Our Advices from the Frontiers of this Province, received by Way of Express on Thursday last and by the Albany Post on Saturday, are of as indubitable Authority and Credit, as the Extract we gave in our last relating to the March of 200 Indians, sent out by Sir WILLIAM JOHNSON against the Indian Village of KANESTIO.—These Advices are, That on the 2d Instant, at Night, Sir WILLIAM received an Express by an Indian and a White Man, from the above Party, importing, "That on the Evening of the 25th of February, they had reached the main Branch of the River Susquehanna, on their Way Westward, when they received private Advices, that a large Body of Delawares, our Enemies, were at a small Distance, destined against some of our Settlements; upon which Intelligence our Party immediately made all possible Dispatch to surprize them, which they happily effected, by surrounding them in their Encampment at the Dawn of Day on the 27th. Their Approach was so sudden, that our Enemies could make no Defence, and were made Prisoners to the Number of 41, with their Chief Captain Bull (an Indian) Son of Redyscung, a Person who has been in Arms against the English, during all the late Hostilities, having headed many Parties, and discovered great Inveteracy against us. Our Indians immediately bound the Prisoners, and sent them under a strong Escort to Sir WILLIAM, where they were expected a Day or Two after the 3d Instant." [We trust this good Beginning will be followed by some other successes, and sufficiently prove the Importance they are of in an Indian War, as well as the Judgment of the present GENERAL, who has made use of their Services.]

We are further informed from Albany, that another Party of Indians (said to be about 400) in our Interest, are preparing to go against our tawney coloured Enemies, as soon as the Weather is somewhat more mild.—The Whole set in Motion by the indefatigable Industry of Sir WILLIAM. By late Accounts from the Havannah we learn, that there are no less than 6000 Regular Troops at that Place; that they are erecting several new Batteries, repairing the Moro, and all the other Fortifications in and about the City; and that the Inhabitants are, as well as the King's Troops, exercised almost every Day in the Week.

PHILADELPHIA, March 15.  
Last Week two Men were taken up, and committed to the Goal of this City, on Suspicion of robbing Mr. Clifford's Houfe of a Quantity of Plate, and other Things; and upon their Examination such Discoveries were made, that about a Third Part of the Plate, chiefly small, was found in one of their Chests. It is thought there are some others concerned with them, though not yet discovered. And it is also supposed that the same Persons lately robbed the Houfe of Mrs M'Call, in Walnut-street, of sundry Pieces of Plate, which have since been recovered. The Persons in Custody are said to be a Doctor and Cabinet Maker; the first, we hear, goes by the Name of William Frederick Oufenreed, alias Hendenreed; the last by that of John Brinklow, alias Benton, both Convicts from England into Virginia.

In a Letter from Bethlehem, in Northampton County, of the 13th of March, it is said, that on the Sunday before as one John Russell was Hunting near Fort Penn, he was fired on by three Indians; upon which he took to a Tree, where he bravely stood three Fires from each of them, returned as many, and obliged the savages to make the best of their Way off.—One shot went thro' his Hat; another thro' the Sleeve of his Coat; and a Third wounded him slightly in the Call of his Leg [Russell is Brother to the two Lads, one of which was lately found roasted in a Barn, the other supposed to be murdered, or carried off by the Enemy.]
