HIS most Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick Lunenburg, having sailed from Helvoetsluis, on board his Majesty's Yacht the *Princess Augusta*, on Tuesday last, the 10th Inst. landed at Harwich the 12th, in the Morning, and arrived last Night at Somerset House.

St. James's. This Day his most Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick Lunenburg waited on their Majesties and the rest of the Royal Family.

Lord Chamberlain's Office. The Marriage of her Royal Highness the *Princess Augusta*, with his most Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick Lunenburg, is appointed to be solemnized at St. James's, on Monday next, the 16th Inst. at 7 o'Clock in the Evening; at which time are to be present Peers and Peeresses, Peers eldest Sons and Peers Daughters, Privy Counsellors, and their Wives, and Foreign Ministers, are to be admitted.

St. James's, Jan. 16. This Evening the Ceremony of the Marriage of her Royal Highness the *Princess Augusta* with his most Serene Highness the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick Lunenburg, was performed in the Great Council Chamber by his Grace the Archbishop of Canterbury.

After the Ceremony of the Nuptials, their Serene and Royal Highnesses remained at St. James's till Nine, and then repaired to Leicester House, where a grand supper was prepared; at which were present their Majesties, the *Princess Dowager*, *Princess William and Henry*, and the Rest of the Royal Family. Their Majesties went away about XII.

Jan. 17. Their Serene and Royal Highnesses the *Prince and Princess of Brunswick* received the Compliments of the Nobility and Gentry at *Saville-House, Leicester Fields*, on account of their Nuptials; where they reside during their stay in England. The Servants remain at *Somerset House*. At Night there was a grand Ball at St. James's, on Account of the happy Marriage.

LONDON, January 19. In the Evening the Hereditary Prince of Brunswick paid a Visit to the Royal Society, of which he had been elected a Member.

His Serene Highness, during his Stay, also visited the *Museum, St. Paul's, the Tower, Westminster Abbey, &c. &c.* and the Duke of Cumberland, Mr. Pitt, the Duke of Newcastle, and many Others of the Nobility and Gentry, being generally attended by the *Marquis of Granby*.

Mr. Wilkes's Friends have received Letters from him by yesterday's Mail, acquainting them, that he was confined to his Room, and incapable of setting out on his Return the 19th Instant, as he intended; and that he has at over a Certificate of his ill State of Health in a Letter from a Person of Distinction.

We hear some Memorials of great Consequence, tending clear up certain mysterious Affairs heretofore transacted in America, are now preparing for the Press, and will speedily be published at the Desire of a great Man lately returned from that Part of the World.

Jan. 21. The Crowd was so great at the Opera-house, to see the Hereditary Prince, that the Coaches of the Quality did not come near the Door, which obliged the Ladies to get out and walk to the House. Four Parts in Five of the number of genteel Persons were obliged to go back again, being in the most imminent Danger of being crushed to death. During the Time of the Crowd, there were Quarrels, and Swords drawn by the Gentlemen, who endeavoured to get up; the Shrieks of the Ladies were very pitiful; a great many Caps, Ruffles, Handkerchiefs, Ear-Rings, and Pins and Cloaks, were lost, and great Numbers of People pressed away.

An Express was Yesterday dispatched to Paris, to acquaint Mr. Wilkes with his Fate.

Yesterday appeared in the Daily Advertiser the following Notice: "All Persons who have any Claims or Demands on John Wilkes, Esq; of Great George-Street, Westminster, are desired to send their Accounts (sealed up) to Mr. Heaton Wilkes in St. John's-Square, Clerkenwell."

Mr. Wilkes's Physician and Surgeon declare, that he did acquaint them with his Design of going to France; that he said he was only going to the Country for a few Days, and that he would take with him Four or Five Dressings for his use; that at the Time he set out, his Wound did by no means permit him to take a Journey to Paris; but that had he in England, he would probably have been able to attend the House of Commons on the Day appointed for his appearance there.

It is said that the King made her Royal Highness a Present of a Diamond Necklace worth 30,000 l. the Queen, of a Watch of exquisite Workmanship, set with Diamonds. The *Princess Dowager* of a rich Diamond Stomacher; The *Duchess Amelia* of a Casket of Jewels worth 80,000 l. and the *Duke of Cumberland*; of a Set of Jewels for the Hair worth 10,000 l. Value.]

A prodigious Storm of Wind did irreparable Damage on the Sea Coast; and the Rise of the Waters in most of the considerable Rivers, was no less ruinous in the inland Parts. A Number of Ships have been driven ashore and wrecked; many never were known before in one Season; the Inhabitants are sufferers to the Amount of vast Sums; and many Merchants and Owners of Ships in various Nations are probably undone by the Hand of Providence.

