This Monarch is full suspected of meditating great Designs; which Suspicion is founded on the Accounts received, that he keeps on Foot all his present Forces, and disbands not even those which made a part of the Allied Army, and which were lately taken into his Service. It is reported that when Word was brought to him, that the Terms of Peace which he desired, were complied with, he said, he had listened to an Accommodation, only to give a few Years Rest to his Troops which were worn out with Fatigue, after which he would employ them to better Purpose, and with more Advantage, than he had done in this War. Some People imagine, that whenever he unsheathes the Sword again, it will be against a certain Northern crowned Head: The Death of Peter III. of Russia, he cannot digest.

BRIDGE-TOWN, BARBADOS, March 24.
On Wednesday the 16th Inst. his Majesty's Sloop Ferret, Peter Clarke, Esq; Commander, arrived here with a very large Prize, about 600 Tons Burthen, mounting 24 Guns, 20 of which proved to be Iron ones, of 9 and 6 Pounders, which he took out of a Bay at the West End of Porto-Rico, on the 11th of February. She was bound from the Carracas to Cadix, but put in there, where she thought she would be secure within a Reef of Rocks and Sands until the Cessation of Arms.—Captain Clarke, however, was not so easily to be baffled by the Difficulty of the Navigation; for after three Days Perseverance, beating to and fro in Sight of the Enemy, founding to find out a Channel he at length got within the Reef, anchored along Side, and after an Engagement of above two Hours, the Dons betook themselves to their Boats, and fled to the Shore, leaving some of their killed and wounded on their Deck. She is thought to be the richest Prize taken in these Seas during the War.

March 31. Richard Willshire, Esq; who arrived here on Monday Evening, from St. Vincent's, brought Advice, That Mr. Neiles Anderson, a Planter on the River Berbicia, who made his Escape with 126 Slaves from thence the 17th Inst. arrived in the River Demarara the 20th, and gave the following Account:

That the Creole Negroes, at the Head of others, to the Number of 3000, on the 2d Inst. took and destroyed 10 Plantations at Connoy; that on the 8th the Governor blew up the Fort, destroyed the Ammunition, and retired, with what Whites had escaped the Negroes on board two Dutch Ships which lay at the Mouth of the River. That he knew of between 40 and 50 Whites the Negroes had put to Death; and was told all that fell into their Hands shared the same Fate, even the Indians and Blacks that would not join them. That they declared, as soon as they had done their Business there, they would proceed to Demarara and Essequibo; and that they had long enough a white Governor, and would be no longer Slaves.

ANNAPOLIS, May 26.
Tuesday last his Excellency, in Council, issued his Proclamation, further Proroguing the General Assembly of this Province to the First of October next, when it will meet for the Dispatch of Public Business.

Last Week the Body of a Man was found on the Shore at Thomas's Point. It is said that a Man of the Name of *Lecompte*, was knock'd overboard in the Bay by a Boom, the beginning of this Month, and 'tis probable it was his Body, but it was much defaced.

On Tuesday last at a Horse-Race, at Talbot County Court-House, one of the Horses fell, and kill'd his Rider, *Francis McKenny*, a Lad, who never spoke after the Fall.

We have the following Account from *Aquia*, in *Virginia*: On Friday the 13th Instant, about VIII in the Evening, they had there, a very severe Gust with very large Hail: A neighbouring Planter's Dwelling-House-Chimney was struck with the Lightning. In the Chimney stood an Iron Spit, one End resting on the Mantle-Piece, and the other pointing up the Chimney; exactly under it stood the Man's Son, a Boy about 7 or 8 Years of Age, who was struck instantly Dead, and the Mantle-Piece shiver'd to Pieces.
