taining 460 Dellars, was found upon the Banks, near Crotby-point, by three Men, who with un parallelled Honesty brought it entire, tho' open'd, to one of the Officers of the Customs in this Town. The above appears to have been lost out of the Hannih, Capt. Cawfon, from Virginia, wreck'd upon the faid Banks about a Month ago.

"There is noting new that is agreeable; has we have every Thing to fear that may hart our Purses in the Line of Colonies. "There is a Gentleman, who is a Member of Parliament, and agent fir Connessional and Pennsylvania, by the Recommendation of Mr. Ingersin and Mr. Franklin, that has great Weight with all the Ministry, and while Honesy will prompt him to stand in an Interest: He has often been to the Board of Trade, and has succeeded so well, as to gain them over to cur Interest, and the Lords of Trade will have great Instinence over the Husse."

Since our last we received what follows from Carlisse, viz.

1 The Districts of the Back Inhabitants are greater than can well be conceived, Two Hundred Miles of an extended Frontier are frompeled to the Incursions of Indians, that no Man can go to Steep within 10 or 15 Miles of the Borders, without being in Danger of having his House burnt, and himself and Family scaiped, or lid into Captivity, before the next Merning. No Man can tell where the Indians will strike the next Blow, when they have began their Murders and Devastations. On the 20th of Iast Month Agnet Davidin, and her Child, of an Year old; Andiew Sims, 14 Years old; Margaret Stephens, 12 Years old; and Jeseph Mitthell, 3 Years old, were made Prissoners. Seven Heuses were hurnst come on the 21st, and a great Number of Iinself, Cowt, Steep and Hogs were killed. On the 22d a Bare was burnt in the Path Valley, a Horse was killed, and two taken away; about twelve Indians carried off the Captives, and seven or eight tarried behind, and did considerable Damage. The Captains Piper and Brady, with their Companies, did all that lay in their Power to protest the Inhabitants; and Lieutenant Chambers, and Enson Asy, with their Companies, did all that lay in their Power to protest the Inhabitants; and Lieutenant Chambers, and Enson Asy, pursued the Indians, to respect to the fill fulling about Shippenshaph, which seems set on Fire. and behived to be done by these Enemies. These fresh Troubles greatly discourage the pror People, wibo intended to return early in the Spring to their distret Habitation."

The following Paragraph of a Letter from a Gentleman in Cartisle. to tis Friend in this City, may serve to give us some Idea of their Districts, swhich bears Date March 26, 1764.

"Many of the Inhabitants of the Path and Shearman's Valleys, were purposing to adventure home, but this Affair Has quire disconcerte

his quire disconcerted their Measures, and the People along the North Mountain are moving further in, especially about Shippensburgh, which is crowded with the Families of that Neighbourhood. Our Country has the Appearance of nothing but Consussion and Distress, which I sear will increase. What shall so many Families do, who have spent the Winter with us, chiefly supported by the Contributors of Philadelphis, in Hopes of returning to their Settlements in the Spring? Many of them have been forced to fell what sew Cattle they saved, to support their Families; and others who, in the Fall, would not apply for a Share in the public Contributions, are obliged by want to apply now, when our Fands are almost spent. The above seven Familier got nothing saved but their westing Cloaths, so sudden was the Alarm; one poor Woman delivered of a Child, was obliged to remove in about two Hours Time after. Sir, I have but a melancholy Time of it, amidst such Calamity and Woes; I pray God may in Mercy shorten these Days of Misery."
