DRESDEN, September 10. WE learn from Poland, that a Detachment of Russian Troops had entered that City, and carried off all the Russian Deserters who had taken refuge in it.

Warsaw, Sept. 3. On the 24th past, at a Conference with the Primate and the Treasurer of the Crown, the Russian Ambassador acquainted them, that he was empowered by the Empress his Sovereign to order the Russian Troops to evacuate Lithuania; which Orders he, four Days after, sent them accordingly.

Hague, Sept. 30. It is reported that the King of Prussia proposes to march 20 or 24,000 Men into Mecklenburgh; but no Reason is assigned for this step. It is certain that his Prussian Majesty is drawing off a great many Men towards the Dutchy of Mecklenbourg, and the Neighbourhood of the Dutchy of Holstein: But they are still on his own Territory.

Sept. 27. It is reported that the King of Prussia has sent a Minister extraordinary to Dantzick, to signify to that Government that his Prussian Majesty cannot see with Pleasure, that the Dantzickers should sell, or suffer to be carried out of their own, the Powder that is made there, nor any other Sort of Ammunition, whether it be for Poland, or the Russians, or for any other Power whatsoever, and that he required the Government to pay Attention to it. The Answer returned to his Requisition was, that the City being independent of Prussia, and acknowledging moreover no other Sovereign than the King of Poland, they could not see by what Right he expected to restrict their Commerce; to which the Envoy's Reply was, that his Commission being ended, he was going to set out directly for Berlin, in order to give an Account of it to the King his Master, adding, that Monarch would write on the Subject to the Agency. And we are assured, that the King has since writ a Letter to them, with his own Hand, in which we know not the Contents.

LONDON, September 8. Saturday Evening last, the Right Hon. the Marquis of Granby, John Wilkes, Esq; and the Rev. Mr. C. Churchill, seated themselves in the same Box at Drury Lane Theatre, and received on the occasion such loud Shouts of Applause from the Spectators, as for some Time interrupted the Performance.

As the Demolition of the Fortifications at Dunkirk seem not to take place, we are informed, that the French, according to their usual Finesse in Politics, have found out, that by the Articles of Peace it is not clearly expressed at whose Expence the Demolition shall be made; and that, say they, if Great Britain will have the Works destroyed, and the Cannon filled up, let them be at Expence.

Oct. 9. It is said, that an eminent Ship-Building in South-Carolina, is now engaging a great many Ship-Wrights, Carpenters, &c. to go over to that Province, in order to carry on the Business of Ship-Building in all its Branches; which, from the Nature of the Materials, it is thought will answer better than that of New-England; the Carolina Oak being found to be of a more durable Texture than any to the Northward.

There is now finished the most magnificent and superb Piece of Plate, and of the most curious Workmanship ever yet made in England, or perhaps in any Part of the World, being a Toilet of Silver, double gilt; which is to be sent as a Present to the Empress of Russia, from the Russian Merchants.

We hear Orders are gone over for all the old Cannon in the Province of New-England and the Keys to be melted down, and run into Field-Pieces of Four-Pounders; and great Quantities of all Hand-Granades are preparing to be shipped for North-America.

By a private Letter from Paris, we learn, that M. Nadau (Son to the Governor of Guadaloupe, who was tried and degraded by a Court-Martial) having embarked for the West-Indies, with his three Sisters, who were to be married there, the Ship they were on board of, was taken by a Sallé

Rover. M. Nadau writes, that he had agreed for his own Ransom, and desires the Money to be remitted to him; but that it was in vain to think of ransoming his Sisters, since they were already sold, and carried to different Seraglios, he did not know where. These three young Ladies kept Houfe in Paris, and lived in a very genteel Way, with unblemished Characters.

Extra of a Letter from Ratisbon, Sept. 23. "For some Days past a Coolness has been observed between the Ministers of Austria, Bavaria, and Holland, on one Part, and those of France, Sweden, and Palatine, on the other. Not but these Ministers see one another sometimes; but they observe a much greater Reserve than formerly. It is pretended that the Differences which have arisen between the Republic of Holland and the Palatine Court, have a Connection with this Coldness; and that if the Negotiation which was begun so long ago, in order to terminate this Affair, should be protracted much longer, it may possibly degenerate into an open Rupture, through the Intigation of a certain Power, which, it is said, urges the Elector Palatine to assert his Claims.

Some Austrian Officers, who have been here for some Time on Furloughs, have just received Orders to join their Regiments as soon as possible, and to provide themselves with all Necessaries for taking the Field. Several Subalterns of that Nation are also come here to recruit. This, joined to the Preparations for War that are making in the Austrian Dominions, and elsewhere, occasions much Speculation."

Extra of a Letter from Falmouth, Sept. 26, from Capt. Philip Miller, of the Ship Betty. "I sailed from Jamaica the 26th of July, a full Ship, and all well, till the first of September, off the Western Islands, at Four in the Afternoon, the Ship was set on Fire below, and in Ten Minutes was all over in Flames; so that we had just Time to throw overboard two small Boats to save ourselves from perishing in the Flames, and were in the Boats five Days, till taken up by a Ship from Bristol for Philadelphia, and the same Day met with the present Ship I am on board, the Dispatch, Capt. White, for London. I have saved nothing but what is on my back, not a Paper."

