

that the Forte has not been used to send Ambassadors, excepting to Emperors and the Kings of France. It will be therefore a very singular Phenomenon, tho' agreeable and pleasing to his Prussian Majesty, to see at his Court an Ottoman Minister."

According to Letters from Constantinople, Achmet Effendi receiver of the Clergy's Revenues, is the Person appointed for the Embassy to the Court of Berlin. In 1758 he was sent to Vienna, to notify the Death of the Sultan Osman, and the Accession of his Brother Mustapha, now reigning, to the Ottoman Throne.

CHARLES-TOWN, (South-Carolina) October 12.

On the 24th past, a Head-man from the Lower Creeks, accompanied by a British Trader, arrived at Augusta with a long Talk, containing the strongest Professions of Friendship, and importing, "That they, the Lower Creeks, were preparing to come to the Congress, when they were informed by one of their own People, who had been down near Augusta, That there was to be no Congress, but that the Indians, were, as soon as they arrived at the Place of Meeting, to be secured till Satisfaction was given by the Upper Creeks, for the Murders they have lately committed, and that in Consequence of the said Information, they had given over providing for their Journey, and sent down the present Talk by one they could depend upon, in order to be fully informed about the Matter; and that an Answer brought by him would determine them about coming down." A proper Reply was prepared and sent off, which the Indians said would remove their Suspicions, and that most of the Headmen of the Lower Creek Towns might be expected. The Gentleman who sends this Account from Augusta, complains of a "Number of worthless People that Way, who are continually telling Falshoods to the Indians with a mischievous Design."

On the 4th Inst. a white Man arrived from the Upper Creek Country, in six Days at Augusta, and brings Accounts that Messrs. Brown and Struthers, who had set off from the Place last named, on hearing their Goods had been taken and secured to prevent their falling into the Hands of the Mortar, arrived at Oakfuskee, where the Indians delivered their Horses and Goods, with which Mr. Brown set off for the Chickefaws, escorted by sixteen Creek Indians, and was met on the Road by a Party of Chickefaw Indians, who conducted him to the Breed Camp free from any Disturbance from the Mortar or his Gang. Since that Time the Mortar has not been seen in the Nation, and is said to be gone to the Northward; or among the Cherokees. When he took Leave of the French, who were still at Halbama and gave him some Guns, he told them he should not return for some Months. The Wolf King of Mokolassee, and about 30 other Upper Creeks with Mr. German and two other Traders, are gone to Pensacola with Intent to find out what is designed to be done in the Settlement of the Lands there. The Insolence of the Upper Creeks is said to be almost intolerable, and that few or none of them will come to the Congress, yet the Wolf-King has ever shewed himself strongly attached to the British Nation and Interest. On the 25th past, being about Three Days before the Person abovementioned left the Upper Creek Country, he was informed that several Hundreds of Choctaws, and about one Hundred Chickefaws were on their Way to the Congress. About one Hundred Lower Creeks were likewise coming, but it was thought could not reach Augusta before the 20th or perhaps 25th Inst. which would be much about the Time that the Cherokee Deputies were expected to be down.

BOSTON, October 24.

Saturday last arrived here Capt. Wheelwright from Halifax, which Place he left last Monday: By a Gentleman who came Passenger we learn, that the Right Hon. Lord COLVILLE, Rear Admiral of the White, and Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships in North-America, was arrived there in the Romney Man of War in 40 Days from England:—That it was reported at Halifax that three large French Store-ships were gone up the River St. Lawrence, supposed to supply the Indians, &c. with Necessaries for carrying on another War, which it was feared would soon break out; the French pretending great Difficulties, and using many subtle Arts to avoid complying with ALL the Terms of the late Treaty of Peace: 'Tis also said that the Misunderstanding, between the English and Dutch, was greatly increased, and that Dr. Hay, one of the Lords of the Admiralty, was going over to Holland in order, if possible, to

accommodate Affairs with them: It is also said that some Difficulties have arisen between us and the King of Prussia, which it was thought would be attended with bad Consequences.

PROVIDENCE, October 29.

Extra of a Letter from a Correspondent in Elizabeth-Town, New-Jersey, dated October 4.

"There is one Mr. Samuel Miller, who lives about seven Miles from this Place, who has an Orchard, which I went to see a few Days ago, that covers fifty Acres of Land, on which he has Seven Thousand Peach Trees, and One Thousand Apple Trees, from which Peach Trees he makes this Year (it being the first of their Bearing) Eleven Hundred Barrels of Juice; in the manufacturing of which he has at Work, Thirty Women and Fifteen Men, One large Stone Mill drawn by two Horses, Ten Presses, and One hundred and Forty-five Baskets, besides Sleds and other Implements. It is thought Mr. Miller will make this Year, only by this Branch of Business, Eight Hundred Pounds New-York Currency."

ANNAPOLIS, December 1.

Thursday last an Account was brought to Frederick-Town by Mr. James Patten, That on the 8th of November the Indians had done some Damage in the Great Cove, where they stay'd about two Hours: They kill'd Christopher Fidler, Charles Stewart, and Thomas Query; and burnt Wm. Nox's Houfe, and took himself and Family, eight in Number, Prisoners. The Indians were about 20 in Number, and were pursued by a Party of 28 the Evening after they had done the Mischief, and follow'd until the Monday Evening, when it began to snow and cover'd their Tracks. In the pursuit they discovered a Child (one of the Eight) which they had murder'd on their Retreat.

Saturday last his Excellency Prorogued the General Assembly of this Province to the First of May next.

