L O N D O N, May 28.

The following Declaration of the French King to Sweden, delivered by his Ambassador at Stockholm the 4th of February, seems to have laid the Foundation of Negotiations which have since been carried on for a Congress; and is in itself a State-Paper of some

THE Most Christian King, moved by the Duties of his Majesty, and the Duties of his Majesty, thinks it his Duty to inform his Allies, and particularly the King and Crown of Sweden, of the Situation in particular over whom he reigns, makes him that all his Allies would concur with him in restoring to Europe.

As to the adjusting of the Differences which France and Great-Britain only, his Majesty will allow his Moderation on that Head, when Great-Britain shows any Disposition to listen to reasonable Terms. For which Reason, his Majesty is principally desirous to see his very faithful Allies his Sentiments on a man War; both as a Guarantee of the Peace of Europe, and relative to the Obligations he hath entered into with the Emperor of Russia, and the King of Sweden. In the Course of this War, his Majesty Christian King, and the Emperor of Russia, have done their utmost to support the Three Religions established in the Kingdom of Prussia, and to the necessary Measures for opposing, with a Force, the Invasions of the Prussians, and weaken the King of Prussia so much, as to leave no room to his future Enterprises.

Nothing now remains to complete the full Discharge of these Obligations, but to procure Indemnification to the King of Poland and the Empress Queen. His Majesty applies, with the utmost Franchise, to the King and Crown of Sweden, and to his other Allies, to settle these Indemnifications on a solid Foundation, to consult together on the Nature of them, and the Means of their being obtained. And on this Occasion he thinks it indispensably necessary to consider how the Indemnifications demanded may be consistent with the Guarantees of the Treaty of Westphalia. The Treaty doth not oblige them to sacrifice the essential Part of their own Dominions to procure such ample Indemnification as the injured Powers may think themselves entitled to.

However sacred the Engagements his Majesty is entered into may be, still they are subject to the Nature of Possibility. As soon as the Security sought appears as Object not near, the Allied Powers ought to concur to one another their inmost Thoughts, in order to take in Concert, without Breach of their Engagements, Resolution to put an End, by a Treaty of Peace, to the calamities of War; and to prefer the Welfare of their Allies to the Glory and Advantages they may derive from the War, especially as Experience hath too often shown the most just, and the best concerted Schemes, his Majesty, has been defeated by the Caprice of Fortune.

In the present Situation of the Alliance, the Opinion, that common Humanity, and a Regard to the general Welfare, require his Allies to concert with him, to declare, to which all the Members of the Alliance may give their Consent; and to labour to settle, if possible, the Bonds of Alliance between France, and Crown of Sweden, the Empress Queen, and that of Russia.

His Majesty doth not think it possible for the ensuing Campaign to change the Situation of the Affairs of Europe, or to procure the necessary Indemnification of the several Powers, and the greatest Difficulty, after all these Disasters and Calamities, is to be made in Germany more advantageous to the Power of France, than at present; all these Things induce him to declare, that he is constrained to lessen his Subsidies to the King of Sweden, and to discontinue the Sources of his Finances; so that his Majesty thinks, in case the War should continue, an exact Compliance with the Letter of his Engagements.

The Sum of the whole is, That in Return for the Assistance which his Majesty expresses towards the King of Sweden, that Crown would immediately declare its Alliance with his Majesty, and that the King of Sweden, and his Majesty, for the Welfare of Europe, would consent to sacrifice his personal Interests, and Christian Majesty is determined to do; being otherwise involved, in case the Enemies of the Alliance should enter into his pacific Views, to employ, jointly with his faithful Allies, his whole Force to compel them to put themselves in a Situation suitable to the Strength, and the great Object in View.

Two Days after the Delivery of this Memorial to Sweden gave for Answer, That it was his Majesty's wish to join with the most Christian King, and his other