In England, Part of the Banks of the River between *London and Rawcliff*, in *Yorkshire*, are broken down, and the adjacent Country overflowed. The River *Ouse* broke through the Banks, and overflowed the Country from *Selby* to *Barlith*; to an almost incredible Height. Yarm has undergone a second Inundation, and the Current has demolished every Sea Wall that stood in its Way. The Country adjoining the River *Hull* is under Water for many Miles, and a melancholy Prospect cannot be described. In the

Neighbourhood of *Spalding* a Hare was taken upon a Sheep's Back, on the first rise of the Inundation in that Neighbourhood. The River *Stockferry* so over-topt its Banks, that it became a perfect Cascade, roaring Night and Day. In *Ely* several Thousand Acres are overflowed, and in *Norfolk* the *Narr* has done the same. The North Stone Bridge at *Oundle* is broke in three Places; and the great Bridge at *Tempford* blown up. The famous *Ruin at Godflow* is blown down. *Thorney Bank* is broken down, and more than 20,000 Acres of Land laid under Water between *Willich* and *Peterborough*. The noted *Stone Mill*, formerly a Prison, at *Yaxley*, is blown down. By the Waters being so long out, the Church at *Newbury* has sunk two Feet deep. The *Thames* has overflowed its Banks, so that the West Country Barges can bring no Meal or Malt to *London*. The Inundations have been so general in England, that Room is wanting to enumerate the Damages done by them, nor have they been less general or less fatal abroad. At *Hamburg* the Elbe rose 12 Feet above high Water Mark. Great Part of *Guelderland*, *Overyssel*, *Cleves*, the district of *Beruwe*, and almost all *South Holland*, is overflowed. Fourteen Mills on the *Rhine* have all been carried away by the Floods. The Villages of *Moes* and *Zell* are laid under Water, and the Cattle and Corn, and the Fruits of the Earth lost. The Damage done at *Frankfort*, by the Waters, is computed at 40,000 l. 72 Villages in the Neighbourhood of *Munster* are overflowed, and it is said 12,000 Souls have perished.

During the Violence of the Storm, a Fire broke out at *Hyde-Park Corner*, but was happily extinguished with less Damage than could have been expected.

A Gentleman gave on Monday last, at the *Star and Garter* in *Pall-mall*, 100 Guineas, to receive 2 l. a Day till Mr. Wilkes's public Arrival in England.

We are informed, that a noble Earl sent Mr. Wilkes a Thousand Pound Bank Note the Evening before his Departure for France.

Extract of a Letter received on Monday by Mr. Wilkes of *Clerkenwell* from his Brother.

Paris, Hotel de *Saxe*, January 15, 1764.  
"I am too ill at present to be sure of any fixed Time for my Return, and I had better keep my Room (as I am forced to do) here, than on the Road to *Calais*, which would be the infallible Consequence of my setting out."

"I wrote to the *Speaker* last Post, and intreated, I believe, an unexceptionable Certificate of my ill State of Health. My eager Desire is to return to my native Country, to vindicate myself from a Charge brought against me."

We hear that as soon as Mr. Wilkes lands in England, he will be taken into Custody of the Gentleman Officer of the *Black Rod*, for a Breach of Privilege of the House of Peers in affixing the Name of a learned Prelate to a blasphemous Performance, intitled, *An Essay on Woman*.

Feb. 6. The *Lapwing, Griffin*, from *East-India*, is arrived at *Falmouth* Express, and brings Advice that one of the *Nabobs* had attacked *Patna*, near *Calcutta*, where the English had a Factory, in which the following Gentlemen were killed:

Messrs. *Amyatt, Hay, Wollaston, Goring, Hutchinson, and Gulston*.

Mr. *Jones* and *Dr. Crook* are supposed also to be among the Slain.

Mr. *Amplet* is taken Prisoner, and supposed to be murdered.

*Governor Ellis*, with 150 Europeans, are taken Prisoners, and also supposed to be murdered. *Cassumbazar* is likewise taken.

These are all the Particulars we can learn at present.

Feb. 7. We are told, that some English Troops had entered *Dacca* (for what Reason we cannot learn) when the *Nabob* fled from his Palace, which the English entered, and began to plunder; Information of which being sent to the *Nabob*, he took an Opportunity of falling upon them with his Forces, and entirely routed them, cutting most of them to Pieces, and being flushed with Success, he attacked two of the Company's Factories and took them.

