WHEN I took Notice of the Fallacy of Rock Hall Representation of the Distance faved by Travelling that Way, I think I did it in Terms as gentle as such an Imposture would bear, and Mr. Aires should have Kissed the Rod. I have no personal Grudge to him; I neither know him, nor any Thing to his Prejudice, but his faulty Conduct in the Matter before us. I called it gross Delufin to amuse Strangers with a Notion of faving 30 Miles out of 55, the whole Distance between Annapolis and George-Town, by the Way of Reck-Hall. In my Advertisement I have proved all the Distance faved by that Hall to be but 4 Miles, and those 4 Miles, only by turning Land into Water, which I take to be not very inviting to a Traveller. I should be forry to obstruct his Ferry, as proper only for the lower Parts of the County, and for Conveyance of Merchandize and bulky Matters, as I observed before; and should have taken no further Notice of it, but that I find he has figned an Advertisement in your Gazette reflecting on my Views in so fair and candid a Representation of the Distance both Ways, to prevent the Abuse of Strangers; for no other will be imposed on. I suppose he means nothing more than to get an honest Livelihood; and that if some Body elle were not as much Interested as he in the Scheme, he would not have figned fo uncivil a Reply to an Advertisement so ingenuously submitted to the Experience of others. This Sentiment I am confirm'd in by his imagining I exceed in supposing the Distance from Annapolis to Rock-Hall, to be 25 Miles; for if he had read his own Advertisement, he would have seen I only took his own Word for it, which I shall not be so ready to credit for the future. It is then not he, but his Amanuenfis, who begins " It is no new Thing " to find that Interest blinds the Person affected " and very often Biasses the Judgment." This is an affected Sort of Speech; to blind the Judgment and bias it too, are intended as a double Charge by Way of Exaggeration.
