RATISBON, June 23.

A VILLAGE named *Vohenstraus*, six Miles  
from *Sulzbach*, which had been already burnt  
down four Times, and since the last, re-  
built in a most beautiful Manner, has lately  
been destroyed by Fire a Fifth Time. On  
the 9th of June, in the Afternoon, a Fire  
broke out in the Market Place, which, by the Violence of  
the Wind, in less than Half an Hour set Fire to the whole  
Market, whereby 152 Dwelling-Houses, 202 Barns, the  
Church, Steeple, and Bells, the Town-house with the Re-  
cord, the Protestant and Romish Places of Public Worship,  
together with all their Effects and Libraries, and all the  
schools, were reduced to Ashes, and but few small Habitati-  
ons, were saved. The Inhabitants saved little or nothing of  
their Effects, most of them having enough to do to save their  
Lives; and their Distress is very great, having neither  
Money, nor Bread. Some Persons were unfortu-  
nately burnt, and many greatly hurt. Some Wagon Loads  
of bread have been sent by the Magistrates of *Walden* to the  
Relief of those unfortunate Persons.  
Paris, June 3. This Day the following Ordinance was  
published here.

By the KING.

Be it known to all Men, that a good, firm, permanent,  
and solid Peace, with an entire and sincere Reconcilia-  
tion, has been made and agreed upon, between the most  
Christian Prince *Lewis*, by the Grace of God, King of France  
and Navarre, our Sovereign Lord: The most high, most ex-  
cellent, and most potent Prince *Joseph*, King of Great-  
Britain, Elector of *Brunswick Lunenburg*: And the most  
high, most excellent, and most potent Prince *Joseph*, King  
of Portugal, and of the Algarves, their Vassals, Subjects  
and Servants, in all their Kingdoms, Countries, Territories  
and Lordships, under their Obedience: That the said Peace  
is general between them, and their said Vassals and Subjects;  
and that by Means thereof, they are permitted to go, come,  
and sojourn in all the Places of the said Kingdoms,  
Streets, and Countries; to Traffick, and carry on Trade,  
and to have Communication with each other, as they shall  
see proper, and to this with all Liberty, Freedom and Safety,  
and without any Molestation, or Interruption, and that  
the whole shall be practised, in Time of good, sincere and  
solid Peace, such as that which it has pleased the Divine  
Goodness to give to the said Lord the King, to the said Lord  
the King of Great-Britain, Elector of *Brunswick Lunenburg*,  
and to the said Lord the King of Portugal, and of the  
Algarves, and to their People and Subjects. And in order  
to maintain them therein, it is most expressly forbidden to all  
Persons, of what Quality and Condition soever they may be,  
to undertake, attempt, or innovate any Thing to the con-  
trary, or to the Prejudice thereof, on Pain of being severely  
punished, as Violators of Peace, and Disturbers of the public  
Tranquillity. And to the End that no one may pretend Ig-  
norance hereof, these Presents shall be read, published, and  
affixed where it shall be necessary. Done at *Verfailles*, the  
31st Day of June, 1763. Signed *Louis*. And lower, the Due  
de *Enghien*, and sealed with the small private Seal.

LONDON, June 21.

Extract of a Letter from *Lisbon*, May 30.  
Tomorrow is appointed for four Regiments of Foot to  
be reviewed before the King; but as the Weather is set in  
rain, we presume it will be put off. They exercise after  
the English Method, and they say perform very well, and  
make a good Appearance. A Black Eagle, set round with  
Diamonds, is ordered from England (the Workmen here  
cannot do it) of the Value of 100,000 Cruzadoes, or  
Crowns of this Country; and there is likewise ordered from  
England, a large Service of fine Plate, to be presented to  
him.

June 23. Our Troops repossessed themselves of Port Ma-  
hon the 21st of May, after being dispossessed of it about Eight  
Years.

We are informed, that there never was a greater Prospect  
of Plenty than is now in *Lincolnshire, Yorkshire, Lancashire*,  
&c.

Yesterday the Rev. Mr. Entick, Mr. Arthur Beardmore,  
his Clerk, and Messrs. Willson and Fell, were discharged by  
the Court of King's Bench from the Recognizances they  
were obliged to enter into in last Michaelmas Term, on Ac-  
count of several Numbers of the Monitor, concerning which  
no Prosecution has been carried on. We hear these Gentle-  
men intend to bring Actions for false Imprisonment.

