RATISBON, December 27.

HE King of Pruffia will not confent to a Suspension of Arms in the Empire unless the Army of the Circles immediately leave Franconia, and return to Bohemia.

Retterdam, January 4. The Weather continues rey severe; and the Entrance of the Macze and Goree are so full of Ice, that several Ships, that were coming in, have been obliged to put back

Berlin, January 1. The King will agree to no Ceffation of Arms with the Army of the Circles, bit on Condition that the Troops of that Army ke called home in the Spring, and that the Austrian confent to an immediate Exchange of Prisoners. Paris, Jan. 3. The Number of Infantry to be kept on Foot in Time of Peace is fixed at 89,476,

including 22,240 for the Service of the Colonies. Colegne, Jan. 7. The 5th Instant, at 4 in the Erening, 1600 Prussian Troops took Possession of Repferswerth; when two Companies belonging to the Elector of Cologne, who were in Garrison bere, marched out.

The Frost was so severe Petersburgh, Dec. 7. The Frost was so severe in the Night of the 1st Instant, that next Day the River Neva was passable on the Ice.

Madrid, Dec. 31. Orders are given to disarm all our Ships of War except such a Number as may be sufficient to curb the Barbary Corfairs, and efcort the Flotillas and Galleons.

Upon Enquiry into the Conduct of our Sex and Land Officers, during the Siege of the Havannah, it has appeared that none of them were in Fault.

Ratifer, Jan. 13. On the 10th the Dyet resu-med its Deliberations, when the Minister of Mentz proposed the Neutrality, and defired thereupon the Sentiments of the Assembly. The Minister of Brunswick declared, that his Britannick Majesty would support with all his Force, such of the States of the Brunswick and the States of the Empire as were defirous of refloring and preserving the Public Tranquillity. The Minister of Brandenbourg renewed his Proposition of immediate and absolute Neutrality, and expatiated on its advantageous Consequences; the Ministers of Mentz, Treves, and Cologne, referved their Opi-nions; but the Ministers from the Electors of Bavaria and Palatine declared roundly, that the Miferies of the War were such as could be no longer endured; and that if Peace did' not immediately ensue, they were for settling, without Loss of Time, a Neutrality with his Prussian Majesty. The Minister of Bohemia declared, that he could give no Opinion for Want of Instructions.

Hamburgh, Jan. 21. The two principal Diffi-culties that retard the Accommodation between the Courts of Vienna and Berlin, are the indemnifying of the Elector of Saxony, and the Possession of the County of Glatz, which is, as it were, the Gate between Bohemia and Silesia. This last retarded for some Weeks the Treaty of Breslav in 1742.

Franconia, Jan. 15. Though Letters from Saxo. ny fill Talk of Peace, we are informed that the King of Pruffia flatly refuses to indemnify Saxony as he did not begin the War; but that if the House of Austria, or its Allies, will indemnify Saxony, he will not oppose it.

Erfurth, Jan. 17. According to all Appearan ces, the Negotiations for Peace do not promise the ces, the Negotiations for Peace do not promite the Success expected; and according to the Behaviou of the Prussian Troops, there is little Reason: the expect any Thing in Favour of the Saxons. The severest Threats, and actual Executions, are carried on without crassing; and universal Milery in creases daily. On the 13th the subaltern Officer in Leipsick were sent round to acquaint all the Inhabitants, that unless they brought, within the Space of 48 Hours, their Quota of the Contributions demanded of them. the Plundering, to which tions demanded of them, the Plundering, to which they were liable, should of a Certainty be inflicted on them upon the 16th.
