SPECIMEN of New ENGLISH.

PRAGUE, April 24.

AFFAIRS in Silesia begin
to be serious. The Ene-
my have already quitted
their Quarters. Their Troops are
also encamping. The advanced
Posts of the two Armies are only
Half a League distant. We hour-
ly expect to hear of a general En-
gagement. We on our Part, desire
to put a glorious End to this tedi-
ous ruinous War: And it is the
Interest of the King of Prussia to
prevent an Augmentation of the
Austrian Troops in Silesia. Our
Troops in that Duchy amount al-
ready to 100,000 Men; and when
all the Reinforcements arrive, the
Number of fighting Men cannot
be less than 140,000, full of Cou-
rage and Good-will. The Hun-
garians have offered the Empress
Queen an Army of 30,000 Insur-
gents.

Versailles, April 25. The Count
d'Heroville de Claye will have the
Command of 45,000 French, which
are assembling near Dunkirk. Five
Lieutenant-Generals, and eleven
Major-Generals are to command
under him. He set out the 24th
for the general Rendezvous.

Bautzen, April 21. Silesia will
still continue the Theatre of War,
where 100,000 Austrians will take
the Field this Campaign, in Op-
position to 96 or 97,000 Prussians.
The Prudence of Marshal Daun,
and the Activity of General Lau-
dohn, will engage with the rapid
and fruitful Genius of the King of
Prussia.

Extract of a Letter from Brest,
April 19.

"Our Men here work double
Tides, and have done so for six
Weeks past, in preparing a great
Number of flat bottomed Boats,
which are now almost finished.
They are designed for a grand Ex-
pedition, but to what Part is kept
a profound Secret, though believed
to be somewhat near, as they will
not bear much Weather."

LONDON, May 6.

By a Letter from Paris we are
informed, that on the Arrival of
the Marquis de Vaudreuil in France,

from his late Government of Canada, he
was sent for immediately to Court, in order
to give an Account of his Conduct in that
Department, when several Officers appearing
against him, and charging him with bad
Management, &c. in his Proceedings against
the English, he was committed Prisoner to
the Bastille, where he now lies. The Bishop
d'Autun, first Almoner to the King, inter-
ceded for him, and spoke strongly in his Fa-
vour, saying, that he had acted with Spirit
in the Service of his Country; and, if it did
not meet with that Success he meant, it was
not his Fault: Adding that the Marquis had
Enemies, who were much more deserving of
being sent to the Bastille. This Freedom,
however, was so far from being of Service to
the Marquis, that, according to these Let-
ters, the good Bishop himself got severely
reprimanded, and has been ordered to quit
the Court, and confine himself entirely to
his own Diocese.

By a Letter from Rome, received by the
last Mail, we are informed, that an English
Gentleman having been lately introduced to
the Pope, his Holiness was pleased, among
other Things, to say, "That if the Intel-
ligence he had received of the taking of
Martinico had not been unquestionable,
"he would not have believed we had been
able to make so difficult a Conquest; and
"that the Glory of the English Nation was
"now arrived to so great a Height, that he
"should have thought it an Honour to have
"been an Englishman."

By a Gentleman just arrived from the Jer-
sey we are informed, that at Bayonne, as fast
as the Privateers come in from their Cruizes,
the Men are immediately pressed, and sent to
Brest by Land; and that the same Orders
are observed in many other Ports of France.

The King of Prussia hath ordered all the
Austrian Prisoners from Silesia, Magdebourg,
and other Places in the Electorate of Bran-
denbourg, to be transported to the Pillau,
and Memel, in Prussia, 6000 of them are
already upon the Road from Silesia; in the
same Manner, the Empress Queen has or-
dered the Prussian Prisoners to Tyrol and
Hungary, the extreme Parts of her Domi-
nions.

By Order of the Parliament of Paris, the
Effects of the Jesuits in the College of Lewis
le Grand, even the Church Ornaments,
have been sold by Auction.

Letters from Eimbeck say, that the Allies
are tracing a Camp under the Town; and
that the Troops under the Hereditary Prince
of Brunswick, to whom the Castle of Arenf-
berg surrendered, are 12,000 strong.

