[XVIIIth Year.]

LONDON, October 14

WE hear that the whole of the Contentions which are to have happened at Great, is only how much the Terms of Peace, successful, shall be raised above those which succeeded in before as advantageous and able.

October 19. It is said that Don Lewis, who so bravely defended the Morro with the Spanish Colours wrapt about having publicly vowed, that he never surrender them alive.

Letters by the Convoy from the West-Indies, that the French Traders at Hispaniola affronted at the English not paying them that Island, as they wish to be upon a footing with their Countrymen at Guadaloupe and O. B. 23. The King of Prussia hath demanded Six Millions of Florins (about 500,000 £) His other Subjects are also to contribute a considerable Sum. This is the first Tribute ever exacted from them since the War.

The Attention of the Public is at present engaged by the Negotiation for Peace ending. While the Generality of Men are moved by Motives of Humanity and true Patriotism for a speedy and honourable Conclusion of the War, there are not wanting some, who would like a Peace on any Terms whatever.

Some are actuated either by Vanity or Interest, misguided Politics, or other Views, which, perhaps, they will not chuse to see the true Sense of the Nation will follow from the Voice of their Representatives in Parliament.—Mean while, the Consideration of the People in the Purty of his Majesty's Affairs, his Zeal for the Glory and Prosperity of his Kingdom, and in his Steadiness in pursuing Measures that are most likely to procure the Subjects solid and permanent Happiness, is uniformly universal and unbounded.

How is there, then, to apprehend, that those who have been suggested to the People will ever think of sacrificing, upon this Occasion, the true Interests of their Country? we do not find they have hitherto any Cause to suspect their Integrity.

Therefore venture to assure our Readers, that we do it upon solid Grounds, that the Tranquillity of Europe, so long and so disturbed, will be quickly restored; and that the glorious and much-desired Work we have so noble and distinguished Part; and that the expensive War will be succeeded by Felicity, Repose, and Prosperity, which, if we are not wanting, will make this happy Island the Envy of the whole Earth.

O. B. 26. By the Flanders Mail, which arrived last, we have received the Account from Paris.

It was on the 20th of last Month, a Ceremony of Degrading Mr. Nadau, Governor of Guadaloupe, and M. de la Botte, of the Forces in that Island, was performed, in Presence of all the Major-Generals on the Parade, before the Barracks, a Sentence was Read, in which the Arrears were rehearsed, at each Article of which was said, that the King had degraded from the Rank of a General, and lost all his Titles and Honours, his Coat-armour to be erased, and he should never more wear a Sword.

The Sentence, Mr. Nadau, the highest Degree, called out, What Treatment for a Man of Honour! He served it more than 11. It is made a Surrender Guadaloupe: I had only 1100 Men, and was given up with 5000. He proceeded to the Degradation of his Arms; broke his Swords into Pieces at his Feet, and took of
