*Island of BELLEISLE*  
SIR.—I have the Honour to acquaint you that the Citadel of Palais surrendered Yesterday to the Arms. This Letter, and the Capitulation, I do Honour to send you by the Hands of Major Rook inform you of every Particular, relative to the same may think fit to lay before his Majesty's Honour to be, &c.

**CAPITULATION of the Citadel of BELLEISLE** made June 7, 1761.

**PRELIMINARY ARTICLE.**  
THE Chevalier de St. Croix, Brigadier in the Army, and Commandant of the Citadel of Palais, shall surrender on the 12th of June, in Case no Succours arrive before that Time; the mean While, no Works shall be carried on, nor any Act of Hostility, nor any Communication between the English besieging, and the French besieged.

Art. 1. The entire Garrison shall march out with the Honours of War, Drums beating, flying, lighted Matches, and three Pieces of Cannon, twelve Rounds each. Each Soldier to have fifty in his Cartouch-Box. All the Officers, Sergeants, and Inhabitants, are to carry off their Baggage, and to go with their Husbands.

Art. 2. Two covered Waggon shall be provided for the Officers, which they carry shall be deposited in the Citadel, which are not to be visited.

Art. 3. The covered Waggon are refused, but the Chevalier shall transport all the Baggage to the Continent, by the first fair Wind.

Art. 4. The French Troops that are to embark shall be furnished for carrying their Troops, by the shortest Way, into the nearest Port, by the first fair Wind.

Art. 5. When the Troops shall be embarked, they shall be furnished for the Chevalier de St. Croix, by the King's Army, to M. de la Ville, the King's Monsieur de la Garique, Colonel of Foot, with the Commandant, in the Absence of Chevalier de la Ville, to the Field-Officers, including three of the Artillery; as also for the three Pieces of Cannon as for the Soldiers of the Court Royale, to be transported, with their Wives, Servants, and the Baggage they have in the Citadel, which is not to be visited, and to be furnished in the same Proportion with the Officers of the same Rank.

Art. 6. After the Expiration of the Term mentioned in the first Article, a Gate of the Citadel shall be delivered to the Troops of his Britannic Majesty; at which Gate a French Guard of equal Number, until the Troops shall march out to embark. Those Guard ordered to permit no English Soldier to enter, nor Soldier to go out.

Art. 7. A Gate shall be delivered to the Troops of his Majesty the Moment the Capitulation is signed, and the Number of French Troops shall occupy the same Gate.
