in the Morning.

The Soldiers, and the Populace, ripe for Revolution, immediately proclaimed the Empress Catherine II. Sovereign of all the Russias, and acknowledged her Son as Successor.

Part of that Day was spent in establishing the Authority of the new Sovereign in the Capital, and in getting tagether the Troops. Three Regiments, who had just set out for the Army, returned quickly, and joined the others. The put singles lending to the Empresor's Resilience, were carefully gearded; and about Six at Night, the Empress, dresied in the antient Uniform of the Guards, set out at the Hand of 15,000 Men, to selve the Person of Peter III
