Court at St. JAMES'S, June 1, 1763. PRESENT,
The KING's Most Excellent MAJESTY in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, entitled, *An Act for the further Improvement of his Majesty's Revenue of Customs; and for the Encouragement of Officers making Seizures; and for the Prevention of the clandestine Running of Goods into any Part of his Majesty's Dominions*, it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That for the more effectual Prevention of the infamous Practice of Smuggling, and for the Encouragement of the Officers and Seamen of all such Ships and Vessels of War belonging to his Majesty, his Heirs, Successors, who may be employed in preventing the clandestine Running of Goods on the Coasts of Great-Britain, Ireland, and of the other Dominions and Colonies belonging to the Crown of Great-Britain, one Moiety of the Produce arising by the Sale of Smuggling Vessels, and of the Goods, which shall be seized after the first Day of January 1763, and condemned and sold according to Law (the Value whereof being first deducted) shall be vested in the Officers and Seamen; and his Majesty is thereby empowered to cause the same to be divided amongst the said Officers and Seamen, in such Proportions, and in such Manner as his Majesty, his Heirs, and Successors, shall think proper and direct, by any Orders of Council, or by any Proclamation, or by any Order of Court, or by any other Means, for that Purpose; and his Majesty is likewise empowered by the said Act, to make a Distribution of any Part of all and every the Seizures that shall be made by Officers and Seamen respectively; the Money arising by the Sale of which other Part is directed by the said Act to be paid to the Exchequer. His Majesty taking the same into his special Consideration, is hereby pleased, pursuant to the Power vested in him by the said Act, and by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, to order, direct, and appoint, that the Moiety of Seizures, granted by the said Act to the Officers and Seamen as aforesaid, be divided in the following Manner; videlicet.

With Regard to Seizures made by the Officers and Men of Ships and Sloops of War.
The Captain or Captains of any such Ships or Sloops, shall be actually on board at the Seizure of any Smuggling Vessel, or prohibited Goods, three eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them; to the Captains of Marines, and Forces, Sea Lieutenants and Mariners on board any Ships or Sloops, one eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them; to the Lieutenants and Quarter Masters of Marines, and Lieutenants, Bagnons, and Quarter Masters of Forces, Boatswain, Gunner, Purser, Carpenter, Master-Mate, Surgeon, Pilot, and Chaplain, on board any Ships or Sloops, one eighth Part to be equally divided amongst them; to the Midshipmen, Secretary to Flag Officers, the Clerk, Master Sail-maker, Carpenter's Mates, Gunner's Mates, Gunner's Mates, Master at Arms, Cornet, Yeomen of the Sheets, Coxswain, Quarter Masters, Gunner's Mates, Surgeon's Mates, Yeomen of the Gun Room, and Sergeants of Marines or Land Forces, on any such Ships or Sloops, one eighth Part, to be equally divided amongst them; to the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunner, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward, Cook's Mate, Gunsmith, Cooper, Swabber, Trumpeter, Barber, able Seamen, ordinary Seamen, Marine, or other Soldiers, and all other Persons doing duty on board any such Ships or Sloops, two eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them.

With Regard to Seizures made by the Officers and Men of Cutters, commanded by Lieutenants.
The Lieutenant commanding such Cutter, who shall be on board at the Seizure of any Smuggling Vessel, or prohibited Goods, one Half Part; to the second Master, or Master's Mate, and the Midshipmen on board such Cutter, one eighth Part; to the second Master and the Midshipmen to have two third Parts thereof, to be a Pilot Extraordinary on board at the making of such Seizure, the second Master and Pilot, or Master's Mate, in that Case, to have one Moiety of the said eighth Part, and the other Moiety is to be equally divided between the Pilot Extraordinary and Midshipmen. To the Clerk, Steward, Boatswain's Mate, Gunner's Mate, Carpenter's Mate, and Surgeon's Mate on board any such Cutter, one eighth Part; to the able Seamen, ordinary Seamen, and other Persons doing Duty, and assisting on board any Cutter, two eighth Parts, to be equally divided amongst them.

