At the late Meeting at Newmarket, a Gentleman of great Fortune, in one Day lost Ten Thousand Guineas; in two Days more, this Sum was trebled; and on the fourth he judiciously set out for Town, resolving to tempt his Stars no more for that Time; as they were so unfavourable an Aspect.

We hear that a noble Personage won last Week at Newmarket, no less than 40,000 l.
The Spirit of Gaming is now so prevalent amongst the lower Class of People, that a Butcher in Clare-market lost 3000 l. last Week at Newmarket.

Betts are daily making on the Nobleman's riding from London to Edinburgh in 12 Hours, any Time in one Month. The Distance is 403 measured Miles, and the Time allowed 720 Minutes, which is one Minute and near 43 Seconds to a Mile. The Gentlemen of the Turf observe, that the famous Childers, one of the finest Horses ever in England, and who made 27 Feet a Stroke, could not hold out above four Miles at that Rate, which was computed about .50 Miles an Hour; and at present it is computed, the Generality of the best Race-horses in England make only seven Yards, or 21 Feet a Stroke; and considering the Disadvantage of Uphill, Caseways, through the different Towns and Villages betwixt London and Edinburgh, the Undertaking is one of the greatest of the Kind ever known, although it is admitted there may be a Possibility of performing it.

BOSTON, June 28.
We hear from Portsmouth, New-Hampshire, that on Wednesday last as one Mr. Shirley of Chester, and another Man were travelling about a Mile from that Place, a Flash of Lightning instantly struck him and Horse dead upon the Spot, and much wounded the other Person; his Cloaths smelt very much of Sulphur, and his Face turned purple, some Papers in his Pocket were scorched, and the Edges of two Dollars melted; his Hair was also burnt off his Head. What is remarkable, the Clap which followed the Flash was not very loud, scarcely heard a Mile from the Accident.

July 2. We are well assured, that the Gentlemen of New-York have contracted with the Manufacturers of this and Connecticut Government, for Fifty Thousand Yards of Woollen Cloths; being determined no longer to wear the British Manufactures of any Kind, which may be had in America.

NEW-LONDON, June 29.
On the 20th Instant was finished the raising Mr. Thomas Lessingwell's Bridge, at Norwich-Landing, standing over Shetucket River; it being the most curious and complete Piece of Architecture, of the Kind, ever erected in America. It is 124 Feet in Length, and 28 Feet from the Water, and the Water 30 Feet deep; having nothing underneath between the Butments to support it, but is entirely supported by the Geometry work above, and is supposed to be strong enough to bear 50 Tons weight. The Work was performed by Mr. John Blis, of Norwich, said to be one of the most curious Mechanicks this Age has produced. It is remarkable the raising this Bridge was completed in about two Days, (it having taken 28 Days to raise the former Bridge) and not a Person hurt, nor the least Accident happening, not even the loss of a Tool.

NEW-YORK, July 9.
One of the Sloops that was carried into Cape-Francois, in Company with Capt. Claxton, by a French Man of War, as mentioned under the Philadelphia Head, arrived here last Monday, and confirms the Account he brought; but we are since credibly informed, That an English Frigate, having Occasion to call at Turk's Island, and observing the French erecting some Works there, ordered them to desist; but they not chusing to comply, the English Commander landed Part of his Crew, killed 28 Frenchmen, and took several Prisoners.

ANNAPOLIS, July 19.
For about Ten or Eleven Days past, we have had a great deal of Wet Weather, and several Thunder Gusts, which has done much Damage to the Harvest on both Shores, many Thousands of Bushels having thereby been entirely Destroyed.

On Wednesday last Week, the Lightning struck the Dwelling-House of Mr. Joseph Cowman at West-River, split one of the Chimnies, tore the Wainscoting of the Room in which the Family were sitting, and killed a Dog lying at a small Distance from them; but did no other Damage.

The same Day the Lightning split a Tree near this Town.
Last Thursday Died in Virginia, Thomas Faber, last Post-Rider between this and Alexandria: He went up to Winchester on some Business, and meeting with a Rattle-Snake he cut it in two with a Hanger; but shortly after handling the Head Part, and viewing the Mouth, it bit him in the middle Finger, which prov'd his Death.