We are assured, that there are already some Alterations  
between our Court and that of France in regard to the Ship-  
building carrying on in different Ports of that Kingdom.

We hear that above Fifty Transports are kept still in the  
Government's Service.

Notice is given at the General Post-Office, that the Post-  
Masters General have added a Fifth Packet-Boat to the  
New-York Station, in order to have a Speedier Correspondence  
from London to any Part of North America; and that  
for the future the Mails will be dispatched from the General  
Post-Office and New-York the second Saturday of every  
Month, and the Boats will fall immediately after the Mail  
has been boarded, Wind and Weather permitting.

They write from *Brest* that a Convoy with all Sorts of  
Provisions was to sail from *Rockfort* the 16th of May for the  
Islands of *St. Pierre and Miquelon*.

June 30. We hear that *Sir Charles Frederick*, Surveyor  
General to the Office of Ordnance, will set out in a few  
Days to view the Fortifications round the Coast, and par-  
ticularly to give Instructions for erecting a new Fortification  
in *Milford Haven*.

Extract of a Letter from *Portsmouth*, June 29.

On Monday his Majesty's Ships *Rainbow* and *All-*  
*borough* fell down from *Spithead* to *St. Helena's*, to wait for a  
Wind, in order to sail to North America to their several Sta-  
tions.

Sunday arrived at *Plymouth* the *Intrepid Man* of War  
from *New-York*.

The Parliament will not meet for the Dispatch of Busi-  
ness till the 11th of next January.

By a Gentleman who arrived on Thursday Evening from  
*Dunkirk*, we learn, that all the Fortifications of that Place  
were almost entirely destroyed; and that in a few Days the  
Workmen were to begin to stop up the Harbour so far as to  
prevent Ships of Burthen sailing into it.

July 2. A Letter from on board the Royal Captain *Indi-*  
*daman*, arrived at *Spithead* from *China*, says, Without doubt  
you have heard of the unhappy Fate which happened to the  
*Elizabeth*, in the *Bay of Tigris*, near *Canton* in *China*, the 31st  
of January, 1763. She took Fire between *Ten* and *Eleven*  
o'Clock at Night, when every Body was asleep in their Ham-  
mocks; and the Fire had got to such a Head before the Alarm  
was given, that in about Half an Hour after she blew up, and  
the Masts, Sails, and Rigging, went overboard. We had not  
Time to get the Boat out. It was a most shocking and dismal  
Sight to see so many poor Souls, seen in the Rigging, and others  
floating in the Sea; and being Fear Legged from any Shore,  
and Two from any Ship, before we could get any Assistance, we  
were obliged either to fly and be burnt, or jump into the Sea.  
We lost our Captain, Second and Fifth Masters, with Forty-four  
Men. Eight and myself were taken up by the *Harbour's* Boat.

The *Walpole* was taken outward bound by two French  
Men of War and a Frigate in the Month of September, in  
Sight of *Zealooan*. The Captain and some of the Crew were  
at the Cape; the rest at *Mauritius*.

Charge of the Royal Captain, from *China*, viz. 2000 Pieces  
of *Nankeen Cloth*, 1070 lb. of *Sagoe*, 391,400 lb. of  
*Bohea Tea*, 42,200 lb. ditto *Congo*, 207,900 lb. ditto *Sin-*  
*glo*, 123,300 lb. *Tutuague*, 52 Chests, 98 half ditto, and  
one Box, of *China Ware*, besides several Parcels of Goods,  
the Particulars whereof are not yet known.

July 9. Orders are given for the Commanders of such  
Sloops and Vessels as have been put in Commission, and not  
yet failed, to be as expeditious as possible in putting to Sea,  
and sailing to their respective Stations, to cruise on the  
Smugglers.

A Gentleman in the City having laid a Wager of 500 l.  
that *Dunkirk* Harbour and Fortifications would not be com-  
pletely destroyed, determined to go over himself and examine.  
He is now returned, and acknowledges his Wager lost. The  
whole Fortifications and *Bastion*, he says, are completely de-  
stroyed, so as that they could not be reinstated in 20 Years  
at least, if it were intended; and that what now is destroyed  
since the Peace, cost upwards of Five Millions Sterling, at  
different times, to complete it.