1. An ACT for the Adjournment of Baltimore County Court.
2. An ACT for giving a Bounty for taking Indian Prisoners, and other Purposes therein mentioned.
3. An ACT for prohibiting all Trade with the Indians, for the Time therein mentioned.
4. An ACT continuing an Act, entitled, An Act for relieving the Inhabitants of this Province from some Aggrievances in the Prosecution of Suits at Law, and for continuing the Supplementary Act thereto.
5. An ACT continuing an Act, entitled, An Act for increasing the Allowance of Grand and Petit Jurors, who shall attend the Provincial Court, to limit Costs with respect to Witnesses, and granting them an Allowance for itinerant Charges.
6. An ACT continuing an Act, entitled, A Supplementary Act to the Act, entitled, An Act for the Relief of Creditors in England against Bankrupts, who have imported Goods into this Province, not accounted for.
7. An ACT continuing an Act, entitled, An Act for preventing Indians, disaffected to the British Interest in America, from coming into this Province as Spies, or on any other evil Design.
8. An ACT continuing an Act, entitled, An Act to prevent Persons from secreting Boats, Flats, and other Vessels, drove by Strefs of Weather, or otherwise, from Landings and Moorings.
9. An ACT continuing an Act, entitled, An Act to remedy some Evils relating to Servants.
10. An ACT continuing an Act, entitled, An Act to prevent Masters of Ships and Vessels from clandestinely carrying Servants and Slaves, or Persons Indebted, out of this Province.
11. An ACT continuing an Act, entitled, A Supplementary Act to the Act, entitled, An Act ascertaining the Height of Fences, to prevent the Evil occasioned by the Multitude of Horses, and restraining Horse Rangers within this Province, and to redress the great Evil accruing to this Province, by the Multiplicity of useless Horses, Mares, and Colts, that run in the Woods.
12. An ACT continuing an Act, entitled, An Act for the Gauge of Barrels, for Pork, Beef, Pitch, Tar, Turpentine, and Tare of Barrels for Flour, or Bread.
13. A Supplementary Act to the ACT for the Relief of Creditors, and to prevent Frauds and Deceits, occasioned by secret Sales and Mortgages, and Gifts of Goods and Chattels.
14. An ACT to aid the Proceedings of the Vestry of St. Stephen's Parish, in Cecil County.
15. An ACT to empower John Pava, Robert Adair, Moses Hill, and Margaret his Wife, to sell and dispose of the Lands therein mentioned, late the Lands of William Hammond of Baltimore Coun-

ty, Deceased, for the Payment of the Debts of the said William Hammond.

16. A Supplementary ACT to an Act, entitled, An Act for erecting a County School in Worcester County, and appointing Visitors for the same.

17. An ACT for the Adjournment and Continuance of Frederick County Court.

18. An ACT for amending the Staple of Tobacco, for preventing Frauds in his Majesty's Customs, and for the Limitation of Officers Fees.

19. An ACT for the Adjournment of Prince George's County Court.

20. An ACT to enable the Rector, Vestrymen, and Church-Wardens of the Parish of St. Margaret's Westminster, in Anne-Arundel County, for the Time being, to sell a Tract of Land therein mentioned, and to apply the Produce Money arising by such Sale, towards the Purchase of another Piece of Land to be made a Glebe for the Use of the Incumbent of that Parish, and his Successors.

21. An ACT for the speedy Recovery of small Debts out of Court, before one Justice of the Peace.

22. A Supplementary ACT to the Act, entitled, An Act for emitting and making Current Niney Thousand Pounds Current Money of Maryland, in Bills of Credit.

23. An ACT for the Advancement of Justice.

24. An ACT for the more effectual securing of Orphans Estates.

25. An ACT to confirm the Sale of certain Land, lying in Eastern-Neck Island in Kent County, by Draper Lushy, and Frances his Wife, Executors of John Hysen, Deceased, to Matthew Bryan.

26. An ACT to prohibit raising of Swine and Geese in Charles-Town, in Charles County.

27. An ACT empowering the Justices of Prince George's and Charles Counties, to Levy on the taxable Persons of Saint John's (commonly called King George's) Parish, in the said Counties, the Sum of Fifty-six Thousand Pounds of Tobacco; for the necessary Enlargement of their Parish Church.

28. An ACT for imposing an additional Duty of Two Pounds per Poll, on all Negroes imported into this Province.

29. An ACT to continue the Power of Sheriff and Collectors, under the Act, entitled, An Act for granting a Supply of Forty Thousand Pounds for his Majesty's Service, and striking Thirty Thousand and Fifteen Pounds Six Shillings therein in Bills of Credit, and raising a Fund for sinking the same, in Collecting and Accounting for the several Sums due in Virtue of that Act.

30. An ACT empowering Richard Richardson of Frederick County, to sell and dispose of the Land which belonged to his deceased Father Richard Richardson, and to apply the Money arising therefrom, to the Uses of his said Father's Will.

31. An ACT to empower the Justices of Charles County, to Levy on the taxable Inhabitants of Port-Tobacco Parish, in said County, an additional Sum, not exceeding Two Pounds of Tobacco per Poll, annually, for the further Support of an Organist in the said Parish.

32. An ACT for erecting a Public School in Frederick County.

33. A Supplementary ACT to an Act, entitled, An Act for the speedy and effectual Publication of the Laws of this Province, and for the Encouragement of Jonas Green, of the City of Annapolis, Printer.

34. An ACT to revive Kent County New Court, and to continue the Process therein.
