By one of these, some People pretend to say that it is slipulated, That notwithstanding the vague and haughty An-fwer which the King of Prussia made to the Reprefentation of England on the Expediency of accom-modating his Difference with the Empress Queen, fresh Application shall be made to him, desiring him to be more explicit on the Terms of Peace he will agree to."

According to the last Letters from Vienna, the Troops of the Empress Queen will be augmented next Campaign with 70,000 Men, viz. 50,000 Recruits, raised in the Hereditary Dominions, and 20,000 foreign Troops, which she will take into her Pay. The Grandees of Hungary have promised to advance to her Majesty Seventeen Millions, which they borrow at Venice, Genoa, and other Cities.
