

another thro' the Skirts of his Coat & He endeavoured to load a gun, but they came running towards him, which obliged him to throw away his Gun, and make for the Fort, but they cut him off from that, so he then took immediately down to the Inhabitants, and, after a twelve Hours Chase, he got clear of them. How many People they have killed, I have not yet learnt.

From Shippensburgh we have Advice, that the young Woman, who was lately made Prisoner at the Mouth of Aughwick, made her Escape the next Evening after she was taken: That on Sunday, the Third Instant, the Indians killed one William Crow, about 15 Miles from Shippensburgh, and carried off his Wife and four Children, Prisoners: That as a Boy was milking a Cow, about a Mile from said Crow's, he saw an Indian crawling towards him, upon which he went into the House, took a Gun, and fired at him, about 80 Yards Distance, which made the Fellow stagger, when another immediately came up, and helped the wounded One off: And that this Party of Indians was said to consist of twelve.

Extract of a Letter from Fort Pitt, June 1, 1764. The Corporal and four Men, who went with the last Returns to Ligonier, are not yet returned, and I am in some Pain about them, as the Savages begin now to discover themselves round the Skirts of the Woods.—On the 27th of May, in the Morning, a Soldier of the 42d Regiment was fired at, as he was standing Centry, upon the Point of Grant's Hill; this Centry was detached from a Corporal's Guard, which was out that Morning to cover the Ploughs at Work in Captain Phillips's Field; the Centry was mortally wounded, he made his Escape, but died in about two Hours after he came into the Fort.—That Party of Indians (Nine in Number) remained yelping on the Point of the Hill, till the Picquet was more than Half-way up to them, and then they ran off into the Woods, and the Picquet returned into the Fort.—A Night, between the Hours of Nine and Ten, the whole Garrison heard fourteen Death Halloo's on the other Side of the Allegheny River.—On the 28th, in the Morning, two Indians were seen upon the Point of Grant's Hill; and in the Afternoon of the same Day, five of the Enemy were seen by the Picquet in the Face of the Encampment Hill.—On the 29th a Shot was heard towards the Two Mile Run, not far from the Road leading to Ligonier.—The 30th, in the Afternoon, two Indians were again seen upon the Point of Grant's Hill, just above the Ligonier Road; and late in the Evening, two Horsts, with Bells, and some Indians with them, were seen on the opposite Side of the Allegheny.—All these Circumstances put together, make me imagine that the Savages are assembling to infect the Communication, though, I believe, not in such Numbers as to dare to molest the Troops coming up against them.—The Commanding Officers at Ligonier and Bedford, have had Notice of the above.—We are very easy here, not imagining it in the Power of all the Savages to molest us.

Our Advices from Carlisle, of the Fourth Instant are, That a Man was found dead and scalped, in the Road between Loudoun and Shippensburgh: That at Bedford one Man had been killed, and another carried off: That at Fort Littleton one Man was wounded: And that the Roads were much infested by the Enemy.

Extract of a Letter from Fort Cumberland, June 5. On the 26th ult. a large Body of Indians fell on a Party of White People, working in a Field near Fort Dinwiddie, in Augusta County, Virginia, when they killed Fifteen, and wounded and took Sixteen more; they then attacked the Fort, and fired six Hours successively on it, but could not prevail.—This Day I received an Express from Col. Stephens, who informs me, that on the Fourth Instant Captain Nimrod Ashby, and a Man of the Virginia Volunteers, were taken Prisoners on the South Branch of Patowmack.—The same Day a Negro Fellow, belonging to one Lynch, was taken as he was driving a Waggon; the Horsts were killed, and the Waggon broke to Pieces.—Also, at the same time, a Man, his Wife, and Child, were carried off from Cedar-Creek, within ten Miles of Winchester; and it is supposed, by the great Number of Tracks discovered, that there must be three or four large Bodies of the Enemy now down among us; the Inhabitants are chiefly gone away, or going.

