

A Sloop driven ashore near this Place, the Port-part of another smaller one near Royal. In Quest the Sloop is strewn with Weapons and dead Bodies; a great Number of Ships passed, during the Storm, without the Wharfs, for Leith, about whose Safety there is little Reason to be anxious; and above twenty Sail of others got safe into Holy Idrog, though some of them have lost their Masts, and otherwise received Damage; and the Men are generally half-dead, with Hardships and Fatigue.

BOSTON, May 23.

This Day Capt. Gage arrived here in 23 Days from Martinico. A French Man of War was arrived there from France, with several French Officers on board, in order soon to take Possession of that Place. The English were in much Confusion on Account of their moving off so soon.

Extract of a Letter from Surinam, March 22.

A few Days ago an Express arrived here from Berbice, giving an Account that the Negroes of a Plantations, belonging to Mr. Vanderfortet, had burnt the Houses, murdered the white People, and made off. Another Express arrived Yesterday, with Advice, that Twenty-two Plantations more were cut off by the Negroes, who in a most cruel Manner, murdered all the white People they could come at. The Inhabitants are in a most Miserable Condition, being obliged to take Refuge on board the Ships, and it is generally thought that the Colony will be entirely ruined.

By Advice from London, of the 23d of March, we learn, that the House of Commons have voted the same Sum as a Compensation to the Northern Colonies for the Year 1762, as was voted the last Session for 1761; which Sum was 133,000 l. Sterling.

We also hear, that it has been proposed to lower the Duties on French Melasses, from 6d. to 2d. per Gallon, in order the more effectually to secure the Payment; which it was thought would be carried through before the Rising of the Parliament.

Yesterday arrived here Captain Thompion, in 19 Days from the Hayannah, by whom we learn, that our Troops which remain there are in general very healthy, and that they were preparing to embark, as soon as the Spanish Soldiers, &c. should arrive to take Possession of the Place: That the Spanish Prize Men of War were fitted for the Sea, and lay ready to sail for England; but that the two Ships of the Line found on the Stocks were broke up, and the Dock-yards, Store-houses, &c. were all destroyed, and rendered useless.

The rising Generation will now enjoy a Blessing our Fore-fathers were destitute of, and reap those valuable Advantages which the generous Donors had in View, by bestowing their Libraries on an Infant College, that has been honoured and promoted by the Legislature, several publick spirited Gentlemen at home and abroad, and which, every Day, becomes more and more deserving the Countenance, Protection, and Assistance of every Person of Rank and Learning amongst us.

WILLIAMSBURG, May 20.

A Negro Boy in this City, set on by a Couple of Negro Fellows, went in his Mistress's Name to a Shop for some Arsenick to Poison Rats, and got a little; but took the Opportunity, when some Milk and Rice was on the Fire, to drop the Whole amongst it, unperceived: All the Family, consisting of 9 or 10 Persons, eat of it at Dinner, and in a few Minutes after were taken with a violent Vomiting; which creating a Suspicion of Poison being the Occasion, Physicians were immediately called, who ordered them what is necessary in those Cases, and it is hoped are now out of Danger. All the Negroes are taken up, and committed to Prison, and it is hoped will be made Examples of, to deter others from such Villainy.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan 2.

Yesterday arrived a large Spanish Ship bound from the Havannah to Cadiz, having sprung a Leak at Sea, and is in great Distress.

Tuesday arrived here Capt. Whitlock in 26 Days from Barbados, who informs, that two small Pyrate Sloops were cruising near Dominico.

ANNAPOLIS, Jan 9.

An Account, it is said, has been received by an Officer on the Frontiers of Pennsylvania, from Pittsburg, that on the 28th of last Month, Col. Clapham, and several of his People (where they were posted is not said) were killed by the Indians; as were also Two of the Royal Americans at the Saw-Mill near Pittsburg; that it is likewise reported, that the Indians had attacked Fort Detroit, and reduced the Two Posts called Saultki and Frenguit, on the South Side of Lake Erie.

Yesterday arrived here the Sloop *Somerlet*, Capt. Earckson, from St. Christophers, which he left the 15th of May. He informs us, that the Day before he sailed, a Gentleman there received a Letter from Guadaloupe, giving an Account, that a Spanish Pyrate Schooner, of ten Swivel, and two Carriage Guns, had taken Two English Brigs with 20,000 l. in Spices on board. The same Schooner also took a Sloop belonging to New-Prvidence.
