

James Anderson, a Scotch Gentleman also, lately from Madeira; Mr. David Gammel, and one Mr. Morrison, (both Scotch Gentlemen likewise, the former having resided here many Years, but the latter only a few Months) Mr. Chapman, a young Gentleman from Philadelphia, who but a few Months since inherited an Estate of £. 20,000; Mrs. Henderson, and Mrs. Reynolds, Wife of Capt. Reynolds now at Sea; and a Negro Boy belonging to Mr. De Loge. None of the Bodies of the above-mentioned unfortunate Persons are yet found, tho' a sharp Look Out has been for some Days past kept in the Bay for that Purpose; and 'tis something remarkable, that tho' there were many Boats in the Bay at the Time the Squall came up, not one of them received the least Damage, tho' several of them were to Windward of Mr. Watson's Boat when she over-set.

PHILADELPHIA, August 25.

Extract of a Letter from Lancaster, August 23.

"Just as I had closed my Letter to you, John Hart, an Indian Trader, arrived here from Pittsburgh, and brings the following Account, which you may depend upon; That on the 6th and 6th Colonel Bouquet was attacked by the Indians, and lost and had wounded 110 Men: On the 8th he arrived at Pittsburgh. The Officers killed are Captain Graham, and Lieutenant Campbell; Lieutenant Dow wounded. Mr. Hart declares, the Indians never had so severe a Drubbing since they knew the Use of Powder, &c. 20 of their Great Warriors were found dead, besides a great Number wounded, and dragged away by their Fellows."

Another Letter, from the same Place, mentions "Colonel Bouquet's getting to Pittsburgh, with all his Provisions; and that he had been able to carry all the Wounded with him to the Fort."

And a Third, "That the Hearing of the Colonel's Arrival at Pittsburgh, was an agreeable News to them, as any they had heard the last War."

Mr. Hart left Pittsburgh the Fifteenth Instant.

Extract of a Letter from Niagara, July 25, 1763.

"Since my last, a Man of the New-Jersey Provincials, belonging to this Garrison, was scalped within a Mile and a Half of the Fort, as he was going Express to Fort Schloffer, a Place about 15 Miles from hence, and where they embark, after having crossed the Portage. Two Sailors, belonging to Commodore Loring, have also shared the same Fate, at the Mouth of Lake Erie, where they had gone to embark for Detroit."

In a Letter from Carlisle, dated the 13th Instant, it is said, that some Indians (Engls) have been lately seen in Shearman's Valley; and that on the 11th the Tracks of a Party were found there, supposed to consist of eight or ten, coming through Shearman's Valley, towards Carlisle, about twelve Miles upwards.

In another Letter from the same Place, of August 17, mention is made, that one John Martin, in the Great Cove, seeing an Indian coming up to a House where he was, fired at him; upon which the Indian raised a Yell, and took to a Tree: That Martin imagining there might be more Indians near him, ran to a Company at Work, and told what had happened, when they went to the Place, and found some Blood and Excrements; from which they concluded he was shot through the Bowels. They followed his Track down to a Bottom, where they saw the Tracks of six or seven more; but being a small Party, pursued no further. In the same Letter it is also said, that a young Man, at a Plantation about nine Miles from Carlisle, near the Foot of the Mountain, saw an Indian, and fired at him, at about 50 Yards Distance, but was not sure that he hit him; the Indian took to a Tree, and the Lad went back a little Way, in order to load again, but on his Return could not find the Indian. He then alarmed the Neighbourhood; and the Soldiers being all out in Parties, covering the People gathering in their Grain, upwards of Twenty young Men turned out immediately from Carlisle, to scour the Woods.

From Berks County we have Advice, that on the 16th Instant, they had Intelligence at Captain Kern's Post, on the North Branch of Schuylkill, above the Blue Mountain, of some Indians being seen about eight Miles from thence; on which a Party was sent out, who found their Tracks, but could not come up with them: That the same Day they received further Intelligence that the Enemy were about a Mile off, when a Party pursued, came up with, fired on them, and wounded one Indian, who was seen to fall three times; but there happening to be a severe Gull, they escaped: That soon after the Indians came within 50 Perches of the Guard, and carried off some Horses: And that a reconnoitring Party was fired on by them from a Swamp, when our Men immediately rushed into it, but the Pines and Laurels were so thick, that they could not find them.

Extract of a Letter from Fort Cumberland, dated August 9.

"I have just received Advice by Express, that this Day the Savages killed one Captain Staunton, and another Man, of the Virginia Militia, and wounded three others dangerously, at a Fort above Pearfall's, on the South Branch, but scalped none. There were eleven Men in the Fort; the Party of Indians was between Thirty and Forty, three of whom are thought to be killed. Colonel Stephens will be here To-morrow with 140 or 50 Men. As he has the Command of the Militia of several Counties, he has promised to assist all in his Power, by protecting Bedford and this Garrison."

By a Person from Fort Augusta, we learn that our People were all well there, about fourteen Days ago; but that the Indians, who used to live on the Big Island, on the West Branch of Susquehanna, were all gone off, excepting one old Man, and his two Sons, and are supposed to have joined the other Indians in the War against us.

ANNAPOLIS, September 1.

About a Month or Five Weeks ago, the Wife of John M'Key, a poor Man in Charles County, near Pomsfret, was Delivered of Four Children, Three Boys alive, and One Girl dead; the least of which was Eighteen Inches long; but they all died within a Day after their Birth. It is said she was not come to her full Time; but met with some Accident, which brought on a premature Birth.
