

deaf to such Talks. That he had repeated Invitations from the Creeks during the late War, to go and settle amongst them, and that they have owed him a Grudge ever since he refused. That he is very ready to assist in putting the seven Murderers to Death mentioned in the Young-Twin's Talk, but they are a very small Part of the Rogues that have Mischief in their Hearts, for he has certain Information, that the whole Nation has resolved on a War with the English; that they design to way-lay all the Rivers, and particularly the Fords, all the way from St. Auguline to the head of Savannah River; and that they are cutting up all the Skins of their Winter's Hunt for Mockassins to proceed upon the Execution of their Designs. He desires, that the Warriors who are to relieve the Garrison of Fort Prince George, may have a strict Caution to be on their Guard, suspecting they may be way-laid by the Creeks; says, he shall soon remove his People from Toogooloo to Est-towih; and concludes with the warmest Professions of Friendship and Fidelity.

Feb. 18. Among other Advices from the Cape, we have the following, viz. That not a Day passes without some English Vessels from the Northern Colonies going in there, for Water, &c. with which they are most kindly and readily supplied, especially for Two-Inch Plank, wanted for the Fortifications. That about five Weeks ago, two large Ships from France arrived there, full of Vagrants or convicts, who were immediately set to work upon the Fortifications. That in every Ship from France, since the Conclusion of the Peace, 20 or 30 Soldiers arrive, and no less than 2000 are expected in a Body, with a Fleet. That there never was so much Attention paid as at this Time, to repair and strengthen the old, and erect new Works, throughout the French part of the Island of Hispaniola; that to every Place effectually, no less than seven old experienced Engineers lately arrived there from France, who, about Christmas, accompanied the Governor in a Man of War Snow, to make a new Survey of the whole North Coast, and lay out Works; but that they seemed most particularly attentive to the fortifying of Cape Nicola Mole and Samana, where the Works laid out are very extensive. And, that a Ship called the Jenny, belonging to Maryland, was lately lost going in there.

NEW-YORK, March 19.
The following is an Extract of a Letter of undoubted Credit from the D'Erreits, dated December 3, 1763.
"We have been lately very busy in procuring Abundance of Wheat, Flour, Indian Corn, and Peas, from the Country, in which we have so far succeeded as not to be in Danger of being starved out. The Approach of Major Wilkins's Party had very good Effect, the Enemy moved further off. It is said Pontiac, and his Tribe, are gone to the Mississippi; but we do not believe it: The French have been wonderfully civil this last Fortnight, being ignorant of the Return of the Troops, in which Major Gladwin does not think proper to deceive them, lest they should bring the Indians upon us, who might harass us in our present Employ, that of bringing in Wood for the Garrison, as we are obliged to fetch it a great Distance.

"The Warriors of Sandusky are much animated against us: They have been reinforced lately by many Villains from all the Nations concerned in the War; and they are the only Indians this Way that abound in Ammunition, the other Nations being much in Want of that Article. They likewise plant Abundance of Indian Corn, which they often sell to other Nations that stand in Need of it: The Ottawas, it is thought, must depend upon them for that Article next Spring."

PHILADELPHIA, March 22.
Saturday last Captain Craig arrived here from Dominico. In his Passage, on the 12th Instant, in Lat. 36: 20, he fell in with Captain Mackey, in a Ship from Virginia for London, in great Distress; his Vessel had met with a violent Gale of Wind, in which he suffered great Damage, having her Stern beat in, and her Main and Mizzen Masts were obliged to be cut away; and notwithstanding all their Endeavours, she proved so leaky, and was so full of Water, that they every Moment expected her to sink with them. They had been in this dismal Condition five Days, when Captain Craig met with them, took them all into his Vessel, and brought them up to Town with him.—It is thought the Ship went down about two Hours after the People left her.
