Extract of a Letter from Fort Pitt, June 1, 1764.

The Cerperal and four Men, who went with the last Returns to Ligonier, are not yet returned, and I am in some Pain about them, as the Sawages begin now to discover themselves vound the Skirts of the Woods.—On the 27th of May, in the Morning, a Soldier of the 44d Resiment was freed at, as he was slanding Centry, upon the Paint of Grant's Hill; this Centry was detabled from a Cerporal's Gward, which was out that Morning to cover the Pleughs at Work in Captain Philips's Field; the the Centry was mortally wounded, he made his Escape, but died in about two shart after he came into the Fort.—That Party of Indians (Nine in Number) remained yesping on the Point of the Hill, till the Picquet was more than Half-way up to them, and then they ran off into the Woods, and the Piquit returned into the Fort.—A Night, between the Hours of Nine and Ten, the whole Garrison heard fourteen Death Hallo's on the other Side of the Aligheny River.—On the 28th, in the Morning, two Indians were seen upon the Point of Grant's Hill; and in the Assertance of the same Day, sive of the Enemy were seen by the Picquet in the Face of the Encampment Hill.—On the 28th a Shot was beard towards the Two Mile Run, not far from the Road leading to Ligonier.—The 30th, in the Assertance, two Indians were again seen upon the Peint of Grant's Hill; sulf above the Ligonier Rad; and late in the Evening, two Horses, with Bellis, and some Indians with them, were seen the office Side of the Aligheny.—All these Circumsances put together, make me imagine that the Sawages are assembling it in the Power of all the Sawages to miss such steen for the Advices from Carline, of the Fourth Instant are, The Commanding Officers at Ligonier and Bedford, have between Loudoun and Shippen's Town: That at Bedford one Man had been killed, and another carried off: That at Fort Littleton one Man was woun

On the 26th ult. a large Bedy of Indians fell on a Party of White People, working in a Field near Fort Dinuvidia, in Augusta County, Virginia, when they killed Fifteen, and wounded and took Sixteen more; they then attacked the Fort, and fired fix Hours facefively on it, but could not prevail.—This Day I received an Express from Cel.
