

the North Side of that Island, not known to where she belonged, but thought not to be an English Vessel.

Extract of a Letter from an Officer in the Navy, on board his Majesty's Ship Centurion, off Cape-Florida, July 21, 1762.

"I left our Army and Fleet going on very well in the Siege of the Havannah.—The Troops from New-York are much wanted.—I do not doubt but by this Time the Moore Castle is ours, as they expected it to surrender, or to take it by Storm, by the Twenty-second.—It has made a very obstinate Defence."

From the Carolina Papers we have the following Particulars relating to the Havannah, viz. That by the prudent and proper Measures taken by Admiral Pocock, and the Care of the Providence Pilots, the whole Fleet of Men of War, Transports, &c. got safe thro' the Bahama Old Straits, and arrived before the Havannah, on the 6th of June, without the Loss of a single Vessel: That 19 Ships of the Line, besides Frigates, went down with the Fleet, and were afterwards joined by two or three more: That the Troops did not exceed 10,000 Men from the marching Regiments, with 2000 Marines from the Ships: That of those 8000 were landed on the 7th, Part on the Eastern Side of the Harbour, against the Cattle El Morro, under the Earl of Albemarle; the rest on the Western Side, against the Governor's Castle, under Colonel William Howe: That four or five Days after 2000 more were landed: That our Forces had Possession of all the Neck of Land to the Westward of the Entrance of the Harbour (except the Puntal, some Batteries along Shore, and the Governor's Castle, lately built upon a Hill, which commands the Town and other Forts, mounting three Tier of Cannon) and also by the River Lagida, wherefrom the Besieged were usually supplied with Water through Pipes: And that the Spaniards had a prodigious Number of Cannon mounted at the Havannah, mostly on the Forts and Batteries which face the Entrance of the Harbour; but that notwithstanding it was thought the British Troops would be in Possession of the whole Place in five or six Days from the 14th of July.

The Spanish Declaration of War against Great-Britain, it is said, was not published at the Havannah when our Fleet and Army arrived before the Place; nor at Carthagena the 10th of June; nor at St. Augustine the First of July.

A large Spanish Snow was carried into Jamaica the Beginning of June, said to be the richest Prize ever taken to that Island.

LONDON, May 27.

YESTERDAY his Grace the Duke of Newcastle resigned his Office of First Commissioner of the Treasury. We hear that his Grace wrote a Letter on this Occasion to the Lord Mayor of London, and another to the Chairman of the East India Company. This Nobleman has served his Sovereign and the Public with inviolable Fidelity and Integrity, through a long Series of Years; and with a Disinterestedness unparalleled, has expended near 500,000l. of his Fortune.

It is reported, that the above Nobleman, on being offered a Pension of 6000l. per Annum, made the following Declaration, truly becoming a British Spirit: "No (said he) it shall never be said, that 'Honest', after spending 500,000l. in 'his Country's Service, at last resigned to become 'a Pensioner.'"

They write from Madrid, that it was agreed between Spain and France, that all French Cruizers were to be permitted to enter the Ports of Spain with any English Prizes, with Liberty to dispose of them to the best Advantage, provided it is attested, that the said Merchandize was taken out of English Prizes, and producing the English Bills of Lading, and other Ship Papers.

A Camp for 50,000 Men is marked out near Petersburg, where the Soldiers are to be taught the Russian Exercise by Prussian Officers.

The French have obtained Permission from the Court of Madrid, to import all Manner of Stuffs and other woollen Goods, such as were imported from England before the War; but to each is to be affixed a Stamp upon a Bit of Lead, to distinguish them from the English Manufactory, and to pay the usual Duties.

But whilst her Husband, her Friends and Acquaintance much lament and bewail her early Departure, there is every Reason to hope she has reached the Height of a blessed Immortality.
