FROM THE LONDON GAZETTE
 WESTMINSTER, April 13

THIS Day his Majesty came to the House of Commons, and being in his Royal Robes seated on the usual Solemnity, Sir *Septimus R. Costlemans* Usher of the Black Rod, was sent from his Majesty to the House of Commons, to give Notice of his Majesty's Attendance in the House of Peers, being come thither accordingly, his Majesty gave his Royal Assent to the several Bills that were presented to him, and was pleased to make the following SPEECH.

My Lords and Gentlemen,
 I CANNOT put an End to this Session, without expressing my Thanks to you for the Zeal and Dispatch which you have shewn in your Proceedings, and which make me to continue it any longer.
 I informed you at your first Meeting, that several Articles were signed by my Minister and the House of Commons, and I ordered them to be laid before the House of Commons, which I felt at the approaching Revolution, upon Conditions so honourable to the British People, was highly agreeable to the Intention of both Houses of Parliament, and the grateful Expressions of their Intire Approbation have been established, and even rendered unobscured to my Subjects by the Definitive Treaty, which the several Allies of my Crown have consented to, and the Powers at War with the King of Prussia, have been induced to accept of Accommodation, as that great Prince, and the Success, which has attended it, has necessarily and immediately diffused its Blessings through every Part of Europe.

I acquainted you with my firm Resolution, to persevere on a Plan of strict Economy, necessary for this Purpose, shall be completed, and altho' the Army maintained in Peace, will be inferior in Number to that of former Times of Peace, yet I trust that the Establishment of the National Militia, as I have experienced, and cannot too much prove a sufficient Security for the future.
 Gentlemen of the House of Commons,
 I have seen, with the highest Concern, the Operations of the Revenue, and the heavy Debts, which the late War, which have reduced you to the Necessity of imposing further Burthens upon the People, in these Circumstances, it is my earnest Desire, by every Means, to their Relief. The Liberty shall be observed in the Disposition of the Money, arising from the Sale of such Prizes as the Crown, shall be disposed, it is my Intention, that the Produce shall be applied to the Public Service.

My Lords and Gentlemen,
 The Extension of the Commerce of my Subjects, and the Advantages we have obtained, by the Increase of the Publick Revenue, are the Objects, to these important and necessary Operations shall be directed. I depend upon you to promote in your several Counties that Spirit of Obedience to Law, which is essential to the Happiness of my faithful Subjects, and to discourage every Attempt of a contrary Tendency, to maintain the Honour of the Crown, and the Rights of my People.

Then the Lord Chancellor, prorogued the Court on the 23rd Day of June next.
St. James's, April 20. His Majesty in his Majesty's Pleasure to declare the Right Hon. *John Mordaunt*, Lieutenant General, and *George Mordaunt*, His Majesty's Kingdome of Ireland, on the 21st of April 22. His Majesty having been pleased to bestow the Privy Seal to his Grace, *Arthur*, Earl of *Ulster*, the Oath of Keeper of the Peace, was administered unto him, and his Majesty's Pleasure accordingly.

ADMIRALTY OFFICE, April 13.
 A Letter from Vice Admiral *Cornwallis*, dated in the Bay of *Antigua*, the 31st of March, is with the greatest Pleasure I have acquainted their Lordships with the Success of his Majesty's Armies in the Reduction of the Island of *St. Vincent*, which was taken by Storm, on the 21st of March. In my Letters of the 23d and 24th I acquainted their Lordships with my Proceedings; after which I used every possible Dispatch, the Decline of the S. W. Wind, of the utmost Importance. To promote the Expedition, I sent the *Elizabeth*, *Griffin*, *Argo*, with such of the Troops, and the *Phoenix*, were to take on board; and on the 27th, under the Command of Commodore *Mallack*, with a View that they might meet there, by the Time I should arrive of the Squadron.
 Having accomplished the Embarkation of the Troops, with a Dispatch, I sailed on the 29th, and on the 31st, a violent Surf prevented us, so that the Ships were obliged to anchor, viz. *Nor-*
