ANNAPOLIS, November 10 Yesterday Afternoon, there was a Conference, by Conferees appointed by Both Houses Assembly, relating to the Inspection Law, it is said, all Obstacles against its Passing settled.

Thursday last Mr. Henry Steel, Merchant of Dorchester, was Elected a Representative for County, in the Room of the Honourable Goldborough, Esq; now a Member of the House.

On the 30th of last Month, Died in Calvert County, in the full Bloom of Life, Mrs. SALLIE CHEW, the agreeable and virtuous Consort of Mr. Samuel Chew, and second Daughter of James Whem; whose amiable Deportment in Stations of Daughter, Sister, Wife, Mistress, Neighbour (being a very few Hours a Maid) gain'd her the Esteem of all her Acquaintance, whom her immature Death is regretted.

A few Days ago near West-River, Beaufort, a Lad of about Fifteen Years of Age, unfortunately lost his Life by a Fall off a Tree. He was out with his Father, to kill Squab, who having shot one which lodged on a limb, his Son climb'd up to shake it down, and his Feet slipping from the Limb on which he stood, his Weight broke that by which he held, and his falling broke another, and he fell on his third, (which it is suppos'd kill'd him) and to the Ground, in all 46 Feet.

Another unhappy Disaster happen'd very lately in Baltimore County, near Mr. O'Brien's Works: A little Girl about 4 or 5 Years of Age being left alone for a few Minutes in a Room where there was a Fire. It by some Accident catch'd her Callico Frock or Gown, and she perished so terribly that she Died in a few Hours. [This may Caution Parents against Cloathing their Little Ones with Callico, especially in Cold Weather, as many Accidents of the same Kind, have happen'd.]
