Extract of a Letter from Virginia, June 4.

"I The Situation of our Frontiers is truly differsing.—The Indians killing and captivating daily.—About eight Days past, upwards of forty Persons were killed at the Passures, on the Frontiers of Augusta County.—We were hopeful our Troubles were in some Measure over; but, to our Surprise, the Indians came on Friday last, about seven Miles from me, and took one Day's Wife, and four Children. "I Laft Week feveral Indian Tracks were feen in the Woods betwirt this Place and Juniata.
