NEW-PORT, June 6.
The Brig Royal Charlotte, Capt. Taylor, arrived here last Thursday from Annamaboa, on the Coast of Africa, after a Passage of 110 Days; by whom we have the affecting Intelligence of the the tragical Death of Capt. George Frost, and Mr. William Grant, his Mate, both of this Town, which was perpetrated by the Slaves on boar, his Sloop, as she lay at Anchor in the River Gaboone, in the Month of November last. Capt. Frost having Occasion either for some Wood or Water, fent two of his Men and a Negro on Shore for that Purpose, himself, the Mate, and a Negro, who belonged to the Vessel, remaining on board; and in the Mens Absence he unfortunately permitted the Slaves, to the Number of about 60, to come upon Deck, who immediately feized him, with the Negro Man, and threw them overboard. Mr. Grant at this Time lay fick in his Cabbin, unable to rife. Capt. Frost swam up to the Vessel, in order to get on board again; upon which the Slaves threw a Lance at him, which penetrated his Body, where it remained, and with which he attempted to gain the Shore, but after swimming about Half the Way, he funk, and was feen no more. The Negro, who was thrown over with him, had the good Fortune to get fafe ashore.

The Slaves having now the Command of the Vessel, they brought the Small Arms, with several Barrels of Powder, upon Deck; and on some Blacks coming off in Canoes to retake the Veffel, the Slaves on board began firing with their Small Arms, but through Ignorance foon fet the Powder on Fire, and in the Explosion about 30 of them were destroyed. The Sloop was retaken 3 Days afterwards, when the most affecting Part of this Affair was disclosed; for on entering the Cabbin, the Corps of Mr. Grant was immediately discovered, with his Throat cut in a very shocking Manner, which was supposed to have been done as soon as Capt. Frost and the Negro were thrown

A short Time before Capt. Taylor failed, he heard that the Slaves on board a Sloop belonging to Liverpool, rose upon the People, wounded the Mate, and got Possession of the Vessel, which asterwards ran ashore and beat to Pieces.