A Gentleman at *Fort William*, in *Bengal*, to his Friend  
in *London*, by the Ship *Godolphin*, just arrived, dated Fe-  
bruary 17, 1762, says, We have all been greatly alarmed by  
an Earthquake, which we have all seen, viz. An Earth-  
quake, whereby the whole Earth about *Calcutta* was in violent  
Agitation for four Minutes, but happily very little Damage  
done. At *Chitragong*, a Subordinate to this Place, they felt  
Twelve Shocks, which shook down all the Brick Buildings in  
the Place; and at a little Distance from the Factory, the Earth  
opened, and Water and Mud gushed out in great Abundance;  
and there was a Chasm in the Place Three or Four Feet  
wide. At *Burdwan*, another Subordinate, a large River was  
entirely dried up, by a large Bank of Sand which rose in the  
middle of it; and the Consequence of which was, that in a short  
Time the ancient Bed of the River was deserted by its Waters,  
and is now as dry as any Part of the Country.

Yesterday Morning at Nine, came on at *Guildhall*, before  
Lord Chief Justice Pratt, of the Common Pleas (who for  
the greater Convenience of the Council, Jury, &c. sat where  
the Court of King's Bench is usually held) the Cause wherein  
Mr. William Heckell, one of the Journeyman Printers who  
were apprehended on Account of the North Briton, No. 45;  
was Plaintiff, for false Imprisonment, and the King's Mes-  
sengers Defendants. The Counsel for the Plaintiff were Mr.  
Serjeant Glynne, Mr. Stow, Mr. Dunning, Mr. Wallace,  
Mr. Serjeant Glynn, Mr. Stow, Mr. Dunning, Mr. Attorney and  
Mr. Gardner: For the Defendants, Mr. Serjeant  
Mr. Solicitor General, Mr. Serjeant Whitaker, Mr. Serjeant  
Mr. Naires, Mr. Serjeant Davy, and Mr. Yates. The Attorney  
for the Plaintiff was Mr. James Phillips of *Cecil-Street*; and  
for the Defendant was Mr. Philip Carteret Webb, Esq; of the *Trea-*  
*sury*, and Mr. Secondary Barnes. At Eight in the Evening,  
the Jury, which was Special, and consisted of eminent Mer-  
chants, after withdrawing Eleven Minutes, brought in a  
Verdict for the Plaintiff in 300 Pounds Damages, and full  
Costs of Suit. After the Trial was over, a Bill of Exceptions  
was brought by the Attorney and Solicitor General. Huc-  
kell was also given in Twelve other Causes, com-  
menced against the same Defendants, by Messrs. William  
Gibson, Francis Stoly, George Morgan, Benjamin Bore,  
John Christie, John Strode, Robert M'Leser, Henry Sabine,  
Whitfield Hayes, Michael Corry, George Saville Carey,

and David Sloss, who are Printers, and were apprehended,  
on the same Account, in 200 l. Damages to each Plaintiff,  
with full Costs of Suit.

The whole Damages given against the King's Messengers  
in the Fourteen Causes, which have been tried, amount to  
3,900 l. besides all the Costs of Suit, which will be very  
considerable.

It is remarkable that this is the first Attack that has been  
made upon the Authority of Secretaries of State, and will  
abolish the dangerous Practice of issuing general and anti-  
constitutional Warrants.

Nothing could equal the Spirit and Magnanimity of the  
Jury in their inviolable Resolution to decide this very im-  
portant Point, and refusing to find a special Verdict, though  
strenuously contended for by the Defendant's Counsel; and  
no Age has produced a Determination of more general and  
extensive Consequence to every free-born ENGLISHMAN.

At *Glasgow*, in *Scotland*, the Effigy of *John Wilkes*, Esq;  
has been burnt, on Account of the Reflections in the *North*  
*Briton* on the Character of a noble Peer who is a Native of  
that Kingdom.

July 12. Next Michaelmas Term will be tried the Actions  
which Mr. Wilkes has brought against *Philip Carteret Webb*  
and *Robert Wood*, Esquires.

We are informed that the Rev. Mr. Entick, Mr. Arthur  
Beardmore and his Clerk, and Messrs. Willson and Fell, have  
given Notice to the Right Hon. the Earl of *Halifax*, in  
pursuance of the Act of Parliament of the 24th of the late  
King (on which the Bill of Exceptions last Week exhibited  
at *Guildhall* on the Trial of the Journeyman-Printers is  
founded) that they shall bring their several Actions against  
his Lordship and the Messengers for their Imprisonment, on  
Account of the several Numbers of the Monitor, concerning  
which no Prosecutions having been carried on, their several  
Recognizances were by the Court of King's Bench discharged  
the last Day of last Term.

