; since which no more Intelligence
had been received from or concerning them, than
if there was no Army in the Country, altho' some
Cherokees daily passed and repassed to and from
the Fort, where Capt. Mackintosh still commands.
The Indians who surrendered themselves, and
obtained Col. Grant's Permission to plant at Keo-
wee, remained quiet there; they exceeded 100,
with very few Men amongst them, but the Tale
of Estatowih was of the Number.

Twelve Indians, said to be Creeks, are just
come to Town, but their Errand is supposed to be
of no Consequence. Perhaps they are only come in
Expectation of some Presents, which is the general
Business of that Nation.

Col. Byrd, with 1000 effective Men, besides
Officers, is said to have marched the 15th of last
Month from Augusta County in Virginia, to meet
Col. Grant in the Cherokees Country.

July 4. The Indians who came to Town last
Saturday are still here; they are Creeks.—For
want of an Interpreter their Business is not known.

July 11. Letters received from Augusta, dated
the 30th ult. advise, that most of the Chicasahs
who went from thence in April and May last, to
join the Army commanded by Colonel Grant, on
the present Expedition against the Cherokees, had
returned thither some Days before, and brought in
two Indian Scalps, which they pretended to have
got by surprizing a small Town in the Cherokee
Nation: And that they reported as follows, "That
on the fourth Day of the Army's March from Keo-
wee (say 10th of June) they were attacked by the
Cherokees, who fired upon them, unseen, from
Morning till Noon, killed 24 Men, and wounded
55 more; but that the Rangers being ordered to
surround the Place whence the Smoke was perceiv-
ed to issue; most of the Cherokees in that Ambus-
cade were either cut to Pieces by them, or tram-
