tance from each other, (the Mouth of one of them was at least 50 Yards long) from all Parts of which proceeded Bellowings like Thunder, and vast Quantities of red hot Stones and Flakes of Fire; and all round about was a large burning Lake, out of which proceeded feveral Rivers, the principal Ones directing their Courses about N. W. The larger Stones fell generally near the Place from whence they issued, but the smaller Ones were thrown up to an incredible Height, and by the Wind were forced on one Side, which had already raised three large Hills. The Cluttering of the Stones in the Air, the terrible Thunderings from below the Lake, Rivers of Liquid Fire, and the Earth continually shaking under our Feet, produced a Scene too dreadful to be described.
When we had taken a View of this, we joined our
Company, and went to the North West Side to fee the Rivers of Fire: The three large Ones were near a Mile in Breadth, and all directed their Course towards the Town of Biscouto. As the Country was almost even, the Motion of the two last was very flow; but the first had run near two Leagues from the Vulcano, and was got into a more declining Ground, which made its Motion fwifter. It is impossible to express the Consternation and Distresses of the Inhabitants of this Part of the Island, particularly those of Biscouto: The first River was almost entering their Town, which they had already abandoned; and the two others that came behind, threatened to overwhelm the adjacent Country; for they run in a Head of at least four Yards high, and lest no Sign of either Tree or House that stood in their Way. This was the State of Things on the 23d. But on the 24th, it pleased the Almighty to abate the Force of the Fire, and foon after the Rivers began to have a flower Motion: They moved along however for several Days, and Part of the first entered the Town of Biscouto, where it burnt about one Third of the Houses, and then directed its Course into a Valley on one Side, where it continued its Motion four or five Days."

By a Letter fince the above, the Trembling of the Earth was over, and every Thing quiet as before. [Tercera, one of the Azores, or Western-Islands, lies in the Latitude of 38:53, (the fine with the Rock of Lisbon) and Longitude 19:28 W. from the Lizard. The same Day, the 31st of March, which they had the remarkable Flowing and Ebbing of the Sea, at Tercera, they had it in Barbados, about Four o'Clock Afternoon.]

When the Algerine Ambassador made his pub-

A Rumour prevails at Hamburgh, which pof fibly may not be destitute of Foundation, that the Russians finding Breslau and Colberg both in a much better Situation than they expected, and than they were represented to be by the Austrians, have resolved to make one vigorous Attack upon each; and if these Attempts do not succeed, to retura into Winter-quarters; from an Apprehenfion, that if there is another Campaign, they may have more Enemies to deal with than they have at present.

Sept. 8. They write from Stockholm, that their Fleet is ready to fail from Carlscroon to join that of Russia. It consists of one Ship of 70 Guns, two of 60, one of 56, two of 50, one of 36, one of 30, an Hospital Ship, a Victualler, and two Flotes.

General Amarkan neral Amherst, to nominate him to be One of the Knights Companions of the most Honourable Order of the Bath; and it being necessary that he should be invested with the Enfigns of the faid Order, which are transmitted to him, by this Opportunity; I am to fignify to You the King's Pleasure, that You should perform that Ceremony; and it being His Ma-

jesty's Intention, that the same be done in the most honourable- and distinguished Manner that Circumstances will allow of, You will concern, and adjust with General Amherst, such Time, and Manner, for investing him with the Enfigns of the Order of the Bath, as shall appear to You most proper for shewing all due Respect to the King's Order, and as may, at the same Time, mark in the most public Manner, His Majesty's just Sense of the constant Zeal, and " fignal Abilities, which General Amherst hu exerted in the Service of His King and County.