The Duke of *Cumberland* Packet-Boat, *Goodridge*, is ar-  
rived at *Falmouth* with the Mail from *New-York*, in 25  
Days.

July 12. By Advices lately received from *Bengal*, we hear,  
the Ship *Fatty John*, bound from *Surat* to *Bengal*, richly  
laden with fine Cotton, was taken on the 24th of September  
last, by three French Men of War, near *Cochin* on the *Ma-*  
*labar Coast*; the Commodore took out the Captain and all  
the European Sailors, except *Richard Price*, the chief Mate,  
and left on board 20 Lascars; and put on board the Prize  
4 French Officers, 8 prime Sailors, and one Lascar; and  
ordered them to steer for *Mauritius*; on the 14th they lost  
Sight of the French Ships. *Richard Price*, being a bold and  
resolute Officer, spirited up the Lascars to stand by him in  
order to recover the Ship; on which a bloody Engagement  
ensued; ten of the French were killed before they would give  
up the Ship. The above *Richard Price* is arrived safe with  
his Prize at *Bengal*.

Yesterday Morning about One o'Clock a Fire broke out at  
the *Crane* or *New Stairs*, Wapping, which burnt with great  
Fierceness for four Hours, before it could be stopt, and con-  
sumed all the Houses from the *New Stairs* to *King James's*  
*Stairs*, and from the *River Side* back to the *Garden Ground*,  
which includes both Sides of the Street called *Wapping-wall*,  
and part of *New Gravel-Lane*; it ended in consuming Mr.  
*Willson's* large and fine Cooperage. The Number of Houses  
burnt are computed about 170, besides Ware-houses, Docks,  
&c. and it is reckoned 1300 Persons, House-keepers, Lodg-  
ers, &c. are burnt out. In the Dock by *Crane Stairs* was  
the *Mary Galley*, Capt. *Clarke*, a fine Ship in the *West*  
*India Trade*, almost ready to come out of Dock, which was  
entirely consumed to the Keel, with all the Materials about  
the Dock. It is said the Fire broke out in *Gibson's* Small-  
beer Brewery, and immediately communicated itself to the  
*Ship Alehouse*; and the Wind blowing from the South,  
carried the Flames to the Dock-yard, and other Houses ad-  
joining; and the Street being narrow, greatly impeded the  
Working of the Engines. Two Men are said to be buried  
in the Ruins; and a Fireman, by the falling in of part of a  
Wall, had his Skull fractured.

The Damage done by the late Fire in *Wapping* is so confi-  
derable, that the *Sun-Fire Office* alone will have 40,000 l.  
to pay the Sufferers.

July 16. We learn by some of our People that are return-  
ed from *Brest*, who carried over a Frigate, bought on the  
French King's Account, that the French behaved very oddly  
to them, and were more scrupulous than ever we were in  
Time of War, even to our greatest Enemies; hurried them  
on board a small Sloop, which sailed with the Frigate to  
bring them back, without suffering them to take in Water,  
though they told the Harbour-master they had only 30 Gal-  
lons on board, which was not a Gallon for each Man.  
What must have become of these People, had not the Wind  
favoured them?

A Scheme is ready to be presented to the Government for  
establishing a new Commerce in *Florida*.

Extract of a Letter from *Armagh*, July 6.

I suppose you have several Accounts in *Dublin* concerning the  
Disturbances we have in the North, on Account of the heavy  
Coffin laid on last Affairs. There are great Numbers risen on  
this Occasion, in different Parts of the Country, and this Day  
great many of them paraded at the *Market Hill*, and from thence  
proceeded to the *Mr. ...*, who lives near *Ball's Mill*, in the  
*Mountains*, in order to chastise him (as they have done since  
others already) for being instrumental in laying on this Coffin.  
A Person coming from *Newry* this Morning, met them a little  
beyond *Market-Hill*, all marching in Order, and many of them  
armed. He says they fired at least two Miles of the Road,  
and were formed into Companies, with each a Standard, of  
Colours, displayed; of which he says he counted Thirty, with  
Drums, Horns, Fiddles and Bagpipes. They have crested several
