The Allies have repaired the Fortifications of Munfter, furnished them with Artillery, augmented the Garrison, and are forming a Flying Army of Horse, Dragoons and Hussirs, who will take the Field as foon as the Scason will permit.

Extract of a Letter from Hamlurgh, March 26. " Six Thousand Danes are already encamped within a League of Lubeck; and we are informed, that before their Arrival, a Russian Party was feen at a little Distance from that City. This made the Magistrates resolve to keep the Gates shut during almost two Days and two Nights, and to double the Guards and the advanced Posts. The King of Prussia likewise hath demanded of the Magistrates of Lubeck, the young Fellows of the Dutchy of Mecklenbourg, who were enrolled among his Troops, and made their escape into their City; but they refused to deliver them up. Mean while, the Clouds that threaten Denmark still increase; and scarce any Hope is left, that an amicable Accommodation can be accomplished. The Number of Recruits that are raising for the Service of Denmark exceeds Belief. All the young Fellows enter Volunteers. We are affured, that the Militia of Denmark will be embodied; and that a Body of Volunteers is to be raifed at Altena, equal in Number to the Body of Hussars, which is almost complete; their Number amounting already to 1800. The King of Denmark hath published a general Amnesty in Favour of all Deserters from his Troops, with Leave for them to join any Regiment they please. It is thought that by the End of April he will have an Army of 50,000 Men ready to take the Field."

NEW-YORK, May 31 Saturday Afternoon His Majesty's 46th Regiment arrived here from Albany. And, Several Vessels with Connecticut Provincial

Troops arrived here fince our last.

Yellerday the Captains Doran and Tallman arrived here in 20 Days from Antigua: By them we have Advice, that a Number of Negroes belonging to that Island had concerted a Scheme in order to become their own Masters, but the Plot being discovered, they were taken proper Care of.

PHILADELPHIA, June 3.
In a late Letter from London, by the last Ships, a
Gentleman writes as follows:

" The Operations of the War are carrying on with their former Vigour; and a great Fleet is just failed, in all Probability, to attack the Spaniards in some of their distant and most valuable Settlements, which must quickly bring them to Reason. Affairs in Germany, by the Death of the Czarina, are like to take a favourable Turn. In that Part of the World all Sides are sufficiently tired of the War, where, it is generally agreed, the next Campaign will be the last. Thus all Things go on as well as we could reasonably expect. It is true, the protracting the War, at any Rate, at a Time when we thought ourselves at the Eve of a Peace, somewhat alarmed us; but we are nothing daunted, and unanimous to proceed with him, her or them, an Account of every Dog and Bitch to

Spirit; having the Satisfaction to know, that our Enimies have far greater Reason to wish for a Period to the Calamities of War than we."

On Tuesday last arrived here the Snow Two Friends, Capt. Ireland, from the Isle of May, by whom we are informed, that a French 40 Gun Ship, bound to the East-Indies with Stores, ran ashore on St. Vincents, one of the Cape de Verd Islands, and was entirely lost: That Admiral Saunders, with 18 Sail of the Line, 3 Fire Ships, 5 Bombs, and as many Frigates and Sloops as made his Number about 36 Sail, was cruising in the Gutt of Gibraltar, the 18th of March, for the Toulon and Carthagene Squadrons, having received Advice of their Junction, and being at Sea; their joint Force faid to be 12 Ships of the Line, Frigates: That they had Advice at Gibraltar, that the English Vessels in Spanish Ports were discharged; and those at Malaga, with the English Conful, expected daily at Gibraltar: And that the Bellona Frigate, on her Passage from England for Gibraltar, off of Bayonne, fell in with and took a French Merchantman, of 24 Guns, belonging to Marseilles

With Captain Ireland came Passenger Captain Byvanck, of the Brig John, of New-York, who was taken on his Passage for the Coast of Guiney, by a Privateer Brig from Martinico, between the

River Senegal and Cape Verd.

By Captain Hazelwood, from Martinico, we learn, that when Admiral Pocock left that Island, he had about 12 Thousand Land Forces with him but that he was to touch at Antigua and St. Chriftophers, where it was faid, he would get a Reinforcement of between two and three Thousand Men more, white and black, and expected a Regiment of Blacks from Jamaica: That General Rufane was left at Martinico, with about 5000 Men: And that two large French Ships, bound to the Mississippi, and a Spanish Ship of 16 Carriage Guns, have been lately carried in there by our Men of War.

In a Letter from Martinico, dated May 11, it is faid, " The Inhabitants here seem now quite fatisfied with their Condition; and indeed they have Reason, for they are indulged in every Thing they defire, and I believe never were fo happy before."

His Excellency General Monckton failed from Martinico for Antigua the ninth ult. from whence he was foon to fail for his Government of New-

The Sloop Rachel, Captain Walker, from Bermuda was taken by a Spanish Galley at Turks Island, and burnt.

E it Established and Ordained, by the Mayor, Recorder, Alderman and Common-Council of the City of Annapolis, and the Authority of the same, That there shall be paid for every Dog belonging to the Inhabitants of this City, or the Preceinchs thereof, and commonly kept within the same, the Sum of Five Shillings Current Money; and for every Bitch belonging to the Inhabitants of this City, or the Precinchs thereof, and commonly kept within the same, the Sum of Ten Shillings Current Money; to be paid respectively by the Matter, Mistress or Owner of such Dog or Dogs, Bitch or Bitches, on or before the single Day of Normalization

Mailer, Mistress or Owner of such Dog or Dogs, Bitch or Bitches, on or before the first Day of November, and so yearly and every Year, to the Sheriss of this City for the Time being, sor the Use of this Corporation.

And be it furiber Ordained and Established, by the Authority aforsaid. That it shall and may be lawful to and for the Gate-Keeper of this City for the Time being, and he is hereby obliged and required, between the sirst Day of June and the tenth Day of August next ensuing, and so yearly and every Year, to repair to each and every House-Keeper within the same, or the Precincts thereof, or in Case of his or their Absence, to some other of the Family, and demand and take from him, her or them, an Account of every Dog and Bitch to

eich and every of them, or any Ferson in the Family, respectively belonging and kept as afurefaid, and two fair Life, or Accounts of the same to make out, and one of them, since by him, to deliver to the Clerk of the Mayor's Court on the tenth Day of September next, and so yearly and every Year, to be by him kept for the Use of the Corporation, and the other Life or Account, signed by him, to be at the fame time delivered, and so yearly, on or before the same time delivered, and so yearly, on or before the same time being, who is hereby anthoused, impowered and tenth Day of September, to the Shenis of this Cop for the Time being, who is hereby anthoused, impowered and required, according to such List or Account, to Collect the Taxes aforesaid respectively, and the same to pay in such Manner, and to such Persons, as by the Corporation sails be ordered and directed; and on Refusal or Neglect of Payment of such Tax, at or upon the Time aforesaid, by the Party charged therewith, the same to execute and diffrain for, as in Case of Public or County Levies; for which Collection and Payment as aforesaid, the said Sheriff shall be allowed to keep and retain to his own Use, the Sum of Five per Cert, and no more, and so pro rate for a greater or less Sum. And in Case he shall resule or neglect to discharge his Duty aforesaid, he shall forfeit and pay for every such Offence, the Sum of Forty Shillings Current Money aforesaid.
