

drowned. Such general Floods were never known in that Country.

Extract of a Letter from Wilsbeck, Feb. 25.

"Saturday last, between Cowland and Spalding, the River Wesling, in the County of Lincoln, by the Force of the Waters, broke the Bank, and carried away a House, called Brothers Houfe, consisting of Frame-Work, near 60 Yards Distance before the Family discovered it, they being all at Dinner; but on looking out, found themselves surrounded with Water. By the Assistance of a Boat they were all taken out, or else must have perished. And on the same Day four large Breaches in the great Bank between Peterborough and Wilsbeck, in the Isle of Ely, in the County of Cambridge, broke out of the River Ouse, and the Waters meeting together, have overflowed near four Hundred Thousand Acres of Land, and the Loss is computed at near 100,000 l.

On Monday last, the Bakewell Postman was found dead in the Snow, near Chatsworth Park, in Derbyshire. A poor Man, upwards of Eighty, was lost in the Storm.

In the Storm of Saturday, the 12th Inst. Mr. Hodgson, Innkeeper at Addington, in Yorkshire, perished in the Snow on Bumbles Moor, on his Return from Skipton-Market, and a Servant belonging to Mr. Roper, of Steetons, was lost near Biddleiden-Hall.

CHARLES-TOWN (in South-Carolina) March 26.

Extract of a Letter, dated Havannah, March 18.

"We expect Admiral Keppel here from Jamaica about the Middle of May, and imagine we may all leave this Place in about three Months: Some Transports are arrived here from Jamaica to carry off the Garrison, but their Destination is not known. Six Spanish Prize Ships of War, all of the Line, viz. Tigre, of 70 Guns; Reyna, of 70; Soverano, of 70, Aquillon, of 70, and San Antonio, of 60 Guns, are now almost ready for the Sea, and are to be sent to England; they are to be manned from the Ships here and at Jamaica, with Sailors sufficient to work them, and a Number of Soldiers are to be put on board each Ship. The America, and the two Ships of War that were on the Stocks, are to be burnt.—The Dock-Yards have been destroyed in such a Manner, as will put it out of the Power of the Spaniards to build any Men of War here for 3 Years at least."

BOSTON, April 4.

We hear from New-London, that on Tuesday last Died there, Capt. NATHANIEL GREEN, a Gentleman of an honest and fair Character.

NEW-YORK, April 21.

Monday last his Majesty's Packet the Earl of Halifax, Capt. Boulderson, arrived here from Falmouth, which he left on Saturday the third of March, and brought the February Mail. The Duke of Cumberland Packet Boat, Capt. Goodrich, with the Mail from New-York, arrived at Falmouth the 2d of March last. Another Packet is expected here from England in a few Days, which no doubt will bring the Copy of the Definitive Treaty of Peace, none of the Articles of which, that we can find, had been made public when the last Advices brought by Captain Boulderson, were sent from London. It is almost certain that the Treaty of Peace between the Empress Queen, and the Kings of Prussia and Poland, has been concluded, though we have no particular, nor authoritative Account of it, and we have the greatest Reason to expect a general Peace between all the Powers in Europe.

April 25. On the 21st of February last His Majesty's Sloop-Ferret, Capt. Clark, carried into Barbados a large Spanish Ship, mounting 18 Six and Nine-Pounders, taken ten Days before the Cessation of Arms, as she lay at Anchor under the West End of Porto Rico. She was from the Carracas, and is esteemed a very rich Prize. [This is another of the Carraca Fleet; out of which the Temeraire Frigate and Jamaica Privateer took two.]
