Extract of a Letter from the Camp of the Prussians, dated the 2d of this Month. The Prussians had passed the Vistula; and the Army of the King, which consisted of 20,000 Men, were marching towards Posen; that which had been left behind, was advanced to Memel.

Extract of a Letter from the Camp at Crown-Point, dated July 24.

"Our Employ here is working at the Fort: We have had the following regular Regiments. I give them as they arrived here from Canada, viz. The 40th Regiment, 400 or Royal Highlanders, 2 Battalions, 15th, 35th, 28th, 42d, 43d, 3d Battalion of Royal Americans expected, but not arrived; the 27th, who are garrisoned here, and as far down as Lake George. Each Regiment remains here about 3 Weeks or a Month. The 40th, 1st and 2d Battalions of Royal Highlanders, and 15th have marched to New-York, in the same Order they came; the rest expect to follow successively. Provincial Regiments here are the two Connecticut complete 200 New-Hampshire, and but 100 of the Massachusetts yet arrived. The Plan of the Fort is so large that it can scarcely be completed this Year."

Capt. Thodey's Company, we hear, is safe arrived at Oswego. And that a Negro Man is to be hanged this Day at Albany for the Murder of a White Man.

PHILADELPHIA, August 13.

Private Letters from London, by the Packet, mention, That the French have agreed to cede all North-America and Gaudeloupe to us, and to ratify the same at the Conclusion of the Treaty of Peace, without so much as making Mention thereof at the ensuing Congress; only they want some Land North of the River St. Lawrence, to cure Fits on 3 burthe English, knowing them to be bad encroaching Neighbours don't chuse they should have a Foot: And that Peace seems at a Distance.

Captain Tull, who arrived here last Week from Tenerife, on the 18th ult. in Lat. 29, Long. 64, spoke with Capt. Fetter, in a Brig belonging to Liverpool, bound from the Coast of Africa to South-Carolina or Virginia, with 125 Slaves on board all well.

We hear from New-York, that the Halifax Packet is now under Sailing Orders.

Last Saturday a Negro Lad was Tried at the adjourn'd County Court in Talbot, for Breaking a Store belonging to Col. Lloyd some Time ago, found Guilty, and received sentence of Death.

Peros, 35 or 40 Years of Age, a well-set, of about 5 Feet 8 Inches high, yellowish complexion, with a very full round Face, black Beard, his Speech is something broken, but not in so great a Degree as is remarkable: He had on when he was sold a dark colour'd Cloth Coat, a white Linen Coat, white Breeches and white Stockings.

Jack, 30 Years (or thereabouts) old, black, well made Fellow, of near 6 Feet tall, with Cuts down each Cheek, in the Country Market, his Feet are large (or requires a great Shoe: The Cloathing in cannot be well ascertained, but it is in his common working Dress, such as a Waistcoat (of which he had a new One Breeches, and Osabrig Shirt.

Peros, aged 25 or 30, well set, and of a good Figure, thin jaw'd, his hair is curling and mild sharp, his Back, if right, is black, has many small Marks or Dots on both Shoulders down to his Waist, and his Head was close shaved: Had on a black and white Waistcoat, black or dark colour'd Breeches, and Osabrig Shirt.

Peros, 23 or 25 Years old, a black well made Fellow, 5 Feet 8 or 9 Inches high, round face, with broad Teeth before, the Skin of his Face, is coarse, and inclined to be pimply, he has a distinguishing Mark that can be readily carried with him his common working Dress, an old Osabrigs Coat made Frock with The two last of these Negroes were from an African Ship in August 1759, and very broken and unintelligible English; and one, Jack, is Countryman to those speaks pretty good English, having been 7 Years in the Country. The other, Peros, much better than either, indeed has little Country Dialect left, and is esteemed a judicious Negro.

As they went off without the least Satisfaction, or Difference with any Body, the least angry Word or Abuse from their Neighbourhood, but steer some direct (which cannot even be guessed at) in His Escape: Or, perhaps, as the Negro Peros lived many Years about Williamsburg, and William County, and Jack in Middlesex, possibly bend their Course to one of those

Whoever apprehends the said Negroes, the Subscriber may readily get them, shall be taken up in this County, Forty Shillings, beside what the Law allows; and any greater Distance, or out of the County, proportionable Recompence paid them, he will be rewarded.