With Regard to Seizures made by Ships or Sloops of War in Conjunction with Cutters.
In all such Cases, the Moiety which is given to the Officers and Men who shall make such Seizure, be divided into many equal Parts, or Shares, as there may be Ships, Cutters, and Cutters concerned therein, and that those Parts be distributed to the Officers and Men of the Ships, Cutters, and Cutters, according to the foregoing Proportions.

His Majesty doth hereby further order, direct and appoint, That in case any Seizure shall be made in any of his Majesty's Colonies abroad, belonging to the Crown of Great-Britain, his Majesty's Ships or Vessels, being Part of the Armament, or serving under the Orders of a Flag Officer, or a Commodore, with a Captain under him, such Flag Officer

or Commodore, shall have one fourth Part of the other Moiety of the said Seizure, which is directed by Act of Parliament to be paid into the Receipt of his Majesty's Exchequer: And in case any Sea Captain, inferior Commission or Warrant Sea Officers, belonging to any such Ship or Vessel, for whom any Shares of Seizures are hereby allowed, be absent at the Time of making such Seizure, the Share of such Sea Captain, inferior Commission, or Warrant Sea Officer, shall be cast into the Shares hereby allowed to the Trumpeters, Quarter Gunners, Carpenter's Crew, Steward, Cook, Armourer, Steward's Mate, Cook's Mate, Gunsmith, Cooper, Swabber, Ordinary Trumpeter, Barber, able Seamen, ordinary Seamen, and Marine or other Soldiers, and all other Persons doing Duty or assisting on board any such Ship or Vessel, to be equally divided amongst them. Provided, That if any Officer, or Officers, on board of any such Ships or Sloops, at the Time of making such Seizures, shall have more Commissions or Offices than One, he or they shall be entitled only to the Share which, according to the above-mentioned Distribution, shall belong to his or their respective superior Commissions or Offices. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to cause his Majesty's Pleasure, hereby signified, to be duly complied with.

DUBLIN, July 23.
BY a Letter from the North, by Yesterday's Post we have an Account, that last Week 2000 of the Hearts of Oak, assembled in Dungannon, in order to meet Mr. —, who appeared and swore to their Demands. The next Day all the County towards Carraneel, Aghnacloy, Trugh, and those Parts adjoining, assembled to a prodigious Number, and went to the House of Mr. —, where there was a Party of the Army drawn up, but the Hearts of Oak not valuing that, marched on boldly, and at the Head of the Army met Mr. —, and desired him to sign their Paper, and swear to the Contents therein, but he hesitating awhile one of their Captains presented a Gun at him, and swore he would shoot him dead, if he did not come to his Terms; on which he consented, and was sworn. This gave them so much Spirits, that they fired a Volley by Way of Triumph, which so frightened about 1000 of their Horse (that they had as a Corps de Reserve, and who imagined that the Army had fired at their Foot) that they immediately turned Tail, and the greatest Flight ever known was there, Horses falling, Men bruising, and running to hide in the Fields, Horses coming home without their Riders, Wives running for the Corpses of their Husbands, and such like, was the Case.

Londonderry, July 24. Our City is become a City of Refuge, for there is scarce a Reitor or Tythe Farmer within 40 Miles but what is come to us, for Fear of the People called Hearts of Oak: They are become so very numerous, that they are computed to be above 40,000. The main Body is now at Newtownstewart and Omagh, and there are several Parties gone to different Places in the Country. Our Mayor had two Letters from them this Day, posted in Strabane, telling him that they would pay him a Visit with 15000; and as they were informed he was putting the City in a Posture of Defence, they did not mean to come within Cannon Shot, but would surround the Town till he would send out the Clergy. Our Officers and Soldiers have been busy all this Afternoon, placing the Cannon where they will be most useful if there should be Occasion for them, but my Opinion is, they will not trouble us.

