W E T Z L A R, June 1.

THE 28th of last Month, at Two in the Morning, we were greatly alarmed by the sudden Arrival of two Bodies of Troops, one coming from Darmstadt, the other from Giessen, consisting of 2 Regiments of Infantry, 4 Battalions of Militia, and 500 Horse and Hussars, with a Train of 30 Pieces of Cannon. These Troops were no sooner arrived before the Town, than they forced open the Houses of the Burgher Masters, and of the 16 Senators, who were obliged to appear before a Deputation by his Serene Highness the Margrave of Hesse-Cassel. Several Houses have actually from 70 to 80 Soldiers quartered on them, and no Body has Leave to go out of the Town, except the Post: Even the Members of the Imperial Chamber have not this Liberty.

The Margrave's Pretence for treating this Town in the same Manner is, that the Magistrates refused to give the Quarter that arose soon after the Conclusion of the Peace, between his Troops, and a Detachment of those in the Allied Army, escorted by the Soldiers of this City, in the former were repulsed. Several Burghers are accused of having assisted the Allies; and his Serene Highness writes, that the Magistrates, and several of the Senators, were his Officers.

This Morning the Imperial Chamber was assembled; but it is not known what Resolution they have taken. **Edinburgh, June 31.** Yesterday arrived here a Sloop from Ipswich, which, we hear, has brought a considerable Sum of Money, to discharge the Arrears owing by England to the King of Prussia.

L O N D O N, June 4. We hear from Aylesbury that on Saturday, his Majesty's Birthday, their worthy Representative, John Wilkes, Esq; came to that Town. He was met by the most considerable numbers of that and the neighbouring Towns, and conducted to his own House amidst the Acclamations of an immense Number of People. He afterwards gave a grand Entertainment to the Gentlemen of the Borough, and all the Public Houses were opened for the Reception of his Friends. The Inscription on the Stone is as follows:
"The Parliament of Great-Britain having allowed 4000 l. Sterling for Building this Bridge, the first Stone was laid by the Right Honourable Alexander Earl of Home, in Presence of the Trustees met on May 12th, 1763, in the Third Year of the Reign of King GEORGE III. being the Month in which the Union of the Two Kingdoms commenced 56 Years ago."

B O S T O N, August 18. Capt. Wier in a Brig from the West-Indies for this Port, was lately cast away on the Caucas's, the Vessel and Cargo entirely lost, but the Men all saved.

We hear that a Ship belonging to Portsmouth in New-Hampshire, was lately cast away in the West-Indies, having 600 Hogheads of white Sugars on board, which with the Vessel was lost.

Tuesday last the Wife of Mr. Samuel Choate, of Charlestown, was safely delivered of three Children at a Birth, viz. two Boys and a Girl, who are now well, and in good Health; as is also Mrs. Choate. They were all christened on Sunday last by the Names of Samuel, James, and Susannah.

August 22. Thursday last three Indians arrived here in the Province Sloop, Capt. Saunders, from Penobscot. We hear they are come to treat for a Peace.

We hear from Hartford, that last Saturday Capt. Thomas Colyer, of that Place, eat Two Dozen of Cucumbers and a Water, but survived it only an Hour or Two.

N E W - Y O R K, August 29. A just Relation of Col. BOUQUET's Engagement with the Indians, near Fort PITT.

IT is with great Satisfaction we can acquaint the Public, of the Arrival of Col. BOUQUET, with the Troop under his Command, at Fort PITT, on the 10th Instant, after having totally routed a very considerable Body of Indians, who attacked his Little Army on the Fifth and Sixth, near Bushy-run; the Largeness of the Convoy, and Night coming on, prevented the Colonel from pursuing the Savages the first Day; and the next Morning the Indians renewed the Attack, with great Fierceness; but Col. Bouquet had made such a Disposition for their Reception as succeeded to his utmost Wishes; the Troops, at a proper Time, rushing on the Villains, with their fixed Bayonets, and following their Blow with an Intrepidity that at once completed the Rout, which became general, and our Troops pursued the Savages for a considerable Distance, wounding many in the Flight: It is

By a Ship which is arrived at Hamburg, that brought home 216 Quarters of Blubber from Greenland, there is an Account that the Whale Fishery had turned out pretty well this Season.

