I R E L A N D.

A succinct Account of a Set of Miscreants in the Counties of Waterford, Cork, Limerick, and Tipperary, called Bugbelen Barvins (i. e. White Boys) the Children of Sive Oultaugh (i. e. Sarah Ulster) being an Extract of a Letter from a Gentleman residing in Teughball, to his Son in London.

THEIR first Rise was in October last, and they have ever since been increasing; they then, and all along, pretended their assembling was to do Justice to the Poor, by restoring the ancient Commons, and redressing other Grievances; for which Purpose they always assembled in the Night, with their Shirts over their Cloaths, which caused them to be called White Boys; their Number in the County of Waterford, is computed to 6 or 700. They have done infinite Damage in the County, levelling Ditches, and Stone Walls, rooting up Orchards, &c.

On the 11th ult. I saw several Ditches they had levelled, Part of an Orchard destroyed, and two Graves they had dug, on the Road between Clonmell and Coppoquin; the Graves were to hold those that did not comply with their Orders. Some Time before this, they came by Night into the Town (a large Village) of Coppoquin, where is a Horse Barrack, drew up in the Green near the Barrack, fired several Shot, and marched by the Centry with their Piper playing, The Lad with the white Cockade.

The 13th I saw a Bier, near Assane Church, which they had caused two Days before to be made, to carry People alive, and bury them in those Graves. An Esquire at Coppoquin, when a Bachelor, agreed with a Peasant for the Use of his Daughter, for which he passed the Peasant his Bond for 100 l. but on the Esquire's entering the matrimonial State, he was compelled to take up his Bond; Sive wrote to the Peasant to refund the Money, upon Pain of having his Tongue drawn thro' his under Jaw, and fastened with a Skewer.

On the 14th they assembled at Lismore (between Coppoquin and Tallow) posted an Advertisement on the Door of the Post-Office, requiring the Inhabitants to have their Houses illuminated, and a certain Number of Horses bridled and saddled ready for them to mount against next Night, which was complied with. On the Night of the 15th they mounted, went to Tallow-Bridge (near Tallow) where they levelled the Ditches of several fine Parks, and cut down a Number of full-grown Ash-trees (Knee high, to save them the Trouble of felling) belonging to Mr. K—y, of the said Place; they then proceeded to Tallow; the Horse marched to the West Bridge, the Commander called out, Halt; to the Right about; and then proceeded into the Market-place in a smart Trot. They broke open the Marshalls, discharged the Debtors, sent an Advertisement to D—y F—s, the Justice, to take several Copies, and see them posted up; that a Pot or Waine of Turf should be sold for 6d. (Half the usual Price) 20 Ounces of fresh Butter, 4d. Potatoes, 2s. 8d. Halfpenny per Barrel, &c. They also sent a Letter to him, to send for the Man who built a Cock-pit for him 12 Months ago, to pay him Part of the Money he withheld from him, and also a Guinea he promised him for Expedition; all which he tamely complied with, though a Troop and an Half of Dragoons were quartered very near him.

On the 22d they came to the Ferry-point, opposite this Town, levelled the Ditches of a small Park opposite the back Window of my Parlour, and a Musket Shot off the Town; they made a large Fire, dug a Grave, and erected a Gallows over it, fired several Shot, and at each Discharge huzza'd; sent several threatening Letters to the Inhabitants of this Town, in particular to M—w P—r, an active Justice, that they would pull

down his House, and tear him to Pieces; that on the 25th they would pull down a very handsome House (within a Mile of this Town) which they said was built on Commons.

The Militia Arms were delivered to the Protestant Inhabitants, who being joined by two Companies of Foot from the Barracks, marched through the Town, and made a handsome Appearance; 70 Men mounted Guard that Night, a Party of which patrolled every two Hours to the said House: No Attempt was made. One D—s C—r, of Tallow, a Comber, came here and endeavoured to inflit another of the same Trade under Sive's Banner: He was apprehended and lodged in the Barracks, and on the 26th he was sent in the Revenue cruising Boat to Cork, to prevent a Rescue by Land; on the 27th P—k R—h, formerly a Smith to a Troop of Horse, who lived near Coppoquin, was apprehended here, supposed to have made Part of their Levelling-tools; at the same Time he gave Information against several to M—w P—r, Esq; he was sent to Cork by the same Conveyance as C—r.

The 29th, the Ditches of Tirkelling and Ballydaniel, near Tallow, belonging to M—P—, were levelled; 500 Men in a Day would not repair the Damage.

The 30th, 4 Pieces of Iron Cannon, taken out of our Fort, were placed at the North and South Gates, charged with Cartridge Shot.

The 31st, several Alarms.