All the Prussian Troops have evacuated
the Duchy of Mecklenburg, except 15,000
Foot, and 4 or 500 Horse, who are left there
to collect the Arrears of the Contributions;
the rest of them under Prince Eugene of
Wurtemberg, are marched for Saxony.

May 8. Our Letters from all Parts of the
Kingdom bring Accounts of the present pre-
vailing Epidemic Disorder, which in some
Places has proved fatal, and has been so ge-
neral as to seize on People of all Ages and
Constitutions.

It is now so sickly at Chatham, that the
like has not been known in the Memory of
the oldest Man living.

The present Disorder which at this Time

so alarms all Ranks of People in this Metropolis,
is thought to be owing to a noxious Quality in
the Air; and when not carefully attended to at the
very Beginning, has, in a great Number of In-
stances, proved fatal in the Space of 48 Hours.
—We are informed that several Horses have also
lately been seized with it, and died.

On Saturday an Experiment was made near
Highgate, on the Temperature of the Air, by
tying a Piece of fresh Meat at the Tail of a Kite,
and then flying it for a considerable Time, when,
upon drawing the Kite down again, the Meat
appeared quite tainted, and so discoloured, that
it was plain some noxious Quality must at present
prevail in the Air, to have had such an amazing
Effect over it.

Yesterday it was currently reported, that the
Courts of France and Spain had presented a Me-
morial to the States General, equally as insolent
as that sent to the Court of Portugal.

Letters from Genoa inform us, that his most
Catholic Majesty, in Answer to the Lord Tyr-
awley's Threat of being at Madrid, at the Head of
his Troops, soon after Whitfuntide, had sent
Word to the King of Portugal, that for the Sake
of avoiding all further Expence in Couriers, he
should come and settle Matters with him himself
at the Gates of Lisbon.

It is said, that Sir Edward Hawke is to join
the Portuguese Squadron, in order to go in Con-
cert upon some Expedition against the Enemy.

They write from Bonifacio, in the Island of
Corfica, that early in the Morning of the 8th of
April, the Garrison of Corti made a Sally on the
Genoese Troops which are besieging that Place,
of whom they killed and wounded many, took
others Prisoners, and nailed up ten Pieces of
Cannon; after which they set Fire to their Qua-
rions, and retired in good Order back to the Town,
having had but two Men killed, and 7 wounded.

There is a great Scarcity of Provision and
Forage in the Austrian Army in Silesia, notwith-
standing it is pretended that such great Quantities
have been transported from Bohemia and Hungary.

Sailed from Yarmouth and Hurst Roads, the
Syren and Gramont Men of War, with Ships
under Convoy for Quebec, Newfoundland, &c.

Yesterday Afternoon the Alderney Sloop, Capt.
Hughes, arrived at Spithead from the East-Indies.
—She came out the fourth of December, and has
touched at Ireland.

The Atlantic, Green, from Piscataqua for Lon-
don, is arrived at Dover, after being taken and
ransomed for 1100 Pounds.

May 11. The Preparations of the French for
an Invasion of England or Ireland are immense,
and their Troops are in Motion from all Quarters,
for Dunkirk, Havre, and Brest.

By Accounts from Turin we learn, that his
Sardinian Majesty has rejected all the Offers made
by the Courts of France and Spain, and is re-
solved to fulfil all his Engagements with the Court
of Great-Britain, in a Manner becoming the Digi-
nity of a Monarch.

On Sunday arrived at Cowes the Atlantic,
Green, from New-England for London, who was
taken by a French Privateer, and ransomed, and
afterwards met with a Spanish Privateer, who had
taken the Brayton, of Whitehaven, John Harri-
son Master, on the 26th of April, off Cape Clear,
but treated him very civilly, and put him on
board the Atlantic; he is safe arrived, and his
Mate also. This was one of the Ships that came
out of Carolina, under Convoy of the Dolphin
Man of War.

By a Letter from Belleisle we have Advice,
that the Prince of Wales, Curling, from South-
Carolina to London, which was taken a few
Weeks ago, and carried to Vigaro, near Corunna,
by a French Privateer, had, by the Mate, with
the Assistance of four Dutchmen, been cut out of
the above Port, and is brought safe by them into
Belleisle.