June 25. By a Letter from the Cape of Good Hope, dated the 1st of February last, there is an Account that some few Days before, a French Man of War arrived there, who brought Advice, that the Walpole Indian, Capt. Fenner, bound to Bengal, had been taken off the Heights of Zealoo, by 2 French Ships; and that Part of her Cargo, particularly Broad Cloth, was selling there very cheap.

A Genoese Ship, richly laden, is taken in Sight of Leghorn, by a Barbary Pirate, and the Crew, together with 25 Passengers, both Men and Women, made Slaves.

They write from Magdeburgh, that the King of Prussia has ordered a Reduction in the Prices of all Eatables and Drinkables; and that all Monopolizers of any Provisions whatever, should be punished with the utmost Rigour of the Law.

The Call for Woollen Goods for Spain is now as great as ever has been. The Baize-makers have so many Orders, that they cannot comply with them before Sept. or longer.

July 1. The Actions commenced by the Journeymen Printers, are in their own Names, for false Imprisonment, when they were taken up on Suspicion of Printing the North Briton, No. 45.

We are desired to assure the Public that Mr. Wilkes is proceeding against the Secretaries of State, and with all the Messengers, with the utmost Spirit and Vigour, and with all the Dispatch which the known Delay of the Law admits.

The Chevalier Carrion, Secretary to the Spanish Embassy at the Court of France, is coming over to England, to settle what is owing for the Maintenance of the Spanish Prisoners of War.

Letters from Holland advise, that a Resolution has been taken by the States General to send 2000 Men to endeavour to recover Barbatus from the Negroes; which Troops are to be draughted from the several Garrisons.

His Majesty entered Hyde Park Yesterday Morning exactly ten Minutes before Nine, and retired at Twelve: He was mounted on a fine dark Bay Horse, who started at the last Firing of the Cannon, and had like to have thrown his Majesty; one of the Footmen afterwards walked by the Horse's Side, holding the Reins till his Majesty got through the Crowd to the Queen's House.

We hear that the Right Hon. the Marquis of Granby gave 100 Guineas to the Company of the Train of Artillery, for their excellent Performance Yesterday in Hyde Park.

When the Foundation Stone of the Bridge over the Tweed at Coldstream was laid (the 18th ult.) by the Right Hon. Alexander Earl of Home, in Presence of the Trustees appointed for that Purpose, his Lordship made the following Speech on the Occasion:

I pray GOD to give Success and Stability to the Work, that it may remain a Monument of real Union between the two People to the latest Posterity. Happy for the future if no other Disputes ever more arise among us but shall be to the best Subject, the best Countryman, and the best Neighbour."

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imagined that at least Sixty of the Savages were slain in the two Encounters; and it is certain that Keekyuskung, one of the first Ringleaders of the Mischief in those Parts, is among the Dead, his Body being well known: The Wolfe is likewise supposed to be killed, his Rifle having been found; and Butler, another of the Chiefs, was killed at Fort Pitt.

This great and reasonable Defeat, has not been accomplished without Loss on our Side; altho' there never were Troops that behaved with more Coolness, Firmness, and real Resolution, it being remarkable, that not a Man discovered the least Confusion. Capt. Lieut. Graham, and Lieut. James M'Intosh, of the 42d, and Lieut. Randall, of the Rangers, are killed; Capt. John Graham, and Lieut. Duncan Campbell, of the 42d; Lieut. James Dow, of the 60th; Lieut. Donald Campbell, and Volunteer Peebles, of the 77th, are wounded; and we have lost in the whole Forty-nine Men.

Some of the Brutes were scalped by the Pack-Horse Men, and Rangers; but the Regular Troops would not touch the Bodies after they were dead: Their whole Attention was to execute their Duty in pursuing the Runaways, which they did, till it was judged necessary to order them to stop.
