Since the 8th ultimo, not less than 3000 Persons have been inoculated for the Small-Pox in Boston; and not above 5 of that Number died, and they were Children under 2 Years old, that had been troubled with other-Infirmities.

PHILADELPHIA, April 19.
We hear from Northampton County, that one David Owens, a Deserter from the Regulars, who has lived some Years among the Indians, came in last Week to one of our Out Posts, bringing with him five fresh Indian Scalps, and a white Boy, who was a Prisoner among the Indians, being taken by them last Fall, when they killed the Peo-ple that were crossing Delaware in the Flat. They relate, that they were coming down Sasquehannah with nine Indians, viz. four Men, a Lad, two Women, and two Children, to fetch Corn; that they encamped at Night, and made a Fire to sleep by; that in the Night Owens waked the white Boy, and made him go from among the Indians, and lie on the other Side of the Fire; that he then removed their Arms, except two Guns, and a Hatchet; with the two Guns he that dead two of the Indian Men immediately, and with the Hatchet dispatched the Indian Lad, the two Women, and two Children; but two of the Men made their Escape. Owens staid not far from the Place till the Morning, when he scalped the two Men, the Lad, and the two Women; and then gave his Knife to the white Boy, hidding him fealn the two

Knife to the white Boy, hidding him fealt the two Children; but he declining it, they left them unfealped, and camp away. Dwens reports that goo Indians were altembled, and waiting for others to join them in an Invasion of this Province; but the following Advices make this doubted.
