In consequence whereof the necessary Orders shall be sent by each of the High Contracting Parties, with reciprocal Passports for the Ships which shall carry them, immediately after the Ratification of the Definitive Treaty.

ARTICLE XXIII. All the Treaties, of what Nature soever, which existed, before the present War, as well between Their Britannick and Most Christian Majesties, as between Their Britannick and Catholic Majesties, as also between any of the above-named Powers and His Most Faithful Majesty, shall be, as they are in effect, renewed, and confirmed, in all their Points, which are not derogated from by the present Preliminary Articles, notwithstanding whatever may have been stipulated to the contrary by any of the High Contracting Parties: And all the said Parties declare, that They will not suffer any Privilege, Favour, or Indulgence, to subsist, contrary to the Treaties above confirmed.

ARTICLE XXIV. The Prisoners made respectively by the Arms of Their Britannick, Most Christian, Catholic, and Most Faithful Majesties, by Land, and by Sea, shall be restored reciprocally, and *bonâ fide*, after the Ratification of the Definitive Treaty, without Ransom, paying the Debts they shall have contracted during their Captivity. And each Crown shall respectively pay the Advances which shall have been made for the Subsistence and Maintenance of their Prisoners, by the Sovereign of the Country where they shall have been detained, according to the Receipts and attested Accounts, and other authentick Titles which shall be furnished on each Side.

ARTICLE XXV. In order to prevent all Causes of Complaints, and Disputes, which may arise, on Account of Ships, Merchandizes, and other Effects, which may be taken by Sea, It is reciprocally agreed, that the Ships, Merchandizes, and Effects, which may be taken in the Chandel, and in the North Seas, after the Space of Twelve Days, to be computed from the Ratification of the present Preliminary Articles, shall be reciprocally restored on each Side.

That the Term shall be Six Weeks for the Prizes taken, from the Channel, the British Seas, and the North Seas, as far as the Canary Islands inclusively, either in the Ocean, or in the Mediterranean.

Three Months, from the said Canary Islands as far as the Equinoctial Line, or Equator.

Lastly, Six Months, beyond the said Equinoctial Line, or Equator, and in all other Parts of the World, without any Exception, or other more particular Description of Time and Place.

ARTICLE XXVI. The Ratifications of the present Preliminary Articles shall be expedited in good and due Form, and exchanged in the Space of one Month, or sooner if it can be done, to be computed from the Day of the Signature of the present Articles.

In Witness whereof, We the under-written Ministers Plenipotentiary of His Britannick Majesty, of His Most Christian Majesty, and of His Catholic Majesty, in Virtue of Our respective Full Powers, have signed the present Preliminary Articles, and have caused the Seal of Our Arms to be put thereto.

DECLARATION, signed at Fontainebleau, the 3d of November, 1762, by the French Plenipotentiary, relating to the XIIIth Article of the Preliminaries.

HIS Most Christian Majesty declares, that, in agreeing to the XIIIth Article of the Preliminaries, signed this Day, He does not mean to renounce the Right of acquitting His Debts to His Allies; and that the Remittance, which may be made on His Part, in order to acquit the Arrears that may be due on the Subsidies of preceding Years, are not to be considered as an Infraction of the said Article.

In Witness whereof, I, the under-written Minister Plenipotentiary of His Most Christian Majesty, have signed the present Declaration, and have caused the Seal of my Arms to be put thereto.

CONSTANTINOPLE, October 16.

THERE has been a dangerous Sedition at Belgrade. The Bashaw, or Governor of the Town, a very just and sensible Man, seeing the People daily strip of their Money, under the most frivolous Pretences, by the fordid Greediness of some Janissaries (who carried their voracious Tyranny to such a Pitch, as almost intirely to eradicate the Commerce of Servia) took the most sage Measures to put a Stop to their Roguery. Some Janissaries, getting Scent of his Design, immediately founded the Tocsin, formed themselves in a Body, drew their Scimitars, and vowed Destruction on the Bashaw. They put in March with great Fury, followed by an immense Populace, towards the Palace of the respectable Governor; but that upright Man had foreseen all. Other Janissaries, in greater Number than the preceding, influenced either by Love, Duty, or Rewards, defeated the factions Party, of whom a Part has been strangled, and the rest cast into Prison, &c. This Conduct of the Bashaw has been so agreeable to the Sultan, that he has sent him a Prefect of a superb Mantle. The Ravages of the Plague are not yet ceased, either here or at Smyrna.

LONDON, December 11.

Yesterday there were very full Houses of both Lords and Commons, to consider of the Preliminary Articles of Peace agreed to between Great-Britain, France and Spain; when several eloquent Speeches were made on the Occasion. The House of Peers sat on Thursday Night till after Ten o'Clock, and the House of Commons till near Twelve. Yesterday the Right Hon. the House of Peers waited on His Majesty with their congratulatory Address, on his agreeing to the Preliminaries of Peace; and received a most gracious Answer.

And this Day the Hon. House of Commons waited on His Majesty at St. James's, with their Address on the same Occasion.

The Majesty, with regard to the important Question, in a certain august Assembly, on Thursday, was 219 to 65; and in a Division Yesterday, 230 to 63. We hear that a Body of 12,000 Land Forces will be kept on Foot in America, to consist of 15 Regiments of Regulars, the Pay of Great-Britain, and 7 Regiments of Provincials, in the Pay of the Colonies. It is also reported that 33 Regiments of Foot will be disbanded, and only 72 kept on Foot, and Col. Montgomery's, and Col. Frazer's Highlanders, substituted in the Room of the 30 and 4th Battalions of the Royal American Regiment; and that each Company of the Regiments kept standing, will be reduced to 50 Men, those of the Foot Guards to 55; and the Second Lieutenants not on Half Pay. They have begun to discharge 18 Men out of each Company in the Third Regiment of Foot Guards, being the Men liable to serve Three Years, or while the War continued.

ANNAPOLIS, February 24.

By an Express Brought last Friday, his Excellency the Governor received from Virginia, the Preliminary Articles of Peace (of which the foregoing is a very exact Copy) Published by Authority, and brought in thither by one of his Majesty's Ships.

A few Days ago, as a Negro Fellow was Rowing in the Bow of a Boat in Severn, the Thole-Pin broke, and he fell overboard, and was drowned. (We are obliged to omit some Advertisements this Week.)
