The MARYLAND

[XIXth Year.]

CADIZ, January 22. A DUTCH Man-of-War, was captured here the 21st, and it is said she will be followed by several other Vessels, who seem disposed to break with the Algerines. The Motives of this Rupture are said to be a Neglect of the Dutch to fulfil the last Treaty with Algiers.

Paris, Feb. 22. By the Peace concluded in Germany, it is said, that all Silesia, and the County of Glats, are guaranteed to his Prussian Majesty; which is all he ever contended for. He would have made Peace upon the same Terms two Years ago.

The King of Prussia will now be looked upon, by all the World, as the HERO of the Age; and will doubtless be a principal Arbitrer of Europe. How will this History astonish future Ages, when they read, that the Empress of Russia, the Queen of Hungary, the King of France and Sweden, and the Elector of Saxony, had laid a deep and premeditated Scheme to destroy him, and so divide his Country among them; and that notwithstanding their Troops were joined by the whole Army of the Empire, and also by the Troops of Austria and Bohemia; yet his Prussian Majesty, by his Conduct and Intrepidity, baffled all their Efforts, and obliged these Powers to Oath their Swords in the Year 1763, and to leave him in actual Possession of that very Country, on the Account of which he was to have been unjustly destroyed.

Paris, Jan. 24. We have received the following Account of the Capture of the Basilisk Bomb, by the Audacious Privateer of Bayonne.

The Audacious, a Frigate of 18 Guns, and 120 Men, commanded by Captain Minbelle, sailed from Bayonne on the 21 of October, and upon the 19th, in the Banks of Newfoundland, fell in with the Basilisk, which carried 18 Guns, and 60 Men. The Engagement began with the greatest Vivacity; the Basilisk's Mizen-Mast was soon carried away; most of her Hands wounded; and the Captain himself received several Wounds; but instead of yielding, he was seen with his drawn Sword, during the Audacious's Men, and exhorting his own People rather to die than to strike. Upon which Captain Minbelle gave Orders for Boarding. The two Vessels soon grappled, and the Engagement became more hot than ever. At last, the English Captain and his First Lieut. being no longer able to escape Death, the French made themselves Masters of the Ship. An Englishman who was on the Point of throwing a Box of Dispatches into the Sea, was prevented by a Blow from a Sabre.

The French Frigate received very little Damage, and had only three Men wounded: Above Half of the Ship's Company of the Basilisk were wounded: The Captain is since dead of his Wounds. He was afterwards taken to Havannah by Admiral Pococke, on the 12th of October. Capt. Minbelle returned to Port Prigade on the 22d Instant. His Prize consisted there a few Days before.

LONDON, February 3. A Gentleman who arrived in Town Yesterday from the West of England, says, that there has been 20 Frogs bred, but as fine, open, serene Weather, as ever was known; and the first Appearance he found of the Frogs, was not till he got upwards of 20 Miles on this Side of Exeter.

We hear from Salazary in Canada, that they never had a more moderate Winter than the present; some having fifteen Frogs or Snow.

On the 16th ult. died at Paris, aged 113, Mr. John Constant, born at Lincoln, in Lancashire, June 4, 1649. He was a Lieutenant on Half-pay of the Regiment of Ville-Marie, and in 5 Years Service received seven Wounds. He quitted the Army in 1688. He used to say, that he was by General St. Hillair's Side when that Officer had his Arm carried off, in the Time Instant that the Great Turbans was killed by a Cannon-Ball.
