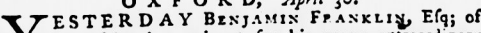

OXFORD, April 30. YESTERDAY BENJAMIN FRANKLIN, Esq; of Pennsylvania, eminent for his many extraordinary Improvements in Electrical Experiments, was presented by this University to the Honorary Degree of Doctor in Civil Law.

At the same Time his Son, who has also distinguished himself in the same Branch of natural Knowledge, was presented to the Honorary Degree of Master of Arts.

BOSTON, June 23. Yesterday arrived here Captain Morton, in 31 Days from Figuera, in Portugal, and informs that the Spaniards had commenced Hostilities against the Portuguese, and had taken two or three of their unguarded Towns, though War had not been declared on either Side: That most of the Troops expected from England were arrived at Lisbon, and were preparing to march against the Spaniards: And that the Day after he sailed, he was chased by a Man of War for 36 Hours, which at last came up with him, and proved to be English, who informed him, That they had Advice that the Spaniards had a Design to attack Oporto, and that he, with 5 other Men of War, were bound to its Assistance.

Extract of a Letter from Figuera, May 27. The Spaniards have finally taken off the Mask, and have actually begun Hostilities, without a formal Declaration of War, and have taken some of the Frontier Places, that were without Defence; however all this is of little Consequence.

NEW-YORK, July 1. Yesterday Afternoon sailed from the Hook his Majesty's Ships Enterprize, Captain Molton of 40 Guns, Lizard, Capt. Banks, 30 Guns, and the Porcupine Sloop of 14 Guns, Captain Fairwood, with 7 Transports, on board which are the 38th Regiment, under the Command of Col. Agnew.

On Saturday the 26th of June, arrived at Marblehead from Gibraltar, in 40 Days Passage, Capt. Cole. He informs, That Admiral Saunders was there with nineteen Sail of the Line, besides a Number of Frigates, that were constantly cruising thereabouts; that the French and Spanish Fleets were at Carthage, the Garrison of Gibraltar in good Health, and high Spirits, being under no Apprehensions of any Attack from the Enemy.

Capt. Cole in Lat. 39. 33. Long. 52. on the 14th Instant was taken and ransomed by two French Men of War from Cape Francois to Brest, one of which was a 60 Gun Ship, called the Partie, the other a Frigate, which Ships had before taken a Schooner with Gen. Monckton's Servants and Baggage on board, and also Capt. Hall, in a Vessel from Boston, bound to Barbados, which last Vessel they also ransomed, and put the General's Servants on board, to be put ashore at the first Port the arrived at.

The above-mentioned French Men of War, we hear, were dispatched from the Cape of France, to carry an Account of the Operations of our Fleet and Army in the West-Indies.

PHILADELPHIA, July 8. On Tuesday Night arrived here the Brig Susanna, Capt. Sutton, in 25 Days from Jamaica. He came through the Gulph, and on the 25th of June was off the Havannah, when he could plainly see the Smoke, and hear the Report of the Guns of our Army and Enemy, firing at one another. On the 26th he spoke with a Carolina Privateer, who had seen Captain Rivers, of this Place, and by him was informed, that our Army had landed safely at the Havannah, and were in Possession of a high Hill, which commands the Moore Castle and Town, where they had erected their Batteries, and began to play on the Place the Fifteenth of June. Captain Sutton did not see our Fleet. The Number of Spanish Ships of War at the Havannah, said to be 20, 14 of which of the Line. He sailed in Company with the Convoy that had the Negro Soldiers for the Havannah, under their Care.

Captain Washington, in a Privateer belonging to Jamaica, has taken and carried in there a Spanish Snow, with a great Deal of Cocoa on board, supposed to be very valuable; also a Dutch Sloop.

By Captain Lightburne, from Turks-Island, there is Advice, that Capt. Simpson, from Antigua, and Capt. Frazer, from St. Martins, for this Port, a Liverpool Brig, and a Schooner for Maryland, who sailed with the St. Christophers Fleet.