It is reported, that *General Lawrence* has stopped all the Forces from coming to England, and had sent for *General Draper's* from *Manilla*, in order to draw the Forces in a Body.

It is said by some, that the *Dutch* were no ways concerned, but only the *Nabob's Troops*, who were defending their Country.

It is said there are many more Persons killed in the *East-Indies*, than have yet appeared in the Papers.

It is expected that the next Advices from thence will bring an Account of the Loss of *Calcutta*, if not *Bengal*.

This melancholy Breach is said to be chiefly owing to the Covetousness of some of our Great Men there, many of whom have lost their Lives on the Account.

It is said, the only Resource the English have now left is to support the *Nabob* they before deposed, in order to oppose the present one.

All the Expresses that were dispatched on Saturday last for *Holland* on the above Account, are detained at *Harwich*, having missed the Packet-Boat.

*Cassumbazar*, said to be taken from us in the *East Indies*, is an Island in the *River Hughly*, on which are *Cutway Fort and Town*, and which was taken in the Year 1757 by the Admirals *Watson and Pocock*, and *Colonel Clive*. It before that belonged to the French, and was then governed by *M. Law*. At that Time the *Nabob, Suraja Dowla*, was in the French Interest; over whose Army, consisting of 20,000 Men, *Lord Clive* gained a complete Victory, and made an amazing Booty. After this, *Jaffier Ally Cawn* was raised to the *Nabob* of that Province, at the Instance of the English; on which he agreed, that all the Country before belonging to the French should be the Property of the English, and the French never be permitted to settle there, which has since been ratified by the Treaty of Peace. Since the above Affair happened, our good Friends the *Dutch* made some Claims, and three *Indiamen* came to Blows with them, for their refusing to deliver up 5 or 6 English Vessels they had seized in the above River, which has caused several Memorials to pass between our Court and the *Dutch*; but what was the Issue, the Public knoweth not.—However there are People who think *Jaffier Ally Cawn* is at length become *Dutch*.

Near *Patna* (the other Place taken higher up the River) on Jan. 15, 1761, the *Mogul's Troops*, said to have consisted of 80,000 Men headed by *Shah Zadda*, and supported by a small Number of French Troops under *M. Law*, where totally defeated, by *Major John Carnach*, at the Head of 500 Europeans, 2500 Seapoys, and 20,000 black Troops, with 12 Pieces of Cannon. *M. Law* and most of the French were taken Prisoners.

It is said that a Person, who lately was an eminent Merchant of this City, was concerned in procuring a Ship to be fraudulently lost, on which Account he has absconded, and diligent Search is making after him, in order to bring him to Justice.

Feb. 7. It is said, a Squadron of small Ships of War will soon be sent out to cruise in the *Mediterranean*.

Feb. 9. The Trial of *John Wilkes, Esq;* as the supposed Author of No. 45 of the *North Briton*, will come on next Tuesday in the Court of *King's Bench, Westminster*.

Feb. 11. By the *Dutch Mails* we have the agreeable News, that the *Prince and Princess of Brunswick* arrived happily at *Helvoetsluis* on Thursday the 2d Instant, after having been four Days at Sea, which, during the whole Time, was very Tempestuous.

Letters received in *Holland* from *Barbary* bring Advice, that the *Algerines* had concluded a Peace with the French.

Last Night the Jury for *Mr. Wilkes's Trial*, which comes on next Tuesday, was struck before the *Master of the Crown Office*.

The *Lords Commissioners for Trade and Plantations*, have granted to *Sieur J. H. C. de Stumpel*, some Thousand Acres of Land on the *River St. Juan*, in *Acadia*, in *Nova-Scotia*, to settle, with four Thousand Families, the said Land.

Extract of a Letter from *John Curling, junr. on board the Elizabeth, Capt. MacLaughlin, from Maryland*.

"On the 6th of January 1764, we had the Misfortune to lose our Rudder, and the Ship lay at the Mercy of the Sea; have now made shift to make a kind of One, but am afraid it will be a long Time before we can get her home. We are in Latitude 42 N. and Longitude 34 from *London*, and shall make for the first Port in *Great Britain* or elsewhere."

The *Lords of the Admiralty* have appointed the following Lieutenants to hold themselves in Readiness to go and take the Command of Schooners in *North-America*, viz. the *Chaleur, Thomas Laugham; Gaspe, Thomas Allen; Magellan, Robert Dugdale; Hope, Chandler; St. John, Thomas Hill; and St. Laurent, Ralph Dundas*.
