WHITEHALL IS most Serene High of *Brunswick Lunenburg* Helvoetsluys, on both the Princesses August 10th Inst. landed at Morning, and arrived

St. James's. This Day his most Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of *Brunswick* and the rest of the Lord Chamberlain's Office. The Highness the Princess Augusta, wife of the Hereditary Prince of *Brunswick*, appointed to be solemnized at St. James's on the 16th Inst. at 7 o'Clock in the Evening, but Peers and Peeresse, Peers Daughters, Privy Counsellors, and Ministers, are to be admitted.

St. James's, Jan. 16. This Evening the Marriage of her Royal Highness the most Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of *Brunswick*, was performed in the Chamber by his Grace the Archbishop of *York*. After the Ceremony of the Nuptials, her Royal Highness remained at St. James's, where she was repaired to Leicester House, where she was attended by her Highness the Princess Dowager, Princess William and the Royal Family. Their Majesties Jan. 17. Their Serene and Royal Highnesses of *Brunswick* received the Honorable and Gentry at *Saville-House* on account of their Nuptials; where they were entertained by the King and Queen in the most sumptuous manner. At Night there was a grand Ball given in honor of the happy Marriage.

London, *January* 19. In the evening of *Brunswick* paid a Visit to the King and Queen, which he had been elected a Member of the House of Commons. His Serene Highness, during his stay in *England*, St. Paul's, the Theatre, &c. &c. and the Duke of *Cumberland* of *Newcastle*, and many other Gentlemen, being generally attended by Mr. *Wilkes's* Friends have received yesterday's Mail, acquainting them with the death of the 13th Infant, as he intimated over a Certificate of his ill State, a Person of Distinction.
