Cadet, Purveyor-General of the Army 600,000; Pennysiant, Maurin, and Corpion, Commissaries under Cadet, 600,000 each; Estabe and Martel, Keepers of Magazines, the former 30,000, and the latter 200,000; the Commandant, Laudriere, 5000; Dechainaux, Secretary to the Intendant Bigot, 30,000. " The Intelligence lately received from the ast Indies, of Disturbances in the Province of engal, and the Causes of them, being variously lated and misrepresented, we are forry to acusint our Readers, that we have good Authority fay, those Disturbances have risen chiesly, if ot wholly, from the very unjustifiable Conduct f some of the Company's Servants, whose con-nual Abuses of the Company's Authority, to eir own private Emolument, and to the Prejudice the just Rights of the Country Government, hich neither the prudent Remonstrances, nor the finterested Example of the Governor [Mr. Vanttart, Brother to Miss Vansittart, Maid of Honour the Princess of Wales] were able to rettrain; aving provoked the Nabob to some violent features on his part, have at length, as was per-ps at first intended, produced an open Rupture. "On the 23d of June, Mr. Ellis, the Chief of e Company's Factory at Patna, thought fit to put mself at the Head of a considerable Body of the ompany's Troops, and, upon what Provocation on appear, to attack the City, which was Irried with great Slaughter of the Inhabitants, ad given up to Plunder. The [Indian] Governor of Patna] making his Escape, joined a Party of the Nabob's Forces, who were marching to his

Relief, and hearing of the Diforder into which the English in the Town were fallen, attacked, and entered it Sword in Hand, sparing none who were found in Arms. Ellis, with 3 or 400 Men, Europeans and Seapoys, escaped, and crossed the River.—The very Day this Missortune happened, Mr. Amyat, who had been deputed from the Council at Calcutta to treat with the Nabob, and to dispose him to comply with the Demands they had thought fit to make on him, and who had attended the Nabob at Mongeer for that Purpose, accompanied with several other Gentlemen of the Factory, not succeeding in the Business of his Embasily, took his Leave of the Nabob, having re-ceived the necessary Passports to return to Calcutta, and fet out in Boats with his Party, confisting of Messrs. Amphlett, Wollaston, Crooke, and Hutchinfon, and the Lieutenants Jones, Gordon, and Cooper, with two Companies of Seapoys, and Twenty European Horsemen. Soon after their Departure, News arriving at Mongeer of what had passed at Patna, this unfortunate Party were followed by some of the Nabob's Troops, and, as is supposed; by his Orders; they were overtaken on the 3d of July near Muxadavad, and it is feared all, but Mr. Amphlett, who was carried bound to the Nabob, were cut to Pieces.

" Upon Advice of these Incidents at Calcutta, the Council took upon them to set up Meer Jaffir, the Nabob formerly deposed, Ithe same who gave Lord Clive his great Fortune] the Company's whole Force was ordered to take the Field, under the Command of Major Adams, who was advanced as far as Cutwa, when the last Advices left him, and there was little doubt of his Success. It is hoped therefore, that long before now these Commotions have subsided, and that the Tranquility of the Country is re-established."

January 14. Yesterday a Bill of Indictment, for pretended Theft of Papers belonging to Mr. Wilkes, was preferred to the Grand Jury for the County of Middlefex, by Mr. Wilkes's Friends, against Mr. Curry, one of the Witnesses to prove the Publication of the Essay on Woman, which the House of Lords has declared to'be a wicked and blafphemous Libel; and the Republication of the North Briton, which both Houses of Parliament have declared to be a seditious Libel, asperfing every Branch of the Legislature, and tending to raise traiterous Insurrections against his Majesty's Government; but the Grand Jury, confishing of Gentlemen of Rank and Character, returned the faid Bill ignoramus.

The Charming Kitty Schooner, William Co-nolly, Master, from St. Kitt's to Senegal, was taken by a Xebeque of Sallee, off the Western Isles, on the 24th of July last, under pretence that Capt. Conolly had no Mediterrean Pass, which, as the Vessel was only on the Trade from the West-Indies to Guiney, was needless, fince those Ships do not come near the Straits. The Master of the Xebeque beat him cruelly, to force him to confess the Captain and the Straits. himself a Portuguese; and afterwards he was forced by Threats of Death, to fign a Certificate that the Salletine had taken nothing from them, though the Vessel had then been plundered of every Thing of Value. On the 28th of August at Noon

they came to an Anchor at Barbary, where they were again rilled. On the 2d of Sept, the Captain was taken out of his Bed, where he had been confined by Sickness some Weeks, and he and his Crew sent naked on Shore to an old Castle, and thence carried to Saffee; where the young Prince, being affured they were English, suffered them to go to the Houses of the Dutch and Danish Merchants, where they were well used, and from whence Mr. Conolly wrote a very long Account to Mr. Popham, our Conful General at Tetuan; but he died the 23d of Sept. at Saffee, from the cruel Treatment he had received.

Bull's Second remains wounded at Aughquaga, under the Care of the Indians there, to whom Sir William Johnson has given five Prifoners, on Account of their good Behaviour! He has also distributed the rest amongst the Friendly Nations; putting them in the Places of their deceased Relations, which is an Indian Custom they always expect will be followed.

Capt. Bull, with his Party, refided at Kanessio; the Indians of which Village have been all along in Arms. He made large Offers of delivering up many English Prisoners, on his being set at

Liberty Sir William Johnson, fince the Prisoners were brought to him, has received Advice of the Success of a Party of ten Friend Indians, falling in with a Party of nine Delawares last Month, on the Frontiers of Pennsylvania, directing their Course against some Settlements, and singing their WAR SONGS; upon which the Friend Indiana attacked them, killed the Head of the Party, and took three Prisoners, who (with the Scalps) were hourly expected at Sir William's. This is a lucky Circumflance; the Indians being once engaged in Blood, must carry on the War with great Alacrity, as the rest will never forgive them, nor will they probably stop till they have destroyed these troublesome People, who have annoyed all the northern
