

172 **PHILADELPHIA**, July 26.
 Extract of a Letter from the Camp near Ontario, July 26.
 We have just received Orders to take in Prisoners for
 Niagara, and believe we shall sit off to-morrow. Sir William
 Johnson is here with 1300 Indians, Men, Women and Child-
 ren, of whom there are above 600 Fighting Men, who as the
 said, are to go with us. The Senecas have sent Word to Col.
 Bradstreet, that they will deliver up to him all the Prisoners
 and last Night he sent Boats off, with some Indians and White-
 men, to receive and carry the Prisoners to Niagara. The Hur-
 ons and Mississaugas are now at Niagara, waiting for Sir Wil-
 liam; and we hear several other of the distant Nations are to be
 at the Congress there. It is thought there will be a general
 Peace. The Troops are in good Health. We have Boats that
 row with 26 Oars, but they do not appear to me quite strong
 enough for the Service they are intended for.
 From Newfoundland we have Advice, that Captain Palliser,
 in His Majesty's Ship *Grenady*, was arrived there as Governor
 of the Place; that four King's Frigates were likewise arrived,
 to guard the Coast, and prevent Encroachments from the French;
 and that two of His Majesty's Ships were hourly expected from
 England.
 All was well at Pittsburgh the Sixth Instant, and the Com-
 munication clear.

ANNAPOLIS, August 2.

Extract of a Letter from Hanover, near York,
 dated July 25, 1764.
 Col. Bouquet, and the Troops, are ex-
 pected at Loudoun about the latter End of this
 Month, and to proceed soon after to the Ohio.
 By the latest Accounts we have had, all is quiet
 on the Communication.
 On Monday Night the 23d ultimo, after a
 short Illness, Died at his House in Anne-Arundel
 County, in the 48th Year of his Age, YATE
 PLUMMER, in whom was found the indul-
 gent Husband, tender Parent, humane Master,
 and officious Neighbour; whose Death is much
 regretted by his Friends and Acquaintance,
 more particularly by a disconsolate Widow, and
 nine Children. In all human Probability, his
 End was effected by the taking Something as a
 Vomit, administered as White Vitriol, but
 from the violent Operation, it is doubted some-
 thing of a much stronger Nature was given by
 Mistake, he having almost instantaneously large
 Discharges of a bloody Sublance, with a Con-
 tinuance several Days, and survived this Ope-
 ration eight Days only."
