

same Morning saw two Sail which came up with us, notwithstanding our Endeavours to avoid them. They proved to be a Privateer belonging to New-London, and her Consort, belonging to New-York. We then bore away for Cape Nichola, but finding no Ships there, we proceeded for the Havannah; in the Passage we met with the Enterprize Man of War, of 40 Guns, and a Transport, going to take in the Troops that had been cast away upon the Island of Cuba. On the 29th we came in Sight of the 6 Ships which were cast away, they were all bilged, but the Men all saved. The Ships were the Chesterfield Man of War of 40 Guns, and 5 Transports, viz. the Smiling Nancy, the Industry, the Swallow, the Juno, and the Matquerade."

Extract of a Letter from Lisbon, dated July 11, 1762.

"Count de la Lippe Buckebourg, is just arrived as Commander in Chief of all the Forces here, great Things are Expected from his great Abilities; the Prince of Mecklenburgh is also arrived, with a great many other Officers, he is to command a Regiment of Portuguese Horse; Lord Loudon is every Hour expected here; General Crawford is up with the Portuguese Army, intrusting them, he is in great Esteem here and at Court; Lord Tyrawley, it is said, is going Home again. Capt. Sawyer, in the Active of 28 Guns, and Capt. Pownall, in the Favourite of 16 Guns, have taken a Spanish South Sea Man, with upwards of a Million of Money, some say a Million and a Half, without Doubt it is thought to be the richest single Prize that ever was taken."

Extract of a Letter, received this Morning at Ten o'Clock, dated Hartford, Sept. 6, 1762.

"I give you Joy of the great Success of Prince FERDINAND over the French Army on the 24th of June, as per London Gazette extraordinary, which Mr. Chew received last Friday Night, by a Vessel just arrived from Scotland, at New-London, in a short Passage. He says we killed and took 5000 of the Enemy, among which are a great Number of Officers, with all their Baggage and Cannon, &c."

PHILADELPHIA, September 16.

Extract of a Letter from Lisbon, July 6, 1762.

"Of late the Spaniards have made but little Progress on our Frontiers; Desertion, and the Want of Provisions, have been severely felt among them; and some Advices say, that now Sickness prevails. The Count De la Lippe Buckebourg, a German General, of great Reputation, and the Prince of Mecklenburgh Strelitz, are arrived; Lord Loudon is also daily expected, and four British Regiments of Foot from Belleisle.—Admiral Hawke, according to our last Advices, was coming out, but where designed, not certainly known.—The Active Frigate, Captain Sawyer, and the Favourite Sloop, Captain Pownall, have taken a Spanish Regiller Frigate, called The Hermione, from the South Seas, and carried her to Gibraltar, said to be worth from six to Seven Hundred Thousand Pounds Sterling; some Letters say more. It is said there is Intelligence of more such Ships coming to Europe, and that our Men of War are on the Look-out.—Sweden has followed the Example of Russia, in making Peace with Prussia; and, it is said, Overtures are made from Saxony for the same Purpose; so that we hope the Empress Queen must soon find herself obliged to accede, that Peace may be restored to all Germany, as it may influence the rest of the belligerent Powers to accommodate Matters the sooner."

Another Letter from Lisbon, of July 3, mentions four Spanish Vessels being carried in there by two small Privateers; three of which said to be loaded at Cadix, for the Fleet at Ferrol.

By a Letter from the Havannah, come to Hand since our last, we learn, that besides the twelve Spanish Ships of the Line found in the Harbour at the Surrender of the Place, there were likewise nine Frigates, and about 30 Sail of Merchantmen there: That our Men of War had taken four Frigates, one of which of 24, and another of 18 Guns, said to be exceeding rich Vessels: And that we had lost a great many Soldiers and Sailors, who went a plundering the Villages, but generally fell in with the Enemy's Light Horse, who murdered them in the cruellest Manner, by cutting out their Tongues, and mangling them in a most horrid Manner, such as a Regard to Decency forbids to mention.

ANNAPOLIS, September 23.

The Provincial Grand Jury last Week, found a Bill against Michael Peck, a Lutchman, of Frederick County, for the Murder of Mr. George Jacob Poe, in July last, by Shooting him thro' the Body: To which he pleaded Guilty.

Thomas Cooper, an Englishman, a Servant belonging to this Town, was likewise Indicted for House-breaking, and the Jury found him Guilty. Saturday last both the Criminals received Sentence of Death.

On Sunday last, a little Boy, about three Years old, Son to Mr. Beard of this County, was bit by a Mad Dog in the Face, his Nose and Cheeks being mangled by him in a most shocking Manner. This Dog was bit a few Weeks before by another Mad Dog, which was killed; and altho' he had shewed Signs of Madness, yet they neglected to kill him, till after the above unhappy Accident.

Yesterday a very valuable Negro Lad, belonging to a Gentleman of this Town, was found dead over Severn. He was sent out to catch a Horse, and staying longer than usual, upon Search, the Horse was found with a Bridle on, and the Boy lying dead, having received some Blow on the Head, but how it was done, is not known.