Extract of a Letter from Virginia, June 4. The Situation of our Frontiers is truly distressing.—The Indians killing and captivating daily.—About eight Days past, upwards of forty Persons were killed at the Pastures, on the Frontiers of Augusta County.—We were hopeful our Troubles were in some Measure over; but, to our Surprise, the Indians came on Friday last, about seven Miles from me, and took one Day's Wife, and four Children. Next Morning, about Sun-rise, four Families going to a Fort with Horsts loaded, the Indians Way-laid them, and killed and captivated 21, whose Names were Lloyd, and his Family, Clonper, Jones, Thomas, &c. This Morning, about Two o'Clock, I was informed that about Sun-set Yesterday, six Families were cut off near the Narrow Passage. Two Companies of Men are gone after the Enemy, to re-take the Captives, if possible, of which there are as yet no Accounts.

Extract of a Letter from Fort Loudoun, June 5, 1764. Last Week several Indian Tracks were seen in the Woods betwixt this Place and Juniata. Some few of the Inhabitants, who had gone to their Plantations on that Creek, to sow Corn, were attacked by a Party of Indians; one of whom was killed, but on the others returning the Fire, the Indians went off; they carried a Woman with them, that they had taken the Evening before.—On the First of this Month a Man at Mr. Armstrong's Plantation, about Half a Mile from this Fort, who went in the Morning to take Care of his Cattle, was fired on, and shot thro' the Arm, but did not see those who fired on him.—Next Day, about six Miles below this Post, a Man was killed and scalped, his Wife, and four small Children, carried off.—Parties followed their Tracks to the Mountain, but there lost them.—This Day, about Eleven o'Clock, one of the Inhabitants came to inform me, that about four Miles down the Creek, that passes thro' this Place, three Families were cut off, and their Habitations burnt.—I immediately sent an Officer with a strong Party, along with a Number of the Inhabitants, armed, to endeavour coming up with the Indians, or to make Discoveries. He is just returned, and acquaints me, that three Families, consisting of 13 Persons, were killed, their Houses burnt down, and that several of the dead Bodies were found in the Ruins, almost burnt to Ashes, which he buried; he afterwards made a large Circuit in the Woods, without discovering any Track of the Enemy; but found a few Things that belonged to the Killed, which the Indians had taken away. Some of the Inhabi-

tants are still in Pursuit, but am afraid there is little Probability of Success, as the Tracks were very indistinct.—One Lad escaped; he says the Indian Party was about Twenty; that they fired several Shot after him; and that he saw his Father and Mother knocked down with Tomahawks, before he ran off. These Alarms have intimidated the Inhabitants extremely; they are returning from their Plantations in Crowds to this, and every other little Post in the Neighbourhood, in the utmost Distress. I shall do every thing in my Power to support them, and alleviate their Misery.

Several Persons were likewise made Prisoners. Extract of a Letter from Carlisle, June 9. Twice this Week have I had Occasion to write of the sundry Depredations committed in this County; the last, near Loudoun, was a heavy and bloody Stroke.—The Enemy, being closely pursued, killed their Prisoners on the Flight, to the Number of Six or Seven, then scattered, as usual, and made their Escape.—You will readily guess at the present Situation of our miserable and unhappy People, and the piercing Applications I must endure from every Quarter, crying for Help.

ANNAPOLIS, June 21. A Death Warrant is gone down to Calvert County, for the Execution of Three Negroes, lately condemned for Poisoning their Master, Mr. William Hamilton Smith, whose Death we mention'd about a Month ago.

There came in from England, in the Munificence, Capt. Grundill, into Patuxent, a Steerage Passenger, one Richard, or Richardson, or some such Name, who imported a large Quantity of Counterfeit New-Jersey Six Shilling, and Three Shilling Bills. This silly Blockhead almost as soon as he Landed, was very lavish with his Paper Money, which first caused him to be suspected; tho' it is said his Roguery is but very badly executed. He is in Jail in Calvert County.

A few Days ago, a valuable Negro Man in Queen-Anne's County, Fishing in a Canoe, and being Fuddled, fell overboard, and was Drowned.
