GENTLEMEN,

FTER mentioning the Death of the Re-A verend Mr. James Sterling, which I Suppose you will in your next Paper, be pleased to insert what follows, and oblige, Gentlemen, Your very humble Setvant, Nov. 14, 1763.

EUPHRANOR. Dignum laude virum Musa vetat mori. THO' it be univerfally allowed that there never did exist a perfect Character among mere Mortals, yet such are the Prejudices which the Bulk of Mankind entertain in Favour of their Friends, that, in general, the Characters exhibited to the Public of the Dead, come very feldom fhort of absolute Perfection. But this never answers any good Purpose; and frequently the very opposite One to what was intended; for the unprejudiced Part of Mankind, never fail to conclude an unnatural Character to be an unjust One; whilst ill-plac'd Panegyric is often turn'd into the severest Sort of Satire. What Mr. Pope fays of Writing, may juftly enough be applied to Human Nature,

Whoever thinks a faultless Man to see,

Thinks what ne er was, nor is, nor e er shall be. Let it be granted therefore that the best of Men have their Foibles; yet at the same Time it ought to be observ'd, that Imperfections in Men of superior Merit, Parts, and Learning, as they are ever plac'd in a conspicuous Point of Light, are always more taken Notice of, than the same or worse Failings in those of an inferior Class. Nor do the invidious Part of the Species ever spare their Industry, to bring down a brilliant and shining Character, to the Level of their own groveling Meanness, by the most malicious Misrepresentations. On the other Hand, however, it must be confess'd, that all the humane and candid Part of Mankind, view the Imperfections of great Characters, as they do Straws or Dirt in the fine transparent Substance of Amber.

Pretty! in Amber to observe the Forms Of hairs, or straws, or dirt, or grubs, or worms! The Things we know are neither rich nor rare, But wonder how the Devil they got there.

In like Manner,' upon comparing the bright and brilliant, the friendly, the generous and benevolent Parts of a great and good Man's Character, with perhaps some Infirmities of Nature, which, on certain Occasions, give Knaves or Fools an Advantage over him, we wonder and regret, that Perfections which at fome Times almost equal him to Angels, shou'd be mixt with Imperfections, which at other Times render him the Sport or Prey of the meanest of Mortals. Yet such, alas! has been the Condition of some of the greatest Geniuses that ever appear'd in the World.

Agreeable to what has been premis'd, I am now to offer somewhat briefly respecting the late Reverend Mr. Sterling. And First, I shall not hesitate one Moment in affirming, that by His Death the Province of Maryland has lost a Great and Good Man, a most valuable Member of Society; and in spite of his. Failings (for these no doubt he had) I am not afraid to add, that he was an Honour and Ornament to the facred Cloth he wore, as well as to the Country he liv'd in; for I will venture to affert, without fear of being contradicted by competent Judges, that his uncommon Abilities and extensive Learning, particularly in all the Branches of polite Literature, stand unrival'd in this Part. of the World, and I doubt not but several of the elegant Performances he has savour'd the Public with, will be accounted an inco testable Proof of the Assertion. Then he was most certainly a Man of a warm, friendly, and feeling Heart, very easily melted down into Tenderness and Compassion for the Sufferings of his Fellow Creatures; and ready on all Occasions to relieve and affift them, as far as ever lay in his Power.