Monaghan, July 30. There has been another Engagement between the Oak Boys and a Troop of Horse in a most remarkable Place called Watled-Bridge, in the County of Fermanagh, on the same Spot that King William's Army defeated King James's, with the Loss of 6000 of his Troops. Mr. Coote being informed that a great Number of Oak Boys were to assemble on Wednesday last between Red Hill and Watled-Bridge, took a Troop with him from Clonish, a Corporal, and eight Soldiers, with several of his own Friends: They set out for Watled-Bridge, and arrived there about Two in the Afternoon; when they were met by a great Number of Oak Boys, armed with different Weapons, and addressed himself in the most polite and humane Manner to the advanced Party to disperse, but they persisted; but upon the Appearance of the Troop they all dispersed and ran off, except about 100 of them: one of them was

so rash as to fire a Shot, which was returned by the Troops, who killed seven, and the rest ran away as fast as possible; but the Ground being marshy on each Side of the Road, the Horses could not pursue them, but the Foot followed very closely, wounded 14 of them, took about 30 Prisoners, and carried them to Cavan Goal.

Armagh, July 30. John Bond, Esq; who so remarkably signalized himself on the Landing of Thurot, has now at the Head of a Party of Hale's Light Dragoons, at 3 o'Clock in the Morning, surprized a Thousand Oak Boys, took the two Ringleaders or Captains, viz. Glas and Williamson, Prisoners, and lodged them in Armagh Goal; the Engagement was very smart for some Time, but happily attended with dispersing them all.

Extract of a Letter from Col. Wedderburn to the Earl of Hillsborough, dated Omagh, July 26.
"I take the Liberty to acquaint your Lordship, that last Night three Companies of the 68th Regiment, under the Direction of Dr. Knight, fired on a Body of the Hearts of Oak at Newtownstewart, they killed four, wounded seven or eight, and took 77 Prisoners; of the Prisoners 37 are sent to this Goal, and 40 to Londonderry. A great Captain of the Rioters, one Robinson, is amongst the killed."

Armagh, Aug. 3. The Hearts of Oak are now distressed as much as they were before exalted; they are hiding in Holes and Corners, and the Light Horses in pursuit of some of them every Night. There are five of them now in our Goal. I am informed that upwards of 80 have been indicted at our last Assizes, but who they are is a Secret until they are taken, so that every one who has been concerned in this unhappy Affair is afraid that they are of the Number of indicted Persons, and consequently obliged to fly; so that the Country is deserted by a great Part of its Inhabitants, and the Harvest in Danger of being lost; our Linen trade is likewise destroyed, as few Weavers are left in the Country.

August 16. We hear an Express arrived Yesterday from Dublin with an Account that the Oak-Boys were entirely dispersed by the prudent Management of the Nobility and principal Gentry of the several Counties, and were all gone home.

Extract of a Letter from Omagh, July 27.
"On Sunday the 24th, Dr. James Knight was told by Judge Scott, at Omagh, (on his Way from Derry, to begin the North-West Circuit) that there was an absolute Necessity for his going to Newtownstewart, to prevent a Junction of the People of Eight Parishes, who called themselves Hearts of Oak, that were to unite at Ballynihil, near Newtownstewart, next Day, believed to amount to about 15,000 Men, armed with Guns, &c. They intended if their entire Union had succeeded, that Day to go to Strabane and Derry, to seize on several Gentlemen who were obliged to fly to Derry to save themselves from the Outrages they feared from them. Dr. Knight accordingly went with the Troops, and marched through Newtownstewart on the Road to Strabane, where a large Body was observed advancing on Horseback, with their Colours flying. On seeing the Troops they halted; the Troops kept marching on; on which they began to disperse. The Captain then ordered the Under Sheriff, Patrick Montgomery, Gent. with his posse, to pursue them, consisting of John Crawford, of Newtownstewart, Esq; John Wallace, High Constable of the Barony of Omagh, and six others, all well mounted, who took the Man who held the Colours, and several of the rest, and entirely dispersed that Body. The Troops with their Prisoners, returned to Newtownstewart, in order to refresh themselves and secure the Prisoners. Before the former could be done, another large Body appeared on a Plain near Dr. Palister's, amounting to upwards of 3000 Men. The Troops forded the River, and advanced towards them, on which they began to fly. The Sheriff and his posse pursued them, and took in the former, this, and several subsequent Pursuits, 77 Prisoners, with a Quantity of Arms of different Kinds, Captain Dymally, with the Forces, always coming up to support the Sheriff's posse. This Body being entirely dispersed, we again returned to Newtownstewart."