St. James's, Oct. 8. The King has been pleased to appoint Montague Wilmot, Esq; to be his Majesty's Captain-General and Governor in Chief in and over his Majesty's Province of Nova Scotia in America, in the Room of Henry Ellis, Esq; who has requested Leave to resign that Government. Also, To appoint the Hon. James Murray, Esq; to be his Majesty's Captain-General and Governor in Chief in and over his Majesty's Province of Quebec in America.

To appoint the Hon. James Grant, Esq; to be his Majesty's Captain-General and Governor in Chief in and over his Majesty's Province of East Florida in America.

Also, To appoint George Johnstone, Esq; to be his Majesty's Captain-General and Governor in Chief in and over his Majesty's Province of West Florida in America. Also To appoint Robert Melvell, Esq; to be his Majesty's Captain-General and Governor in Chief in and over his Majesty's Islands of Grenada, the Grenadines, Dominico, St. Vincent and Tobago, in America; and all other Islands and Territories adjacent thereto, and which now are, or heretofore have been, dependent thereupon.

October 11. The French King has established nine Packet Boats between Rochfort and the West-Indies, one to go about the 10th of every Month. The Captains will take on board the disorderly Youths who shall be delivered over to them by the Commandant of the Marine at Rochfort; and go first to Cayenne, from thence to Martinico, then to St. Domingo, and from this last return directly to Rochfort. At all these three Settlements they will take on board the Officers and Soldiers who have Leave to return to France.

October 13. By Letters from Lisbon, they have received an Account there, that the Spaniards had made themselves Masters of the Portuguese Settlement, called Rio Granda, to the Southward of Rio de Janeiro. This is looked on as a very valuable Acquisition, and was taken in March last; and Hostilities were not to cease in those Parts till May. As the Price of Foreign Gold and Silver Coin are reduced to their intrinsic Value, we hear a great Quantity of Gold and Silver Money will be soon coined. Monday a Duel was fought in the King's Mews, between a North and South Briton, on Account of some Reflections made use of by the latter against a North British Peer, in which the latter received a Wound on his Right Side, which put an End to the Combat. We hear, that last Saturday Night at Twelve o' Clock, an Order went from the War-Office to the Commanding Officer of the Third Regiment of Foot-Guards in the Tower, immediately to send a Party to Spitalfields, to quell the Riot among the Journeymen Weavers; and accordingly early on Sunday Morning, a Captain with 100 Men, marched thither, where they remain; which has entirely put a Stop to the Disturbance. A Correspondent laments the unhappy Situation of the poor Weavers in Spitalfields at this Time, and says, "That it is rather to be wished than expected, that some proper Persons should be appointed by Authority, no Way interested, but Judges of the proportionable Value of Labour, in the different Branches of our Manufactures, in order to settle their Prices. Ribbons, which were 10 or 12 Years ago, sold for 4½ and 5d. per Yard; were equal in Goodness to those now sold for 7d. per Yard; and the few good Ribbons now made, fetch 9d. and 10d. per Yard, which about the same time were sold for 6d. and 7d. The Duty of Five per Cent, on all Dry Goods, which the Dealers always throw in your Teeth, on asking the Reason of the Advance, cannot be the Cause, as the Difference above mentioned is near 40 per Cent. Surely some Medium ought to be observed; and if the great Dealers would be contented with Villains something smaller; and keeping only one Equipage each, they might allow the poor People such Prices as would enable them to eat, clothe and warm themselves at this Time, when Provisions are, by Combinations, kept up at very extravagant Prices, though the War is over." On the first Instant it blew so hard in the Harbour of Dublin, the like was never known there, and continued till Monday Evening, in which Time several Ships drove ashore, among which was the St. Anthony, bound for Cadiz; and, as far as may be judged, has started a Plank, and the Cargo under Water, and the said Vessel incapable of proceeding on her Voyage. SAVANNAH, in Georgia, November 3. By an Express which arrived Yesterday from Augusta, which Place he left on Saturday last, we learn, that his Excellency our Governor, with his Attendants, arrived there on Tuesday Morning the 25th ult. the other Governors were expected the Day the Express came away, and it was thought they would proceed to Business as on Monday. About 200 Cherokees, together with the Chickesaws, Catawbaws, two Chocostaws, and 60 of the Upper and Lower Creeks, had been there some Days, and near 100 more of the latter daily looked for. A good Understanding subsists between the Cherokees and Chickesaws, but the Creeks and Cherokees seem not to be upon the best of Terms. November 10. Our Accounts from Augusta are, That on Wednesday the 2d the three Governors from Charlestown, with their Attendants, arrived there; on Saturday the Congress was opened at Fort Augusta, when the Indians, in Number between 7 and 800, received a Talk, to which they were to return an Answer on the Monday following. It is thought, that the whole Business will be finished, and that the four Governors will set out on their Return in the Georgia and South-Carolina Scout-Boats the End of this Week, or Beginning of next. A bad Understanding still subsists between the Creeks and Cherokees. We hear that the Boundaries of this Province are extended to St. John's River. Nov. 17. On Monday the 7th Instant, the different Nations of Indians that were present at the Congress at Augusta, returned their Answer to the Talk delivered by the Governour, in his Majesty's Name, the Saturday before; on Wednesday
