[XVIIIth Year.]

His MAJESTY'S Most Gracious SPEECHES, in the HOUSES OF PARLIAMENT, on Thursday the 11th of November 1762.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I FOUND, on my Accession to the Throne, Kingdoms engaged in a bloody and cruel War, which I resolved to prosecute it with the utmost determination, however, to consent to Peace, and honourable Terms, whenever the Enemy should incline the Enemy to the same peaceable Negotiation was accordingly begun last year, and proved ineffectual. The War became afterwards, by the Resolution of the Court of Madrid, with my Enemies, notwithstanding my best endeavours to prevent it.

This, with the unexpected Attack of my natural Ally, the King of Portugal, greatly affected the Object of our Military Operations, and created our Difficulties, by adding to the burden which this Country already laboured.

My Object still continued the same, to attain a Peace, by pursuing this more extensive and vigorous Manner. I embraced therefore an opportunity, of renewing the Negotiation; but at the same time, I exerted so effectually the Strength which you and my Hands, and have been so well served by your Arms, in the Execution of my Plans, that I furnished Examples of greater Glory, or greater Honour, than any other Nation, or other Part of the Kingdom of Spain, are fallen in. I cannot mention these Achievements, which have brought me Honour, without giving my People the unwearied Perseverance, and unparalleled Courage of my Officers and private Men, by Sea and Land, repeated Proofs, have shewn, that no Climate, no Dangers, can check the Ardour and Valour of the British Arms.

Next to the Assistance of Almighty God, for their Conduct and Courage, that my Enemies brought to accept of Peace, on such Terms, as I gave my Parliament entire Satisfaction. Preliminary have been signed by my Minister, with those of Spain, which I will order, in due Time, to be ratified.

The Conditions of these are such, that they add an immense Territory added to the Empire of Great Britain, and a solid Foundation laid for the Increase of our Commerce; and the utmost Care has been taken, that all Occasions of future Disputes between the Kingdoms of France and Spain, and thereby to the Permanency to the Blessings of Peace.

While I carefully attended to the essential Interest of my Kingdoms, I have had the utmost Regard to the Faith of my Crown, and the Interests of my People, made Peace for the King of Portugal, securing to him his Dominions; and all the Territories of the Kingdom of Spain, as well as of my other Allies in Germany, occupied by the Armies of France, are to be evacuated.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons, I have ordered the proper Estimates to be made, and shall, without Delay, proceed to make them, to the utmost Extent, wherever they may be found, and Wisdom and sound Policy. It is the greatest Honour to me, that, though the War is at an end, the Consequences cannot immediately be so much lessened as nothing could have carried us through the various Difficulties surrounding us, but the most strenuous Efforts, we must expect, for some Time, the Consequences of them to a considerable Degree.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

It was impossible to execute what this Nation has so nobly performed, in all Parts of the World, without the Loss of great Numbers of Men. When you consider, whether on the Principles of Policy or of Justice, will see one of the many Reasons which led me early into Negotiations, so as to make a conclusion, before the Fate of many Operations, and now to hasten the Conclusion of it, to the certainty of making Preparations for another Campaign, my Territories are greatly augmented, and Sources opened for Trade and Manufactures, which you would consider of such great Importance to the Security of those Countries, and to the Benefit of the Commerce and Navigation of the World, cannot mention our Acquisitions, without attending to your Care and Attention, my People, whose Valour they were made.

We could never have carried on this extensive War, without the greatest Union at Home. You will see, how peculiarly necessary, in order to make the most Advantage of the great Advantages acquired by the Peace.

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
