

London, July 27. On the 23d it was de-
clared in Council, That certain Terms of
Accommodation, which had been proposed by
the Army, were inconsistent with the Honour
and Interest of the Nation. *London Gazette.*

The British Camp will be brought to Eng-
land, and will be on the 21st of August. Active and
passive, and will be on board the *Swallow*,
which is to make Intelligence for
the British Camp.

The British General has attacked on the 21st
the British Colonel Tomes, who was en-
camped with about 1000 Men near Mariburg,
to clear the Frontiers of Bohemia. He defeated
the Colonels, made a Number of them Prisoners,
and returned the next Day to Freyberg.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Patrick Craighan,
of the British Army, of 15 September.

I have my self of the 15th Instant, from
Darmstadt, we have taken a Number of Ves-
sels, and a Parcel of Goods. On the 15th Instant, after a
Chase of two Hours, came up with the Duke of
York's Privateer, of 1000 Tons, of 13
Pounders, and 20 Men, who informed me that
there were the great ship lying before Flinthe
Town, under the Gun Battery. Next Morn-
ing I sailed into the Bay, attacked the Battery
and Vessel, in Company with the Sloop, and had
the great Ship, in an Hour and three Quarters,
drove them from their Battery, when I immedi-
ately manned our Boat, and Possession of the Fort,
took down the Spanish Flag, and hoisted the Eng-
lish, and raised up our Guns.

In the Evening they abandoned the Ship,
and the Town, which is pretty large, how-
ever, did not let the People try to plunder or
molest with in, but went to work immediately in
cutting and warping out the Vessels, four of which
we got out of our in the Afternoon. The Wind
blowing right into the Bay, we were obliged to let
the other two go upon the Rocks, they being in
Baits.

The Wind falling fair, and Night coming
on, and fresh gales coming constantly down,
I immediately put to Sea, having scarce Men en-
ough to take Care of what we had got. Three
of them are loaded from Cadix to Ferrol, partly
for the King of Spain, and partly for Merchants
Accounts; the other, a fine Snow belonging to
Bilboa, in Ballast. We have the Mate of the large-
st Vessel here, being the only Prisoner we could
catch. We arrived here, the 23d Instant, and small
Damage repaired, which is, my Flying-jib-boom
shot away, my Foremast shot thro' in the Middle,
my Stern and Quarters very much shattered, like
wife all my Sail, and Rigging, but luckily have
not lost a Man, only a few wounded. The two
Sloops are, one of 9 Nine-pounders, and full of
Muskets, and the other, 6 Six-pounders, ve-
ry long, and Muskets, and the Snow 6 Four
pounders; the Brig has no Guns.

Extract of a Letter from Portsmouth, July 11.
Our small Craft have blocked up several
French flat-bottomed Boats, in a Creek on the
French Coast; and on Thursday Afternoon sailed
from Spithard his Majesty's Sloop Weazel, with
the Pluto, and another Fireship, with several of our
flat-bottomed Boats, in order to cut out the French
flat-bottomed Boats, or burn them: If the former,
we shall, in all Probability, see what Sort of Ma-
chines they would fright the intimidated Part
of the English with. These Boats came out of Havre
only for Parade, and have by their Unskillfulness
been caught in Lobbs Pound.

Saturday last there was the greatest Proof
of Small-Arms at the Tower, ever known at one
Time. 'Tis supposed they are to be sent to Por-
tugal.

NEW-YORK, September 16.
On Monday the 12th of July, Lat. 49, 38. Lon.
8, 30. from London, the Harriot Packet Boat,
Captain Bonnel, in her Passage from New-York
to Falmouth, was attacked by a Brig Privateer of
14 six and nine Pounders, and about 130 Men.
The Engagement began about Half after 8 in the

Evening, and continued 9 Hours with great Smo-
ke on both sides, when the Privateer sheered
to a little Distance, but kept within Sight till 10
o'clock when Half past 9 with Grapplings at his Yaw-
Anch, and a duck-pot at his Flying Jib Boom, he
again stood for the Packet, and being near her, she
made ready for Boarding. Captain Bonnel thought
proper to fire the Mast, which was accordingly
done, and at 4 the Engagement was renewed with
equal Ardour. The Sail and Rigging of the Pack-
et were shot to Pieces, her Main Mast, Main Top-
mast, Fore Topmast, Fore Top Cross Trees, Trunk
Mast, and Trunk Mast, were wounded, and
several Shot in her Hull. The Captain and two
Gentlemen Passengers, were slightly wounded by
shot, and one Seaman had a Ball lodged in his
Womb, and one was accidentally blown up with Gun
Powder. About 9 o'clock a lucky Shot from
the Packet did some trifling Damage to the Pri-
vateer, she immediately sheered off, and made all
the Sail she could get. Captain Bonnel arrived safe
at Falmouth.

PHILADELPHIA, September 23.
Captain Magnus Miller arrived here on Saturday
last from Barbados. Off Cape Hatteras he fell
in with a large Sloop, which gave him Chase for
Four Eight Hours, and left him about ten Leagues
from the Cape.

ANNAPOLIS, September 30.
By the Return of an Express which was
sent last to New-York, to solicit for a Con-
cession, we learn, that either the *Enterprise*, or
the *Globe*, may soon be expected in Vir-
ginia, for that Purpose.

Last Tuesday Night, several Prisoners
broke out of our Goal, among whom, was
Moses Pitt under Sentence of Death for
Murder, but he is since taken and well re-
covered. Three other grand Rogues, who
broke out with him, are not yet taken: It
is supposed they had some Help from without.
Ben Franklin was here a great Number

now a man of his Place, but it is the Opinion
of some, that he deserves to be kept in.