April the 1st, between 7 and 8 in the Evening the Alarm was beat; after that, to Arms, a false Alarm being given, that the White Boys were within Half a Mile of the North Gate; the Town in an Uproar; by 9 all quiet; about one in the Morning the Mayor, Mr. —, and several other Gentlemen, in Number 41, well mounted and accounted, with each a Soldier behind him, went from this to Tallow, 8 Miles distant, and before Sun-rise seized 11 White Boys, whom they brought to this Town.

The 2d, they marched them through it in their Uniforms, with Drums beating, Fifes playing, &c.

The 3d, two Brothers of the Town of Tallow, by Name K—, Shoemakers and Protestants, gave Information, upon which the Inhabitants, together with the Collector, and several Revenue Officers, equipped as before, went to Tallow, and Places adjacent, and brought to Town 13 White Boys, and lodged a Lieutenant Colonel in Tallow Barracks; his Name is Ob—n. It is said he has been some Time in the French Service. There was another Party with the Army from Cork, met at Youghall, and had seized about 25 at Lismore and Places adjacent; the Cork Informations were from P—R—, called Adjutant to the White Boys.

A Copy of the Oath taken by all Persons who enter into Sive Oultaugh's Society.

"I do hereby solemnly and sincerely swear, that I will not make known any Secret now given me, or hereafter may be given, to any one in the World, except to a sworn Person belonging to the Society called White Boys, or otherwise Sive Oultaugh's Children.

"Furthermore I swear that I will be ready at an Hour's warning (if possible) being properly summoned by any of the Officers, Sergeants, or Corporals belonging to my Company.

"Furthermore I swear I will not wrong any of the Company I belong to, of the Value of one Shilling, nor suffer it to be done by others, without acquainting them thereof.

"Furthermore I swear I will not make known in any Shape whatsoever, to any Person that does not belong to us, the Name or Names of any of our Fraternity, but particularly the Names of our respective Officers.

Lastly, I swear that I will not drink of any Liquor whatsoever, whilst on Duty, without the Consent of one or other of the Officers, Sergeants

or Corporals, and that we will be loyal one to the other as far as in our Power lies."

Cork, April 8. We are informed amidst the Ringleaders taken, is the Chief of the White Boys, or Levellers in Ireland. This desperate Person was once a Franciscan Friar, who had abjured his Religion to gain Possession of a small Estate; which having dissipated, he became a Tool of the French Ministry. It is asserted, that by the apprehending of him, the Rising will be entirely quelled.

The Rioters who have appeared for some Days past in this Country, are entirely quelled; and 27 of them, who have been most active, are committed to our Goals. We expect a special Commission speedily from England, in order to proceed to the trying of them.

A Declaration has been published in the riotous Counties, importing, that all Natives hereafter found in Arms, or assembling themselves in a riotous Manner, upon any Pretext whatever, would be looked upon, and treated as Rebels, and that no Quarter should be given them.

Since our last about 50 of the Levellers, or White Boys, have been taken in and about Lismore and Coppoquin, and are sent to Waterford Goal. Among this Number is one of their Chiefs, who assumed the Character of Queen Sive. On Sunday Night last a Party of the Army and Militia of Youghall made another Expedition into the Country, and took 12 Prisoners, whom they have confined in the Barrack of that Town, where there are now 23 of the Queen's Children in Durance.

Dublin, April 13. By Letters of good Authority from the Counties of Waterford, Cork, and Tipperary, we have certain Intelligence, that a Merchant at Dungarven disbursed the Sum of 15000 l. to a Person now in Custody, who was styled Muster-master and Paymaster General to the White Boys, and who from Time to Time distributed the above Sum amongst them. And it further appears, that two other Persons now in Custody have French Commissions, one as Lieutenant Colonel, and the other as Adjutant. All the Accounts from Munster agree, that the Designs of these Miscreants were of a much more dangerous Nature than we were at first taught to believe they were.

Clonmell, April 14. Last Monday eight of the White Boys were taken in a Cave near Cloghen, by a Party of Lord Drogheda's Light Horse. This Cave went a great Way under Ground, down into which they went by a Ladder, and then took the Ladder away. One of the Light Horse suspecting, from the Appearance of this Place, that some of the Levellers might have been below, insisted upon his being let down by a Rope, with a Case of Pistols in his Hand; and upon his landing below, he most undauntedly unkenneled eight of those Wretches, who instantly surrendered Prisoners.

Extract of a Letter from Ennis, dated April 11.

"As to the Levellers, or White Boys, the Goals of Limerick, Clonmell, Youghall and Waterford, are crowded with them. Lord Drogheda's Light Horse are the best Troops ever known for ridding a Country of such Vermin. We this Day received the News, that Lady Shelagh Miskell is taken, and turns out to be a brawny Priest, whose Name is Kelly. They are the most wicked Set I ever heard of, and hope to have the Pleasure of seeing a Number of them hanged. It is thought they had other Views, beside houghing and levelling. They expected (as has passed amongst them) a Person from abroad to head them; and if that had happened, he would, I fear, be in as bad a Way."
